The greatest deluge of mail ever is flooding Mail Receiving Department. Interesting Figures, Check Them!

A recent check with the Registrar's office has provided *The* PORTFOLIO with some interesting facts and figures about this year's incoming class.

For you mathematicians interested in twelves, sevens, threes and combinations of these numbers, the following statistics should prove interesting.

Of the over 800 applications sent out, 450 completed applications were returned to the College. If you will notice this is 4 plus 5 plus 0 which equals 9, *three* to its squared power. Now in classes are 70 freshmen women (7 times 10) and 70 freshmen men (7 times 10) and 7 married men, for a total of 147 freshmen—21 times 7!

In Texas, the preliminary count was 28 women (4 times 7) and 28 men (4 times 7), with 21 instructors for the third college beginning its first year in Texas, which incidentally, was the 28th state admitted to the union (4 times 7) in 1845 which adds up to 18 (6 times 3).

If numbers mean anything, then this really must be adding up to be a great year!


Janet
