## **Building Program Gains Momentum** As Gym Foundation Is Laid

Work on the new gymnasium is progressing very rapidly. Over the past two and one-half weeks plans for the entire gym-swimming pool complex have been completed and submitted to the city supervisors for final permission to begin construction.

Already the old buildings standing on Terrace and Grove streets have been totally demolished. Now preparations for the foundation are under way. Since the earth the gym is to be supported on is composed of loose fill, several gigantic holes approximately thirty feet deep have to be dug. These will be filled with concrete to add to the foundation of the new building. Then as soon as the foundation is laid-direct construction of the building will start.

What a tremendous building it is

going to be! It is to be the finest gymnasium in Southern California. Although there are other gyms that are larger, as far as quality is concerned, (Continued on page 7)

Then with graphic words and pointed questions he flashed us up through the next eight, ten, twenty and fifty years to all eternity. Every student left that forum feeling like he had been sitting in front of a gigantic cinemascope, technicolor motion picture screen of his own future! It was inspiring. It made everyone of us stop and say in his own mind, "Let's go. Let's get on the ball!"


A question for you to answer. Do you still feel inspired? Can you still see that technicolor reproduction of your future? Or has it blurred and faded into the recesses of your mind?

If it has—why?? The answer to that question is a vital key to your progress in Ambassador College. # Magnificent Dual-Purpose Auditorium Next on Ambassador Building Program

On January 20, 1964, Mr. Herbert W. Armstrong sent out an URGENT five-page letter to all members of the Radio Church of God. Contained in the letter was the THRILLING news of the building of THE HOUSE OF GOD right here on the Ambassador College campus!

"Thus saith the LORD of hosts; consider your ways. Go up to the mountain, and bring wood, and build the house; and I will take pleasure in it, and I will be glorified, saith the ETERNAL.

"Then Zerubbabel . . . with all the remnant of the people OBEYED the voice of the LORD their God . . . And the LORD stirred up the spirit of Zerubbabel . . . and the spirit of all the remnant of the people; and they came and did the work in the house of the Eternal of hosts, their God."

During the Ministerial Conference, Mr. Armstrong came to the realization of the full meaning of the book of Haggai and its application. This message is for God's Church today!

We have been planning to build, first, buildings for college use and delaying the building of God's House. With this newest revelation, changes in the building program are taking place.

A 1,200 seat auditorium is being designed by the *largest* firm of architects and engineers in the world, D.M.J.M. The auditorium will serve a dual purpose—the meeting place of God's Headquarters Church and an assembly hall for Forums and Assemblies. No longer will we have to meet in stuffy, overcrowded halls and lodge buildings.

God's House *cannot* be a cheap, rickety, cracker-box shack — nor will it be a super-structure, jewel-studded Temple. A middle ground has to be struck—with the emphasis on CHARACTER and QUALITY.

In Mr. Armstrong's words: "This HOUSE FOR GOD TO DWELL IN, at His Headquarters for this earth, MUST be started before this year is over!"







In England, Larry will be the advisor for *The* ENVOY as well as teaching journalism class.


