Australia is part of Israel, and Australia is in the spotlight as the climactic year, 1959, draws to a close. With the eyes of an over-populated, communist Asia looking hungrily at the huge land mass of sparsely populated Australia — even while the people cry "populate or perish" — God says the time is NOW to warn His people "down under."

The door is open! The time is now! The job is ours!

Every day broadcasts — across the board — on the "Amalgamated Wireless" networks in Australia have laid a new challenge before us. Mail receipts will skyrocket! Requests for literature, the Correspondence course, and the Plain Truth will multiply overnight. Hundreds will be seeking personal advice, counsel and churches.

A work of this magnitude cannot be handled over 3000 miles of ocean. An

office in Australia is needed immediately!

Mr. Armstrong, aware of the urgency, has authorized the office to be

established soon after the Feast of Tabernacles.

Leaving from Los Angeles International on November 9 by Pan Am Jet, Mr. Garner Ted Armstrong, Mr. Gerald Waterhouse and Mr. Frank Longuskie will rocket over the vast Pacific via Honolulu to Sidney, Australia.

Here, in the population center of Australia, the team will immediately begin jam-packed busy days securing office space, and making the many

contacts and arrangements vital to the work there.

By November 25th, the office will be established and operating! Mr. Frank Longuskie, with much experience in the London office behind him and months of preparation here at headquarters handling the Australian mail,

will be left in charge of this vital new responsibility.

With the Office functioning and well in hand, Mr. Ted Armstrong and Mr. Waterhouse will fly, on November 26, to Manila in the Philippines to meet Mr. Ortiguero and coordinate the work there. Mr. Waterhouse will remain in Manila working with and confirming the Churches in that area for several weeks — until he is fully familiar with the needs. He will then return to Australia to coordinate the entire Australian and South-East Asian work.

Joining the office staff in January 1960 will be Mr. Charles Hefner from the mail reading staff here at headquarters. This three man team will have the responsibility of opening an entire new frontier — a new continent! What a challenge! What an opportunity for those who may qualify to serve

there in the future.

Who will be qualified when God next calls? Are you ready?

After leaving Mr. Waterhouse in Manila, Mr. Ted Armstrong will return to Los Angeles via Taipei. Taiwan and Tokyo. Mr. Armstrong's jet-flight will depart from Tokyo at 1:00 p.m. Saturday, December 5, Tokyo time. He will arrive at Los Angeles International Airport at 9:35 the morning before the afternoon he left and be in Pasadena to give us all the news on Sabbath afternoon — the same day.


delicious food.

The North Korean moon cast a dull glow across the corpse-strewn battlefield. For five days the area had been ripped and torn by constant shell fire from Chinese Communist artillery batteries. For five days the Chinese had churned and wrecked the mourning earth with death and destruction For five days the American 1st Marine division had held 78,000 Chinese at bay along the icy shores of the Chosin Reservoir. But tonight, everything was quiet and still as haggard bloodstained Marines tried to catch their first sleep in a week.

Suddenly, the stillness of the night was disturbed by the eerie whine of a lone artillery shell; the only round fired that night. It exploded among the sleeping Marines with an earshattering roar. Today that Marine is a student at Ambassador College — Mr. Howard Clark. He was anointed by God's ministers on the day of Pentecost last year and was healed the next day. Today he walks this campus as a living proof that God does heal!
