Are you developing into the type of a person who can lead or are you one who dodges responsibility, one who would rather be lost in the crowd? There are many at Ambassador who act as though the way to success were to see how little one can do, apart from the routine and required, in order to keep out of trouble.

Another point: leadership is not just a function of the ministry! We are ALL held responsible for exercising leadership in whatever capacity we are serving.

Why should we want to lead, to desire responsibility? If we are living a full abundant life, we should unselfishly desire to lead others into the same blessings we have.

How are we to go about this task? First of all: **HAVE THE CORRECT MOTIVE FOR WANTING TO LEAD.** Ask yourself this question: "Why do I want to lead...for personal glory, self-elevation, or to put myself in better position to serve?"

## TO TIP OR NOT TO TIP?

God has called us from many diverse social backgrounds. In many cases, our understanding of the social graces is agonizingly insufficient!

For example, we aren't sure whether we ought to tip or not.

Waiters and waitresses should be tipped as a matter of justice! Why? Because their wages are predicated on this custom. Under this system, if you do not tip you are actually stealing the man's salary!!

But how much should one tip?

On tipping, the rule of thumb to follow is: **TEN TO FIFTEEN PERCENT** of your bill--depending upon the quality of the service and your pocketbook! Under a dollar, the tip should range between ten and fifteen cents.

A barber usually gets a quarter and a bootblack a nickle or a dime. The scale of tipping a taxi driver ranges from 20-25% of the bill. However, a quarter is usually sufficient.

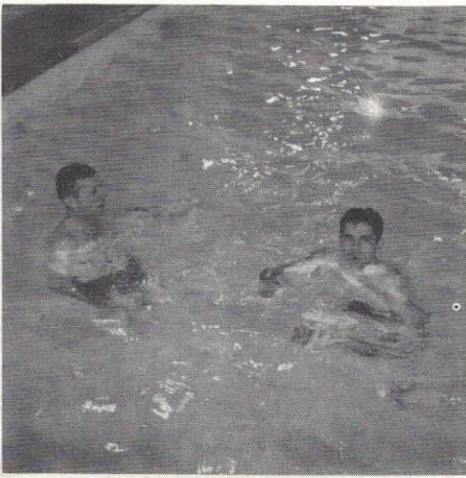

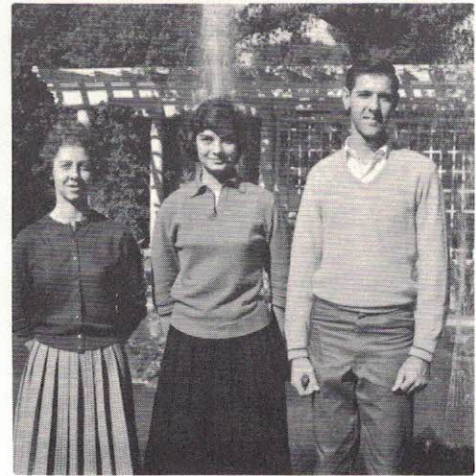

The Imperial faculty was on hand. Although there weren't any mazurkas, quadrilles, gavottes, or turkey trots, all enjoyed a most gay evening!!!

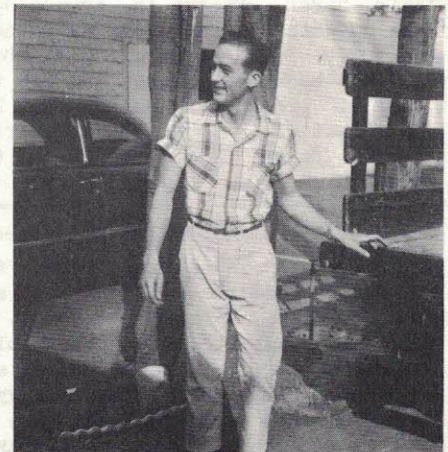
## Stations Out Back

Mr. Bickett will supply most of the photographic work. A new dark room on Mentoria Court will be used to process the film.

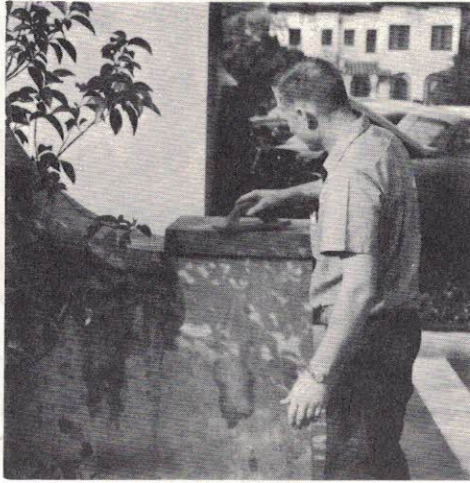
High school students will be used to do much of the proofreading, writing and pasting up copy for the year book. Their student editor will be Robert Dick.

We have seen many changes and improvements in the Work--the campus is not left behind!

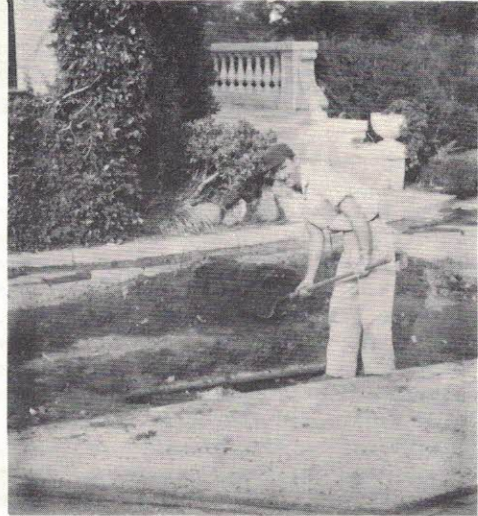

Another improvement is the reconstructed wall between the Administration Building and the neighboring apartments. The east end of the wall now boasts a sturdy pillar--no jagged

edges.

A single electrical inlet from Terrace Drive through Mayfair and on to various points is nearing completion.

The Electrical Department is hard at work installing a one million watt cable from the Library, under Grove street, to the Assembly Hall and Murphy House. This cable will carry enough current to illuminate TEN THOUSAND 100-watt light bulbs, or the equivalent of seven city blocks!
