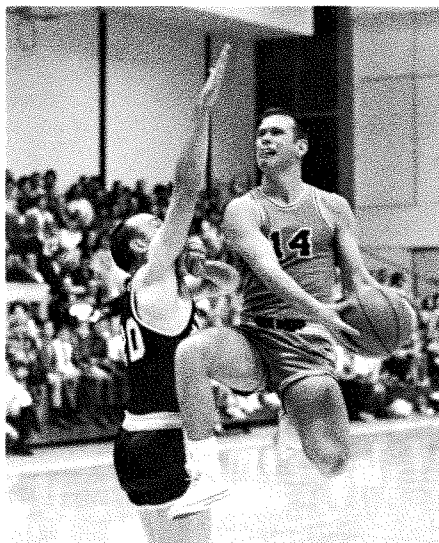
Faculty Outclasses Underclass 87-70

Never daunted, seldom defeated — that's the Pasadena Faculty and Saturday night they made a strong comeback victory over the Underclass after dropping the first game of the tournament. The Faculty was obviously determined to win this one and looked sharp from the opening tip-off until the final buzzer as they amassed 87 points to the Underclass' 70.

The Underclass team — missing Virgil Riley and some of the other starters for the tournament — put up a strong effort. In fact, the Underclass took more shots and pulled down more rebounds than the Faculty. The problem was that while the Faculty was having a below average shooting night, the Underclass was having trouble hitting the rim as they shot only 36% — the Faculty may have taken fewer shots but they hit a lot more of them. The Faculty was also far out ahead in assists — many of them coming at key times.

Mr. Petty was the high point man for the Faculty with 21 points and kept right up with his 53% shooting percentage for the year and turned in another evening's fine performance. Steve Gereaux with 19 and Mel In-

The Ambassador College Invitational trophy remains in Pasadena for another year as the Pasadena Upperclassmen defeated Big Sandy Saturday night before an overflow house. Both teams were at their best and this year's contest was one of the fastest moving and most exciting games of the season. It was a game of not only height and speed but also one of finesse, flair, and just plain-old good basketball, all the way around.

Jack Sowder, who had scored 31

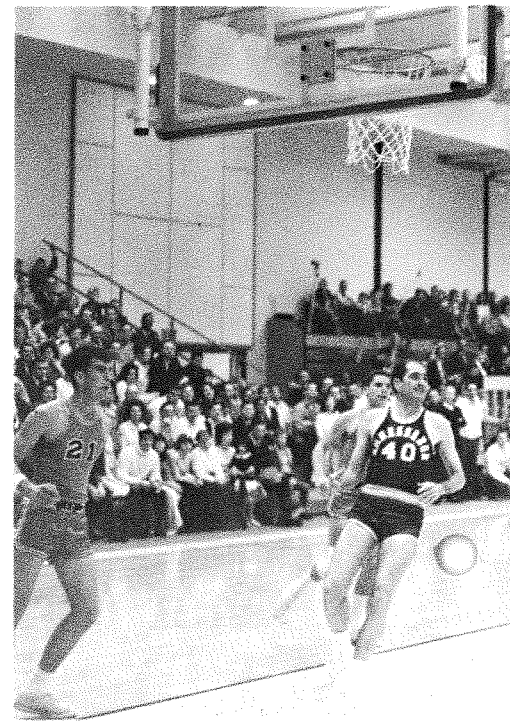

points the previous game, opened the contest from underneath with 2 points and Ray Kosanke quickly followed with another pair. Big Sandy came back quickly and Hoffman and Koehler halted the furious Upperclass charge. Ray Pyle was fouled as he drove toward the basket and captured three points to add fuel to the fast-moving Upperclass scoring machine. Sowder charged for the basket and at the last second made a beautiful hand-off to Orban following behind for another two points on a fantastic assist. Hoffman worked furiously to keep Big Sandy close as he rebounded and shot away at the mounting Upperclass lead. Ray Kosanke then took charge of the game and left no doubt in the mind of anyone as to who would be the victors — or who would be the most-valuable player. Kosanke dominated the boards and hurled in one long shot after another, going 11 for 15 from the floor for a fantastic 80% average and a total of 25 points in the first half.

Treybig came into the game for Texas and was red hot, adding six quick points for the cause. Koehler and Hoffman battled underneath but Kosanke had things sewn-up pretty tightly under the basket. Groce hit some beautiful shots from way outside as Big Sandy altered their attack somewhat. Orban and Sowder stole the ball several times as the guards brought it downcourt — imitating a Big Sandy trick from way back. Orban added a few of his falling out-of-bounds jump shots and Kosanke slipped in a quick two as the buzzer sounded at the half to make the score Upperclass 59, Texas 36.

Ray Pyle played a fine game out front at guard in the first half and started off the second portion with a couple of brilliant assists. Big Sandy came up with their pass-off-at-the-basket play to avoid the long arms of Schnippert and Kosanke and managed to put in a few more points to keep things honest.

The Upperclass began to work in



their subs two at a time but Big Sandy put in a whole new team. Soon two entirely different teams from those in the first half were battling it out in the final minutes. Scott Royer came in off the bench in the middle of the second half and became the game's second highest scorer as he led the Upperclass to a devastating 33 point lead. 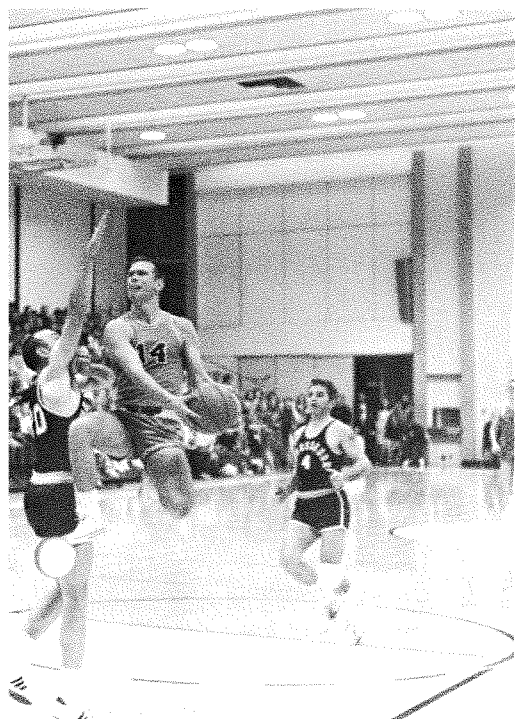

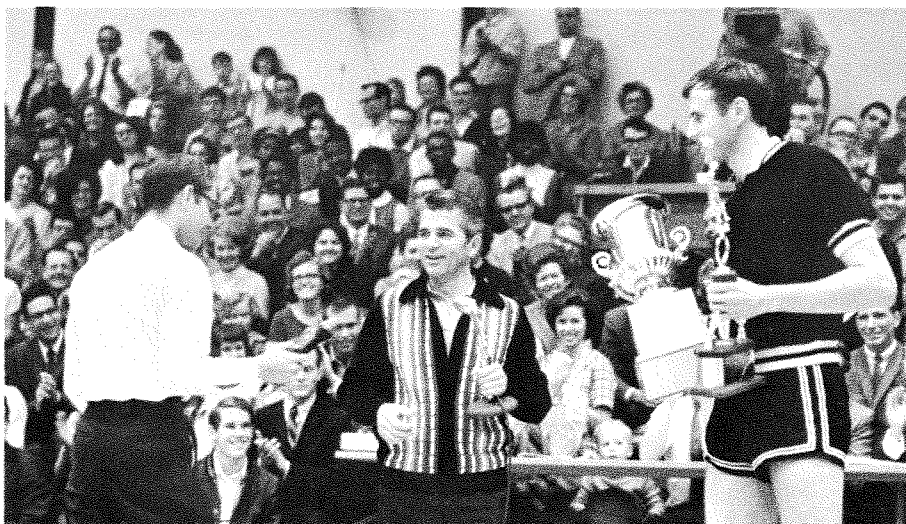
glima with 17 were the leading scorers for the Underclass.

Tough Texas Tennis Team Takes 11 Matches

Mr. Walter Wesbrook, Pasadena's tennis coach, turned over the tennis trophy to Mr. Alexander and a very inspired Texas team as Texas defeated Pasadena in the 1970 Intercollegiate Tennis Tournament.

Texas rolled over Pasadena, winning eleven of the possible thirteen matches. Pasadena played very well, but could not overcome the powerful determination of the Texans.

The highlight of the tournament was the singles match between Texas' number one player — Steve Brown — and Mr. Wesbrook. Mr. Wesbrook was forced to replace Gary Patch, Pasadena's number-one-ranked player, who was unavailable for the tournament. Mr. Wesbrook's experience and skill outlasted Steve's fine performance and defeated him eight games to three. Mr. Wesbrook is 71 years old.

Pasadena's only other victory came

when Carolyn Mott of Imperial High School with her excellent service and smooth game, defeated Judy Porter eight games to one.

Mr. Alexander has given the Pasadena

team a cordial invitation to visit Texas this spring for a return match.

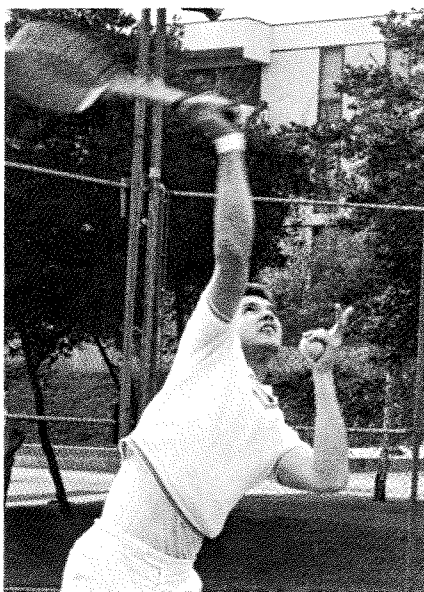

Big Sandy Wins Cross-country Championship

January 19 at 3:00 p.m. the second annual cross-country meet was held between the Big Sandy and Pasadena harriers and a team from Imperial High.

The meet was held at Brookside Park on a cool, slightly smoggy day. Starting time arrived and the runners assembled behind the line. Mr. Petty's

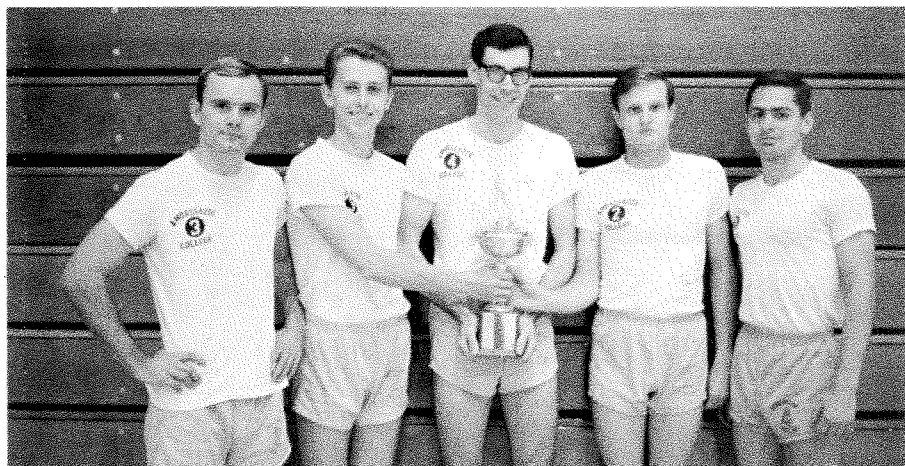
pistol rang out and 32 men burst into action, all jostling for position. Tom Smith emerged with an early lead which he soon relinquished to Dan Tonn and Gary Castle.

At the end of one lap of the grueling two lap, three-mile course, Dan Tonn and Gary Castle of Big Sandy were running neck and neck, with Ron

Brown, Ken Williams, and Doug Burns trailing. Early in the second lap, Dan Tonn opened up a lead over Castle, which kept mounting all the way to the finish.

Although Tonn, for the second year in a row, was the winner, Big Sandy again ran away with the team trophy as their upperclass top five finished 2nd, 3rd, 4th, 5th, and 14th. Dan Tonn's winning time for the hilly, three-mile course was a swift 15:50. Gary Castle came in at 16:21, Brown at 16:39, and Doug Burns at 16:49. Randy Schrieber and Gerald Hoffman took 6th and 7th for the Underclass of Big Sandy. Paul Kneebone, Mike Kusheba, and Steve Wendt pulled down 8th, 10th, and 11th for Pasadena. Mark Flynn was Imperial's first finisher, coming in 16th.

The final point totals, with the lowest score winning, were Big Sandy Upperclass 28, Pasadena A.C. 46, Big Sandy Underclass 47, and Imperial High 117.
