
Messrs. Meredith, Hill Plan Summer Four-Continent Tour

Forty-nine days AROUND THE WORLD! This jet-powered schedule will whisk away two of God's ministers, Mr. Roderick C. Meredith and Mr. David Jon Hill, July 11.

The pair will visit FOUR CONTINENTS on the global fact-finding tour. The main purpose of the trip is to converse with natives on a grass-roots level with the hope of personal interviews, and to investigate world conditions firsthand. The background material thus obtained will be used in future PLAIN TRUTH articles and college classes.

After stopovers in Greece and Turkey the two will spend a *full month* in the ever-seething Middle East, visiting Egypt—focal point of the new UAR, Jerusalem—divided by a wall of hate like that in Berlin, and PETRA—ghost




