FOUR NATION-WIDE TOURS

The annual Ministerial Conference — time of constant changing and revamping of plans for the growth of God's Work! About this time each year, the announcements of the tentative plans for the coming summer are eagerly awaited!

The question is, "Who's going where?" This year, God's ministers have planned to send four nation-wide baptizing tours to help serve the many hundreds who are hungering for more of God's way of life — having truly repented and are now ready to be baptized God's way!

The first of these tours is to be under the competent leadership of Roger Foster, an Ambassador College graduate now serving in the Denver, Garden City, and Pueblo area. Slated to go with him is Carn Catherwood, now a junior who is scheduled to go to London after the summer's tour as a student in Ambassador College, U. K.!

Summer, 1960, marks another first for this era of the Church of God! James Wells, the first English student to enter Ambassador College, is to be the first British subject to take a baptizing tour in the United States! He is scheduled to go with Bill McDowell, graduating senior, who is taking his third baptizing tour!

Commonwealth Tour!

1960, a year full of "firsts" for the Church of God! Mr. Raymond McNair, Minister of the Churches of God in England, is scheduled to take a baptizing tour in England this coming summer — but this time, a little different!

Robin Jones, one of our zealous British students, has been selected to be the first English subject to serve his own people on a baptizing tour! He is to leave as soon as possible at the end of this semester to join Mr. McNair in London.

This makes us wonder — When will the opportunity open for a German or a French student to serve in this same way? Will you be prepared, too?

German Response

Twenty letters were received as the result of the first German-language broadcast over Radio Luxembourg. Some waited until they had heard two broadcasts.

Every one of these requests were of a very friendly nature — all were requesting literature.

The responses came from all parts of Germany, as well as two letters from Switzerland and one from France. This shows that Radio Luxembourg has an encouraging widely-circulated coverage, that it can be heard over vast areas of Europe.

These continued broadcasts, coupled with going soon into the German Reader's Digest, makes it necessary to send one of the German staff to Europe this summer. And this is only the beginning!

COLLEGE OPENS IN EUROPE

Ambassador College U.K. Ltd. is a reality. Throughout the year we have been getting reports on the progress of the physical plant. Now we have some more really good news concerning the college! The ministers have selected six of our students to be the pioneers of the new branch! The announcement has been out for several days that Karen Kunkle, Ruth Myrick, Guy Engelbart, Carn Catherwood, Robin Jones and Gerhard Marx will be those people.

Now the Portfolio has the exclusive announcement of their reactions when they heard of the plans!

What were their reactions when they were told of the proposed year in England? Carn Catherwood was working in the French Dept. when Mr. Rea came in and quietly announced, "You are going to England." Carn paced the room for twenty minutes before he could muster the courage to face anyone.

Then he went out and phoned Karen Kunkle who was in Texas. It took him five minutes

to convince her that it was no joke. Within it that she went down to the travel bureau next day and began collecting travel information of England!

"It just floored me," was Guy Engelbart's comment. Almost immediately Robin got his store of photographs of London and Guy a travelogue of the wonders of England.

Robin is afraid his English brothers will think that he is too Americanized. He plans to lead the group on the \$57 tour of London.

Gerhard Marx is very excited at the opportunity he has to serve his own people at the same time get to know the English brethren.

Booklet Volume Nearly Doubled Over 1958

Imagine a stack of booklets ten times as high as the City Hall in Los Angeles! Think of flying over a pile of United States in Prophecy and other booklets over 2,500 feet tall! This would be the monumental number of booklets mailed out by the Ambassador College Press last year.

God's work is blooming ahead in every direction. The phenomenal expansion of the work is being felt in every department. In 1958 the total number of booklets sent out reached 492,704. However, in 1959 the total jumped to 715,875. This striking increase is an indication of things to come.

Continuing an increase of this scope, by 1965 — in just 5 short years — the booklet volume would be FOUR MILLION FOUR HUNDRED THOUSAND. Think of it!

With the Ambassador College press building already bulging at the seams, where do we go from here? Think of the additional presses we'll need for this volume of printing! Think of the added personnel that will be needed to process all the phases of such an increase.

Later that same day in the opposite direction another jet took off speeding Mr. Charles Miller to our Australian office. There Mr. Miller will perform the valuable service of supporting the Australian radio stations with tapes of World Tomorrow broadcast. He will also be a great help in the growing needs of that office.

Algeria On Fire!

Cries of "De Gaulle to the gallows" reverberate through the barricaded streets of Algiers as embittered French settlers protest against the French President's tenacious O.K. on the future status of this North African territory. De Gaulle maintains that the only solution to the whole Algerian mess is to call a nation-wide election among all Algerian citizens, both Arab and French, as soon as the five-year-old Moslem-French war is brought to an end. Such an election would be to determine whether Algeria would remain under French control or go independent. The over 1,000,000 French nationals frantically oppose such an election, since the native Moslems, who outnumber them 8 to 1, would naturally vote for complete severance of ties with their trans-Mediterranean overlord.

De Gaulle, whose rise to power began with a revolt by these same transplanted Frenchmen (on these very same streets) in May of 1958, clearly faces the biggest test in the short life of his Fifth Republic. But he has a power behind him that socialist coalitions never had — the Church. The largest Catholic-controlled labor union has just come out in strong support of his policy, threatening a nation-wide strike if anyone dare stage a *coup d'etat*. Such an iron-clad endorsement should be enough to swing any fence-straddling French general back in line.

Underhanded

On the home front, crime and corruption seems the order of the day. In Chicago, thirteen policemen were arrested in one week in a department-rocking scandal that forced Police Commissioner Timothy J. O'Connor to retire because of "ill health." Eight of the lawmen were accused of masterminding crimes for a burglar. They served as lookouts and carried away the loot in their squad cars.

Four million dollars a day — that's how much employees, mainly executives and supervisors, steal from the American businesses. That amounts to over \$1 billion a year. In 1960, 250 firms will go bankrupt because of this internal dishonesty — crookedness that is so carefully disguised that the reason for the red ink is never discovered.

27,000 supermarket food carts are swiped each year in the U.S. — amounting to a cool million dollars. The situation got so bad in Detroit recently that one Detroit market installed automatic braking systems on their carts to foil the pilfering housewives!

Oh yes! We live in a Christian nation — sure we do!

It means (1) a potential of thousands of new listeners; (2) a great influx of mail to our Pasadena headquarters; (3) many, many requests for the PLAIN TRUTH magazine, booklets, and the Correspondence Course; and (4) prospective converts that will necessitate a baptizing tour, which will result (God willing) in establishing a Church of God.

Let us all rejoice over this wonderful, good news, and pray continually that God will open more new radio doors for the WORLD TOMORROW program to proclaim His plan of salvation for all mankind — before the end of this present age.

GOLD RUSH

January 24, 1848 was one important day in the saga. Gold was discovered! A fortune teller building a sawmill for John Sutter, ran across the metal during their excavations.

After testing the yellow flakes by the method available, he hurried forty miles to Sutter's Fort and announced the discovery. Further tests were conducted until every man's business was quieted.

Efforts of Sutter to keep the find secret failed. News shot throughout central California until May, however, did the gold fever hold. This emptied San Francisco and other coastal towns as men rushed to join in the search for the yellow metal.

News of the discovery reached the East coast in the summer, but again it was several months before the rush began. By the end of 1849 California's population had increased tenfold, numbering well over 100,000. California was now ready for statehood — one of the factors ushering in the bloody years to come before entering the Union.

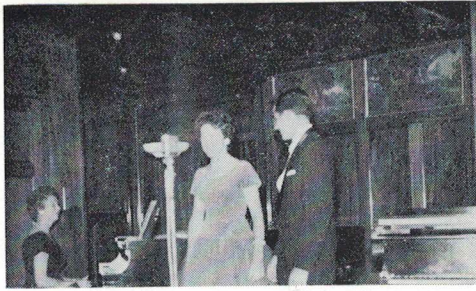

Recital Honoring Ministers

On Sunday, January 10, at 8 P.M. God's ministers and special guests gathered at Ambassador Hall for a pleasant interlude of music. It featured the *top* musical talent of Ambassador College. Selections included everything from Negro spirituals to Rhapsody No. 1 and opus 79, — giving listeners a well-rounded evening of entertainment.

The evening began with Mrs. Shirley Armstrong's moving rendition of "Rhapsody in Blue" by Gershwin. She was ably assisted by Lois Armstrong at the second piano. They were followed by another pianist, Eugene Walter, who played "Polonaise" opus 46, No. 12 by MacDowell. This was a difficult piece requiring much faster finger movement, but Eugene turned in his usual polished job.

Mr. Garner Ted Armstrong and Mrs. Dwight Armstrong sang a duet from "Don Giovanni" by Mozart entitled "Le Ci Darem la Mano." In this aria, one would sing a line then the other would sing the reply; then they would blend their voices together as only two of Ambassador's most beautiful voices can.

Kathryn Meredith entranced the audience with "Romance in G," opus 40 by Beethoven. This number had a very sprightly rhythm, requiring deft finger manipulations on the violin as "Kathy" gave a sterling performance.

Jazz pianist Dennis Pebworth surprised the audience with a very scholarly rendition of "Etude in G," opus 10, No. 5 by Chopin, followed by "The White Peacock" by Griffes. Dennis put so much expression into the latter piece that one could almost picture a white peacock strutting about its native habitat.

Mrs. Dwight Armstrong's soprano voice highlighted the evening as she sang "Morgen" by Richard Strauss; "Caro Nome" from "Rigoletto" by Verdi and "Goodbye" by Toste. She was accompanied by Dorothy Williams at the piano.

Piano virtuoso Ruth Myrick approached perfection with her rendition of "Rhapsody No. 1," opus 79 by Brahms. The dramatic intensity of this piece contrasted greatly with her second selection, "Gnomen-Reigen" by Liszt. This had a light gypsy-like rhythm portraying the dance of the gnomes.

The evening was capped off with several selections by Mr. Garner Ted Armstrong. His rich powerful bass-baritone voice made his interpretation of "Deep River" very moving. He gave the old Negro spiritual an intense, dramatic quality that would have made its composer proud.

All together, it was a profitable evening of enjoyable music from an excellent group of talented performers.

La Vonne is one of the co-eds around campus who has used her abilities wholeheartedly in the work of God. She is another example of what the future may hold for us as we also yield.

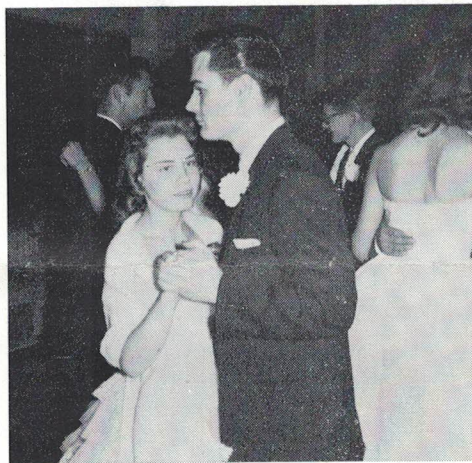
She plans to be back for graduation in June.

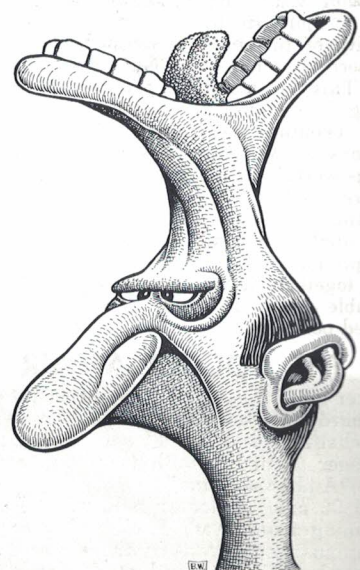
