BUT – will this be enough to win?



Faculty experience yields teamwork, and with such "old timers" as Messrs. Hunting and McNair at the fore only the Seniors could stand in their way. Their experience





Imports must go up or the 3rd Years will go down! And imports *have* gone up with three new giants appearing on the Junior team.




