

# Portune Philippine Report Just Released

San Nicolas, Mr. Ortiguero's home, is five agonizing hours north of Manila over one of the ruttiest, dustiest, humanityladen roads ever made.

Mr. Waterhouse and I left our hotel in Manila at midnight and took a wheezing taxi to the Pantranco bus terminal. Our bus wasn't really a bus, but rather a unique affair made like a huge wooden box with built in benches, perched on a two-ton truck chassis. The long drive was a nightmare of near collisions with busses, autos, bicyles, ox-carts, human pigs, chickens and other miscellaneous obstacles Despite the harrowing experience and the hardness of the seats, we arrived at San Nicolas at 6 o'clock a.m. just as the remote little village was awakening.

"Downtown" San Nicolas is actually a one block long assemblage of weather - worn boards and corrugated iron, fashioned together into a semblance of a few little "shops" and places to buy "things." The streets are dirt. Litter and refuse abound! Two Americans at 6 o'clock a. m. with baggage and briefcases-dressed in business suits-are quite a spectacle and worthy of not a few quizzical and startled stares.

Mr. Ortiguero's home is a "stand out" in San Nicolas. In the past year, he has remodeled and improved his home to where it is a fine example to the town and those who live around him. It is constructed of Philippine mahogany, split bamboo and other native materials. We were warmly welcomed by the whole family and enjoyed a breakfast of pineapple juice, rice, chicken and tea.

Sabbath services began at 9 o'clock a. m in a little building constructed of native materials --by the people themselves.

Services began with the people singing several hymns in their native tongue. The theme was almost childlike with a thread of emotionalism running through it. Mr. (Cont. Page Four)

**World Watch** 

Before the government "pay-out" counters line up nearly five-and-a-half million Americans each week--the unemployed in our otherwise-affluent society. For many, the six-month monetary handout has ended. Some of these go on to take dole from the government's surplus larder; others take more drastic measures, as revealed in the latest FBI crime statistics. Heading the list is not murder, not rape or assult, but property crimes--robberies, burglaries, larcenies. Robberies increased a fantastic 18%, compared with a 4% rise in murder.

In an attempt to cloak vice in an evening gown, Philadelphia is seriously considering making prostitution legal. The recommendation, described as "liberal and practical thinking," is an unprecedented move in the United States.

Unswayed by outspoken voices in the dental profession, bulbous, cavity-laden Americans gorged themselves on three billion pounds of candy last year. Working feverishly, it would take dentists two whole years to fill our 700 million cavities.

Don't be surprised if you get handed a scraggly orange in the Mayfair breakfast line, because you are living in the midst of a drought--the L. A. area's driest winter in 13 years. Crop damage has already soared into the millions, with total destruction looming for some Southland regions unless rain comes. Citrus fruits are a quarter to a third normal size.

In the Middle-East, medical experts are embroiled in a pitched battle with a new disease--"African Sickness." An insectborne, animal-killing virus, it has slaughtered 50,000 horses in Iran alone, half of that country's equine population. Hundreds of thousands of horses, mules and donkeys have perished in a wide area spreading from Turkey eastward into Asia. The Euphrates River has so many dead animals floating in it, that it looks "like a battlefield, "said one veterinarian. The disease is threatening to spread into southeastern Europe. The Balkan countries, heavily dependent upon animals for agriculture, are sweating it out.

Nations south of the border, feeling their independent oats, are criticizing President Kennedy's reaffirmation of the Monroe Doctrine. "We don't want you telling us who our enemies should be," exclaims the South American press.

All this does speed up production, but at the expense of the hen who now lasts only one third the life time of a normal chicken and produces eggs of doubtful value, to


say the least.

Three main factors contributed to this success. One was Mr. Reiner's persis-







Although they are able to speak simply in English, they are not able to follow the continuity and deep meaning of a sermon. Mr. Ortiguero summarized our messages and translated them into Ilocano.

For Mr. Waterhouse and I, this was one of the most difficult speaking assignments we ever have had. There isn't the intimate contact you are used to having with the people. You sense that they "aren't getting it" and you try to put more drive into the message, and yet it simply has no effect.

During the services -- while we were speaking--several birds flew through the open walls chirping as they went; a rooster walked through the open door and pecked at crumbs on a dirt floor; a neighborhood dog came in and sat down for a while and then left--all the while the sound of barking dogs, playing children and the general suburban Philippine living came wafting in through the open walls. This was Sabbath servises -- San Nicolas style. After services we visited with the people. We found them to be warm and friendly--yet just like little children. The depth and impact of the Gospel has not yet really reached their minds. The barrier of ignorance and degeneration of many generations is going to take time and patience to penetrate. We will have to go slowly, teaching and educating as we go.

Satan has done his work well. He has blinded the minds of these people through poverty, ignorance and aeons of wrong concepts and teachings. Our job is going to be BIG. The fruits of our labors in the Philippines will be small indeed for now. The really big work for the Philippines will be in the world tomorrow--when Jesus Christ returns and when these peoples' minds can be unshackled from the fetters of ignorance and blindness.

As we left to board the bus for the long five hour drive to Manila, Mr. Ortiguero and his entire family came down to stand outside the door of their home to pose for a picture and bid us a warm goodbye.

We all need to pray fervently that God will give us understanding and wisdom in helping those who He is calling in the Philippine Islands at this time.
