Thousands Take **Bible Course**

Around the world, total enrollment in the Course is about 45,000 at present. This does not include the thousands who have started the Course and then quit it. In the United States 38,200 students are on the Bible Course mailing list! This compares to 31,200 the same month last year-an increase of a steady 23%! Requests for Lesson One in October ran about 2400, about the same as October last year.

TEN THOUSAND people have completed all the lessons through Lesson 28.

The present Correspondence Course enrollment figure is a FAR CRY from the number who began the Course back in 1954, in December! After being advertised for months over The World Tomorrow program, 8200 people started the Course! Since then the TOTAL EN-ROLLMENT HAS SURGED FOUR HUNDRED SEVENTY-FIVE PER CENT! That is no small figure!

SEVEN people are now employed writing and mailing the Bible Course to its thousands of students! This number includes the head of the department, Dr. C. Paul Meredith, two assistant writers, two full-time men who handle the mailing end of the department, and two lovely young girls who assist them.

Editorial

What Is Real Leadership?

In a recent forum to the Imperial students, Mr. Ted Armstrong discussed leadership. Here is a part of his talk from the original transcription. The principles apply to us at Ambassador College.

I would like to talk to you a little bit about leadership.

Whatever you do—don't sell it short! Don't think little—THINK BIG! You know, Volkswagen ads come out now and they have real cute ads—they put on these big billboards, "Think small." Now let's don't do that . . . just because we are small—let's think BIG

Think not of what is the job NOW but think of what it can BECOME!! Very rare is any employee or personage in any capacity and even in God's Work who is thinking not of the job he is doing today—but how he can grow with his job and make that job even bigger. How he can himself become capable of taking more responsibility.

I don't think many of our bookkeepers or accountants are studying bookkeeping or accounting and trying to work toward getting a CPA. I don't think they are taking books home at night and burning the midnight oil and thinking, "How I can grow in capacity so I can save God's Work money." "How can I figure this angle and that, perfectly legally of course in every way, cut corners here and there to become more efficient in my job?"

Most of us, being human tend to settle down in our jobs and to accept the way things are instead of having the vision to see the way they are going to be!

Now . . . why should you want to develop leadership in the first place? Let's clear the air on that point—so you can become popular—so you can belong to a certain clique or group of people who are well thought of—so you can be outstanding, or what? What is the purpose of developing leadership in the first place?

Now most of you at this juncture—can't see beyond the next few months or few years, at the very outside—so to talk to you about home and children and responsibilities and high offices and perhaps the ministry or something else later on, wouldn't mean a great deal.

But leadership is NOT being in front of the public eye! Leadership does not constitute being loud-mouthed. It doesn't constitute always being in the thick of things. It doesn't constitute merely managing a committee.

Leadership is not the person who gets to serve the pie at the all-day Holy Day or Feast. It isn't the person who gets to put up the crepe paper decorations at the dance. That isn't necessarily leadership. There's the person you remember in the high school you came from where it seemed like certain ones were always so absolutely active you couldn't name a committee they weren't on—they were on every committee and they fancied that that is leadership. Not necessarily—it could be.

But leadership can be a very quiet, faithful, loyal, obedient, diligent, disciplined, doing what you are supposed to do WHEN you are supposed to do it!

Consequently this station is most practical for our purpose.



Carelessness Is Death

It was the last day of the deer hunting season—a long, dry, fruitless hunting season. I had spent hours puffing up and down California mountainsides in vain. But this last day of hunting was full of promise. It was crisp and cool. A light snow had fallen a few days earlier but had now melted except in heavily wooded areas near the mountaintop.

We drove up a long, difficult road to the very top. We knew we were the only hunters in the area. There were no tracks of other cars or men.

Full of expectation, I walked off into a thick, promising area away from the others in our party. I liked the idea of being alone. There was less chance of making that tell-tale noise which would send deer scurring away unseen behind the brush. Deer tracks were not plentiful, but here and there nice, large ones were visible in the snow. After I had traveled a safe distance from the other hunters I settled down to more serious hunting, moving only occasionally and as quietly as possible.

A Sudden Stirring

All at once I heard the bushes crackle ahead. Then everything was quiet again. I waited motionlessly, hoping whatever it was might soon make an appearance.

Minutes dragged by. Finally the crackle of the snow and the movement of a limb told me my quarry was still there. By its action I knew it was a deer. It was too big to be a squirrel or porcuppine. It could not possibly be a man in this isolated spot. I only needed to determine whether it was a buck or a doe.

I raised my gun slowly to my shoulder, remembering that this may be my last chance of the season. At best I would have only a quick, fleeting glance before the shot because of the thickness of the brush and the closeness of the quarry. My rifle had a scope. This fact added to my apprehension because of the shortness of range. The field of view of the scope would be so restricted that when the deer stepped into the open I would only see a blotch of gray side or



perhaps a shoulder. I would have to move the scope about until the head came into view to make certain it was a buck. Would there be time?

Shoot First, Ask Questions Later

Killing a doe is illegal in California, but I can remember it ran through my mind in that split second, "Why take a chance on losing out by waiting to determine the sex before shooting? Why not follow the practice which many hunters are reported to do—shoot first and count the horns later."

Another twig moved. I could all but see it now. The twig and the movement were centered in the scope. I made sure the safety was off. My finger came out from behind the trigger guard and onto the trigger, I thought of caution—but, no need of caution here! I was alone on this side of the mountain. Then suddenly the bush swung back. Out into the open not thirty feet away, STEPPED MY SON!

It would have been very hard to anticipate that my son would decide at the last moment to take a short-cut in order to catch up with his dad. That he would overshoot his mark and be silently waiting for me in a scrub oak thicket. I cannot help but shudder at the horrible situation. Just the pressure of my finger on a ready trigger would have meant tragedy!

When in the woods, or whatever you are doing, BE CAREFUL! The life you take may be your own.

Handball Courts Near Completion
