# Intercollegiate Basketball Plans Nearly Complete

Conditions "just worked out" that Ambassador College was to build a gymnasium as its first major construction.

The idea of forming a basketball team to fill the gymnasium occurred and was adopted. As Mr. Jim Petty, the newly-appointed coach, began immediately to schedule games, conditions again "unfolded" in our favor. Most teams schedule their games long before April and May. But here was a fledgling, unheard - of competitor called Ambassador College trying to work out a schedule with already established, reputable colleges. It "so happened" that many top caliber teams needed one more game to round out their schedules and that those open dates they needed to fill dove-tailed precisely with our own scheduling. One coach looked over our schedule, saw some of the top teams listed, and commented: "You have pretty big aspirations there."

To build a reputation, you have to play reputable teams. Included in our probable twenty-game schedule (of which 17 games are confirmed) are such impressive small college names as Whittier, Caltech, Occidental, Claremont, and St. Michael's from Santa Fe, New Mexico. St. Michael's won the New Mexico Conference two years ago!


Several trips are scheduled for the two-and-one-half month basketball season which lasts from December to mid-February. They include a four to five day trip to Salt Lake City, Utah, during the semester break for two games and week-end jaunts to Phoenix, Sacramento, and Las Vegas. St. Michael's will be in our own 1,478 seat gymnasium for "homecoming" during the semester break. Another possible highlight of the season will be the "equipo" from The University of Mexico who barnstormed Central and South America last year and will be touring the United States this year.



of the past. Yearbook covers have fallen into a rut over the years, until now when *The* ENVOY is blazing the trail for recapturing *true values* of artistic quality.



bray herself — began her fascinating life's story.

"I was a fisherman's daughter in Cape Breton," Mrs. Mann recalls. "When I was a girl, I helped at home all the time. We'd work very hard—but as soon as chores were done, we played—the whole peninsula of us."

Her schooling in Canada completed, Mrs. Mann journeyed to Boston, Massachusetts, where she began a busy job of taking care of children. From Boston, Mrs. Mann traveled to Michigan, finally settling in Detroit.

"In Detroit I first heard about an Anglo-Saxon Israel movement. It was interesting, and I began to study my Bible a bit. They seemed to have a little truth—but only a little."

After some 12 years in Michigan, Mrs. Mann crossed the country to live with her sister in California, where, interestingly enough, the Anglo-Saxon Israel movement in which she was interested had a branch office, in Los Angeles.

But Mrs. Mann's stay in California wasn't long. One day she happened to read an important ad in a local paper—an ad which was to eventually *change* ber entire life!

"It was about Mr. Armstrong. He was holding meetings in Eugene, Oregon, at that time, and the ad said that he was preaching the *truth* concerning Israel. I asked my brother-in-law to find Mr. Armstrong for me—and he did! It was then, in the early 40's, that I moved to Eugene."

"I began to do odd jobs here and there—I even worked in the office reading mail!"

When it came to the Feast time, Mrs. Mann would journey to Belnap Springs to help there. Soon questions about a college arose, and Mr. Armstrong saw the need of starting Ambassador College.

"Mr. Armstrong asked if I would be *House Mother* when the College began. It was August 11, 1949 when I came to live on campus. I've lived here ever since."



# Transportation Dept. Serves God's Work

After two years of hard driving by God's ministers, fantastic records were set by twenty-one '62 Dodge Darts and Chrysler 300s which arrived in Pasadena when the 1964 Ministerial Conference began. The total mileage of these twenty-one cars, which had rolled over the highways and by-ways of the United States, was OVER 1½ MILLION MILES—a distance comparable to SIX TRIPS TO THE MOON AND BACK.

Some of these cars, which are only a portion of the cars which are returned to Pasadena every year for replacement had been driven 100 THOUSAND MILES AND MORE during their time in the field. 100 thousand miles they were pretty tired."

In place of the faithful fleet of '62s, twenty-one NEW CARS now roll back and forth in the various church areas. Like any novice who has undertaken a new assignment, Mr. Roemer says, "They haven't proven themselves yet. But if they can match the '62s, they're GOOD CARS."


