## FACULTY FINISHES SEASON UNDEFEATED



## Sophomores Take Juniors in 78-76 Thriller

Meanwhile the hapless Juniors fought desperately to keep pace, but without Ray Kosanke, they faltered badly, and found themselves 16 points down at half time, 51-35. To top it all off, Dave Pack had 3 fouls and Bernie Schnippert was out of the game with a badly sprained ankle.





grabbed it and dribbled the length of the floor. With 3 seconds showing, Leisure started to carry in the tying shot, but he slipped near the free-throw line, and the ball bounced out of bounds.

That cinched it, and the Sophs went away, victorious over the Juniors for the second time this year.


## Faculty Finishes Season Undefeated


