


BEST EVER

Pete takes time to relax on an Ercol Special.



Plans are already under way to install modern equipment in the new building. The result will be to streamline servicing and maintenance of the College car fleet as well as the farm agricultural machinery.

Expansion of the Transport Department had become essential. If you are familiar with our small fleet of Vauxhalls and Singers, you may be surprised to know that there are actually forty vehicles registered in the College's name! Add to that the cars belonging to faculty members—and Lady Yule's one-car garage just could not cope!

What about the future? Because

of their own pressing needs the gardeners are soon to take delivery of a new Transit van and Mr. Howes' familiar "Black Maria" is to be replaced by a 3 ton Bedford lorry and a 5 cwt. van. But there is one vehicle of particular interest to students! Many of you have already ridden in our 12 seater Ford Custom-bus. In its short life it has already clocked up 21,000 miles and completed three educational student tours to the Chateaux of France, the Swiss Alps and to Rome. Because of the success of these tours the College has approved the purchase of another, much larger, 15 seat Custom-bus!! So, next summer TWO Mini-buses will be touring the Continent helping to provide invaluable experience as part of the Ambassador educational programme!
