Upon arrival they are carefully checked by our monitor co-ordinator,


Mr. Marion McNair. Especially noted are discrepancies involving program order which are harmful in retaining audience interest.

With nearly a third of the annual budget going into radio broadcasting, an alert *monitor system* is *vital*. It is a serious task—yet the team of church members and reliable co-workers who fill this function do so without *any* remuneration.

They regard their great responsibility as a tremendous OPPORTUNITY — a chance to *help* and *serve!* And they make up the *special andience* of *The* WORLD TOMORROW!

"Is the *turtle* gassed up." (*Turtle* is a slang term for *tamper*!)


"Yes!" was the eager cry.



BASKETBALL IN REVIEW

The Juniors clinched the basketball tournament Sunday with an 80-61 victory over the Faculty. Their record stands at 9-0 contrasted to the Faculty's 6-3 with one meeting left between the two squads. All other action is completed. A last game loss to the Juniors will throw the Faculty into a 3-way tie for second place with the Sophomores and Freshmen.

The Freshman five finally put the damper on a six game Faculty winning streak—69-61. Mr. Armstrong poured in 21 points for the losers, but it wasn't enough to offset Nelson Haas' solid 28. To further consternate the floundering Faculty, the Sophomores nipped them 71-69 in a squeaker; the Juniors 80-61 in a run-away.

And the Juniors kept rolling . . . not only wanting to protect their impeccable record, the Junior squad seems determined to rewrite all the record books. They buried the Seniors under an avalanche 112-45 with six men hitting double figures and Petty, Pyle and Croswell over 20!

Then they yawningly took on the Freshmen only to find themselves in dire straits 68-68 with a minute left!! A couple of rapid-fire fast breaks turned the tide in time to preserve their record—BARELY. Jim Petty led scorers with a whopping 31 points.

Finishing strong, the Sophomores won three games, the unprecedented victory over the Faculty giving them impetus to coast over the Seniors 75-60 in a free-wheeling contest. Jerry Baker racked up 28 points and Ken Westby reinjured a bothersome knee but it wasn't good enough. In a "slaughter" they called out the bench jockeys and still mercilessly mangled the woebegone graduates 94-56.

The Seniors finally settled the cellar-door question by vanquishing the Graduates 61-30 to wind up their season with a 2-8 record. The Freshmen planted flowers on the Graduate grave 62-50 and sealed the tomb at 0-10 for the season.
