Kansas City

Uakland




All in all, it was a perfect Feast in a perfect setting and everyone left with appetite whetted for more!

ENGLAND

The greatest throng of people ever known to attend the Feast of Tabernacles in Great Britain came from 27 nations to gather together in Christian fellowship. Four-hundred-seventy people set a new attendance record more than doubling last year's figure of 234!

There was little illness as near perfect weather greeted those congregating from such far-off lands as Java, Nicaragua and the Azores.

Thirty-four new brethren were baptized during the eight exciting, happy days. An added highlight of the Feast, and one of its outstanding happenings, was the ordination of Mr. Howard Silcox as the first native-born Deacon in the modern era of God's Church in England!

All left the Feast refreshed in body and spirit with renewed dedication and zeal.

AFRICA

The brethren in Petauke, South Africa congregated in Mr. Joseph Mwambula's home for the Feast of Tabernacles in that far away country. One hundred and fifteen adults and one hundred and twentyfive children studied God's Word together. Currently, Mr. Mwambula is conducting Bible studies every evening in his house and is also visiting nearby villages. We can all be thankful for the growth of the African work.

The seven full, and several special, baptising teams have reported over 68,000 miles traveled—a record amount!

Seventeen hundred people had requested to be met by the tours this year. The saddening part was that 500 did not meet with the teams. However, 560 people were able to count the cost and were added to GOD'S Church.

Each year we have several new developments in the summer baptising program. This year has been no exception. Not only has there been a record number of tours sent out, but also 3 ordained Ministers were available to lead full length tours.

A special tour by God's Evangelist Mr. Roderick Meredith accompanied by Mr. Dibar Apartian went through Northern California and the southern part of Oregon. Another special full length tour was taken by Mr. Harold Jackson and his wife. They were able to go through the southern states, visiting not only those who requested baptism but also many scattered brethren. Much joy was taken to those people who cannot ordinarily meet in local churches.

Not only is the harvest bountiful throughout the scattered areas of the United States, but also in the many local church areas. As we go to press we have an approximate total of 241 people baptized in local churches this summer. With not all reports in as yet we can publish the grand total of 801 people baptized this summer in America and Canada.

We should really rejoice brethren that in this rushing, climactic end time we at Ambassador College have had the opportunity to serve so many. We should be thankful that all the baptising tours have been safely completed.

ITALIAN WORK **BEGINS**



Our energetic office staff has won another battle against the waste of time, money, and man-power. They have procured the IBM 403 Alphabetical Accounting Machine which automatically totals and checks co-worker donations. As cards are inserted into this striking mechanism, receipts are AUTOMATICALLY MADE AND MAILED OUT the same day!

Then the cards enter a Sorter, where they are alphabetized, and returned to an Interpreter along with ledger cards from co-worker files. The Interpreter inspects the cards and posts the date, amount, type of donation, etc. on the ledger cards.
