Carroll Miller proposed to Peggy McGill—she accepted, and he presented her with an engagement ring! Now they're planning a June wedding.

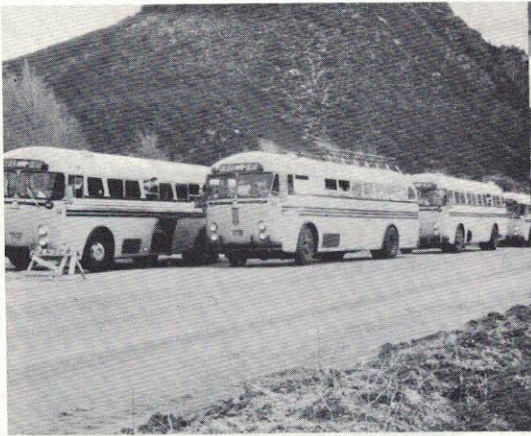

Pestana and Davies is a small but enthusiastic staff of Portugese students who search out vital articles from Portugese newspapers in order to build a useful filing system patterned after the one in our News Bureau.

## German Broadcast Now Beamed Into The Heartland Of Assyria!

For the first time since Jonah preached repentance to the ancient Assyrians, they are again receiving warning!

*Die Welt von Morgen* is growing in influence and listener interest. From a mere 21 letter response to that first challenging 15 minutes on the first Sunday in 1961, we are now receiving about 90 letters per program. We have heard from every European country with the exception of Bulgaria, Portugal, and Spain.

"Thank you for your interesting broadcast even if it does come from London . . . Your broadcast comes from London; I didn't know you people were interested in us!" the Germans write in response to the broadcast. Some have claimed they could listen to our theme song, "Daughter of Zion" by Handel, all day long.

Last summer the unusual, provocative, high-quality *Die Reine Wahrheit*—German version of the PLAIN TRUTH—made its historic debut. It is sent not only to our European mailing list, but also to over 600 in North and Central America.

God's truth in written form manages to penetrate the Iron Curtain. From time to time when it doesn't, we usually receive a letter from an avid reader

who has enclosed a *Beschlagnahmeprotokoll* — a confiscation notice. The D.D.R. (German Democratic Republic) considers our literature "anti-democratic."

The general overseer of the entire department is the inspiring Mr. Hoeh. The voice of the broadcast is that of Prussian-born Erhard Klammer. In charge of the mailing and publishing department is Robert Neitsch. Pecking away precisely, thoughtfully and methodically on the "IBM Executive" is Donna Fink. Ruth Neitsch and Bill Eastburn contribute their talents as well.

Doing the bulk of the German translations at present is Mr. Jebens. Mr.

In addition we will face problems peculiar to Europe and we have already had one question: "I realize we should keep the Sabbath. What should I do with our children? They attend school five and a half days per week!"

All of us can rejoice to learn that six repentant individuals were baptized by Mr. Gerhard Marx and Mr. Gunar Freibergs on their baptizing tour last summer. Six issues of the magazine dealing with basic doctrines as well as booklets on the subjects of Healing, Divorce and Remarriage, Purpose of Life, Suffering, Fear, etc., have already been published.

Several men pried his fingers loose enough to reveal a tiny wound from a small piece of shrapnel that had pierced his cheek. He demanded a jeep and driver, and ignoring the dying men writhing on the floor, was rushed back to the Field Hospital. There, he was promptly bandaged and a "purple heart ribbon" pinned to his breast, then he was ordered back to duty.

Hours later, he was back with us. Something had been added—but something, also, was missing—his pride in his "star."

Suddenly the colonel had become human! The ultimate in change had occurred. Instead of arrogant confidence, there was compassion. The impossible had happened. He helped; he encouraged, and he even lit a cigarette for a wounded man on a litter!
