
trip to Ambassador.

I remember that day as though it were yesterday. My mother's face was wet with tears, and my father's voice sounded almost challenging as he said, 'Karen, never forget that we love you, and will miss you very much. Try and remember what we have taught you.' Never before that moment had a kiss meant so very much to me. From that period onward my place in the family would never be quite the same. My next trip home would be as a visitor.

"Someone pinch me!" My senses reeled with excitement as I boarded the silver bird which was destined to to transport me halfway to Paradise——Ambassador College, Bricket Wood, England. I could not believe it! At that very instant I experienced that proverbial desire to "sing for joy."

From my seat in the plane, I cand myself scrutinizing other pas-





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engers. What might their circumstances be? What did each of them hope to attain in life? I gathered from the scowls and unsmiling faces which greeted my eyes that each was a professional mourner by trade.


Twelve Thousand Miles! The realization of what I was doing suddenly hit me as a physical blow. Why travel that distance? Why leave Australia, home, an occupation? Why even risk travel through such trouble spots as Singapore, Aden, and experience the wretchedness and depravity of Ceylon and Egypt? My mind was in a turmoil of questions, doubt, apprehension, with a touch of despair.

The world's greatest waterfall . . . thousands of miles of savage Africa . . . mountainous regions round the Mediterranean . . . these are what I was priviliged to contemplate as I headed for our Beautiful Bricket Wood campus from my home town of Johannesburg, Republic of South Africa.

Travelling through the streets of Singapore, I was intrigued by many things and at times shocked. The inner part of the city is a veritable slum. The people there are sick physically and spiritually. They live in abject squalor and have no sense of cleanliness. They eat rubbish. They cook this "food" in filthy pots and pans on the side walks in front of their "homes".

Karachi was normally the next landing but because of the Indo-Pakistani war the plane had a lengthy detour. More fuel, therefore, was essential. Some cargo, two Asians and I were offloaded in Bangkok to allow for that extra fuel.

My mind was racing. How long would I remain here? Would I ever reach Ambassador College? I waited at the airport until arrangements were completed for my stay in Bangkok. mmmWhile travelling towards the city of Bangkok in a fabulous Mercedes - Benz, belonging to an airline official, a violent storm overtook us. The lightning was so awe-inspiring. One flash resembled a huge ladder, connecting the earth with the heavens. Torrential rain fell, feeding the swollen canals and rice paddies with more and more water.

After two days in Bangkok I flew to Kuwait avoiding India and Pakistan. Huge orange flames glowing in the night were visible below as the plane approached the oil rich kingdom of Kuwait.

On the 31st August we arrived off Aden. As there was much anti-British feeling at this time (the speaker in the Legislature was shot dead the next day) we weren't permitted to enter the port. Our captain informed us that it was the first time in the twenty years he had been on the England — Australia run that he had not been permitted to stop at Aden.

Suez was the worst of the cities that we visited. Its streets were filthy, flies swarmed everywhere — with hawkers an equal pest. One young boy 'offered' his friend for 9/-; for what purpose you can well imagine. Males are in greater demand than females in this deprayed nation.

We ate our lunch as we left Germany with a certain amount of disinterest. Only one thing interested us now, and that was London. "How much longer before we get there?" was the perpetual question in our minds.

I sat back and thought of the journey over the countries we had not landed on. We had flown over the Mediterranean which felt like the never-ending Atlantic. We had flown over Spain and over France.

At Last — ENGLAND

There it was sitting ready and waiting for me. It was about 2ft. x 2ft. and about 1½ ft. up in the air. It was fairly good looking. The colour? Red and black vertical stripes. What is it, what's it for? I had only a short time before, before what?

Aha! I have now come to the conclusion — sound I think — that it was part of a diabolical plot to make me ache all over. Did it succeed? Read on. Having worked up courage I finally used it — and surprise, I didn't get hurt! It was soft! But a softness that proved to be deceptive.

Suddenly it moved. What's going on? Slowly at first, then up to 30, 40, 50, 60 m.p.h. AH! I almost cried. This is part of the plot. The faster it goes the worse it'll get.

Boy! Travelling at this frightening speed the world goes by but fast! Trees, blue sky, cloudy sky, villages, towns big and small, dogs, people, all these and much more flashed past my blurred vision.

Then suddenly! So deceptively slowly I never at first noticed it, it began. My feet began to ache. Because of the new shoes I was wearing? Maybe, maybe not. But it didn't stop there, it spread. The back of my

neck, my back, arms, elbows, legs, my whole body began to feel a dull throbbing ache.

Move boy move! said something in my poor befuddled brain. But alas, I couldn't move, too many people, too crowded. Move my position slightly then? That wasn't much good either. If only I could have a drink, something to eat maybe. I'll be all right say I to myself. But, still too crowded, still too many people — no food, no drink. Then as I desperately try to think of a way out — realisation, we're slowing down. Was the solution to my dilemma here? It sure was.

We've stopped. People are going! No crowding! I can move. I stand and walk away, out into the semi-sunlight. Thankful that my ordeal was over, my aches were going and I was on the threshold of a new and meaningful life at Ambassador College.

What was it? Where?

A train seat on the journey from Edinburgh to Kings Cross, London.

Then at last — London was in sight! That city we had heard so much about, the city we were warned about. But our real interest in this huge heathen home was the fact that it was the last shopping place before the goal — Ambassador College. The blood raced through our veins three times the normal speed. Was this all true? Were we really there at last — England — London — on our way to Ambassador College?

I think many of us were quite frightened at the narrow roads, but nevertheless, in a short time we were driving up the lane to the college. There it was — Ambassador College. Was it real? Was it only a dream? At times I am still somewhat undecided.

When we arrived at the college it seemed to me that the only thing I could see was hedges, walls, and big gates, but it all looked very good to me. When the coach pulled up at the dining hall, the bus driver said "Well, here you are, at Ambassador College".



someone else!




Difference of opinion



She has one brother who is three years younger than her, and her interests include Red Indian Lore, chemistry, astronomy, drawing, painting and writing to pen friends!



While searching for employment in Sydney last autumn he talked to one of God's ministers from the office there. This decided Danny's — and his sister's — future.


DAWN COATES was born in the beautiful mountainous village of Sabie, in the Eastern Transvaal, South Africa.

Go on, you can't fool me!



WALTER BARKEI, this new snowy-headed Ambassador, born May, 1943, comes from New Jersey — U.S.A.


The new life Walt has embarked on is not too shattering for him, as he has had many uprootings and changes already.




Eighteen year -old LINDA GIB-SON first heard of Ambassador through a fellow student in Pasadena, but had to wait until now before sending in her application.



GARVIN GREENE is the oldest of a family consisting of two sons and five daughters.


He studied both German and Spanish at R.A. Long High School in Montana, U.S.A.

During the past summer he spent most of his time on trucks, bull dozers and steam rollers, helping with the construction of the Texas college campus.


A good basket ball player, he has already made his presence felt on the court.







Sylvia Jones




A very hearty WELCOME to Mr. and Mrs. Lee.

As well as living in Denver, Colorado, KAREN KRUEGER has spent four-and-one-half years of her life in Brazil, which she can remember very clearly.


After graduating from high school in June, Karen spent the past summer working as a secretary before leaving for England.

Her high school career was split between three years at the Piet Retief High School and two years at the Vryheid High School.


As a stenographer, she worked for a lawyer's firm before making her final move to England.



She has three older brothers, and her interests include hockey, marching, tennis and records.



In Sydney his art career was cut short when he applied for Ambassador College. His main interest is art, although he also enjoys swimming and football.





Among her favourite occupations are sport, dancing, listening to music and of course — hairdressing!


Welcome Marie!



JOHN STETTAFORD'S English teacher once told him he should read the Readers Digest from cover to cover, even the ads. Guess what ad he read?





She likes singing, and judging from what we have heard, she'll prove a very welcome addition to the Chorale.








Twenty-year-old DAVID SAND-LAND worked as an accountant for the Mutual Life and Citizens (M.L.C.) Assurance Company in Sydney.

It was not in this building, however, that he learned about Ambassador College. An advertisement in the Australian Readers Digest started it all.




ANDREAS FISCHER is Ambassador's newest arrival!
