40 GRADUATE in 1970 CEREMONY



"The root cause of all human ills is the wrong approach to life!" said Chancellor Herbert W. Armstrong, addressing the 1970 Graduating Class and a capacity audience in the College Gym on June 12.

The simple but impressive ceremony completed a decade of activity. At the first Bricket Wood Graduation in 1961, three received their degrees. But this year 40 were awarded.

After the Invocation and Address of Welcome, Russell Johnson, graduating Senior, spoke about the ferment in modern education. He stressed that to "demonstrate" should mean offering a superior alternative.

Russell tells of a superior alternative



"Does anyone have the right," he asked, "to tear down what others have built without offering a superior alternative?" Ambassador offers *that* superior alternative — an approach to life based on the true values.

No sooner had the stirring notes of the "Battle Hymn" died down when Mr. Armstrong continued the theme "Youth in Revolt".

The Chancellor pointed out how the great universities in America are being systematically destroyed. Communistinspired agitators appeal to disenchanted youth on today's campuses. The result? Riot, anarchy, disorder.

"The conditions that exist today must be caused by evils in the Established Society." What are those evils? Education gone wholly materialistic, administrations unconcerned with the morals and character of their students. There is a vast educational structure but it lacks

the two-fold *Missing Dimension* — a genuine concern for the welfare of others and respect for constituted authority.

Following the address, 37 Seniors were invested with the External Degree of Bachelor of Arts from Ambassador College. Mr. Armstrong took particular delight in conferring the Master of Arts degree in Theology upon Messrs. Leon Walker, Sherwin McMichael and Charles Hunting.


He's wasting time.

The International Senior Class of 1970 held its banquet in the only place it could be held — the International Lounge.






"Boy! It was worth waiting for!"




Beef - in

Co-ordination, strength, technique — those are the criteria for success in field events!


Monday afternoon saw "Herculean" figures stride to the arena for the first field events of the 1970 Field Day.

In the discus event, all-around athlete Jon Buck took his first of many victories with a throw of 114'6".

The next event was the shot put which became a repeat of last year as Erna Barnard and Garry de Jager took first places.


In the long-jump the decisive leaps of Carol Burman proved too much for her opponents as she hurtled herself to a Bricket Wood record of 15' 7". An excited crowd watched as her team mate, Jon Buck, set out to smash the Bricket Wood record in the men's long jump; and that he did with a 20' 9" jump.

Sophomore victories let up for a moment as Bob Justus soared over the pole vault bar at a height of 9' 51/2" for a solid 1st place. But the second years struck back again as Carol Burman set a new Bricket Wood high-jump record of 4' 73/4".


Darrell Watkins, of basketball fame proved he wasn't a one-sport athlete by winning the men's high jump with a beautiful leap of 5' 61/2" — just half an inch short of the record.

After last year's thrilling International Meet, would our Intra-mural competition prove as exciting? Yes, indeed! Despite the hot sun, 3 all-time records were shattered and 5 Bricket Wood records tumbled.

The victorious team? The Sophomore powerhouse! And with athletes like Muir, Buck, Cullen and Burman, how could they fail? The jubilant Sophomores tallied 110 points by the day's end. Almost the total of their next two rivals, the Juniors (62) and Freshmen (54) combined.

But it was not an easy victory. Freshmen athletes Mearl Bond, Rosemary Nickson and Rene Gruter plus Senior stalwarts de Jager, Nelte, and Levsen were not about to surrender the Field Day Trophy without a struggle.

The men's 100-yard dash was the race of the day! Jon Buck tore ahead of Helmut Levsen in the final few yards. Both men set Bricket Wood records — Buck at 10.4 and Levsen in 10.5. Soon Buck was heard from again. The 220, the 880-yard relay and even the long jump. A record every time!

For the ladies. Carol Burman swept past Junior favourite Lockiette Greene in the 440, and in the 220 Rosemary Nickson's surprise victory chalked up 5 more points for her class.

But it was in the marathon 3½-mile Cross Country that the Sophomores showed the form of champions. '69 winner Peter McLean, though hard-pressed by Rene Gruter, again took first place in this most gruelling contest.

Bob Justus vaulted to a first place while Hulme and Willis finished one-two in the cruel Mile Walk.
