MEET THE TEACHERS

MR. TORRENCE

VICE CONTRACTOR CONTRA

Mr. Torrence, our Imperial High School principal and Teacher's Training instructor, has led a very versatile and interesting life. Born in Kingsdown, Kansas in 1917, he attended high school in Norwich, Kansas. From there, he attended college at Winfield, Kansas for three years and taught three years.

However, in January, 1941, the situation began to change. Mr. Torrence was called into the army. Five long years were spent at this "occupation." During this time, he was obliged to spend 3½ years in a Japanese concentration camp. Thus his presence with us now is almost a miracle because only one out of five men came out of those camps alive!

After his release from concentration camp and subsequent discharge, a wedding took place. December 14, 1947 marked the wedding of Mr. Torrence to Miss Wynona E. Hill. His next step was to finish college. Receiving a B.S. degree in education from Colorado A & M, Mr. Torrence continued his teaching profession.

But teaching is not his only vocation. He even held one position in which he farmed half the night and taught school the next day, which reminds him of his days in college when he worked from 12:00 midnight to 7:00 a.m. for the enormous wage of 10c per hour!

Thus he continued until 1952 when he heard Mr. Armstrong on the World Tomorrow broadcast. However, he knew Mr. Armstrong was wrong in regard to the sabbath, so he "moved a library in" to prove his point. As you can see, he never proved it. In fact, from that point he became principal at Gladewater in 1955 and principal of Imperial High in 1956 and 1957. During these two years, he has also taught Teacher's Training at Ambassador College.

Thus we find ourselves at the present time, in which we should be very thankful that God has seen fit to call such a man of wide experience and versatility as Mr. Torrence. Keep up the good work, Mr. Torrence!

MR. HERB SCHRADER

"Go West, Young Man, Go West"

Iowa . . . Colorado-Wyoming . . . California — "Go West, young man go West" is a saying Mr. Herb Schrader has put into practice. He was reared on a farm near Sigourney, an eastern Iowa town, and upon graduation from high school the same summer he entered Central College, a private Iowa school, and graduated (with honors) 3 years later, majoring in sociology and political science. During that time he had published two articles in the Banner, magazine of the Christian Reformed Church. Also during that time, he planned to become a Church of Christ minister, but was disillusioned upon finding (in his senior year) that wine is wine — not grape juice, and that Christmas is pagan. This caused a change of plans - a shift to the teaching field.

Two years later Mr. Schrader went to Greeley, Colorado to get his Master's Degree at Colorado State College of Education. While there, he developed a still unquenched love of God's handiwork — the majestic Rocky Mountain area.

Mr. Schrader learned by first-hand experience the importance of using wisdom in dealing with the unconverted. While in Galeton, Colorado, he refused to participate in the school's Christmas activities and quite thoroughly and frankly explained his position on this matter, as well as on the Sabbath, baptism, etc. This was a dangerous thing to do, for though he had convinced 80% of the student body of the correctness of his position, the students did not convince their parents. This fact, coupled with his vigorous sponsorship of the Democratic cause in the school election (he was unaware of the truth on that subject) branded him as a Communist in that year of Sen. McCarthy's rabid popularity. Being against accepted religion and bringing about a 2 to 1 ratio for Stevenson in a 2 to 1 Republican town constituted convincing proof to the local Lutherans. Mr. Schrader decided it was time to relocate - and also time to bridle the tongue.

Having begun tithing at Galeton, he was prospered the next year at Cheyenne Senior High in Wyoming where he received a \$700 salary increase in a school 20 times larger than that of the year before. Two years later, while at Cheyenne, he was contacted by Mr. Raymond Cole and

asked to teach in God's schools. He accepted and hasn't regretted the decision since. "The big difference between the students at Ambassador and students in the world is that God's students want to learn and want to improve," states Mr. Schrader. "Such an attitude is unique and WONDERFUL!"

"Yes," said Mr. Herrmann during asembly on Thursday, March 14, "Man is vainly trying to gain prestige among nations by ascending to the moon and other planets — not realizing the time to fulfill his dream is short."

He pointed out that man has the finances, might, and intelligence to perform the task. However, God said in Genesis 11:4-7 that nothing man "imagined" to do would be restrained from him — unless HE prevented it!
