

### Mass Exodus -Soon!



# FOOT AND MOUTH DISEASE

For weeks the British Isles have been scourged by this crippling disease. Right now it is just 50 short miles from college!

Agriculturists have blamed this disease on a yet unisolated virus. They claim it was imported from Argentina, or possibly brought into the country by birds migrating from the Continent. But the proverbial saying, "The answer lies in the soil," holds a key to the real cause of this disease. Foot and Mouth results from wrong agricultural practices, improper breeding, and sick

soil.

Sir Albert Howard showed that animals raised by natural methods will not contract Foot and Mouth even while literally rubbing noses across the fence with infected animals.

The college farm has just purchased 70 head of Dairy Short Horn cattle. They range in age from a few weeks to 8 or 9 years.

On the surface our animals look healthy. But are they strong enough to withstand Foot and Mouth?

The cattle have been raised in an environment where false principles of nutrition and breeding were employed. These animals need time to change their physical make-up. They are still susceptible


Every Sunday at 1 p.m. in the Common Room.

So, if you're missing a hacksaw blade, a bag of peanuts, a chewed-up Biro, your Bible, or your World History notes - check Lost Property!






— And dull! But just a minute. Who says sailing is boring? If you want to hear about an exciting, stimulating, action-packed, fun-filled two weeks, just ask:


.....Tom Demeter about how to hopelessly entangle an anchor rope in the boat propellor;
