In Big Sandy, Texas, preparations are feverishly being made for the beginning of the THIRD Ambassador College. Staggering growth in God's work points up the need for expansion as Festival attendance grows by thousands annually.

From our own Portfolio Ambassador-on-the-spot, we present a progress report on Ambassador College, Big Sandy, Texas.

"GREETINGS from beautiful East Texas! You will no doubt be interested in the progress that is being made here by the work of the students during the summer. Most of the work we are doing is not on the college itself. We are actually preparing the way for the biggest Feast of Tabernacles yet!

"There are twenty-five or so students on the grounds who are being employed by the Work. Eight of us are engaged

in clearing land in the Pine Forest for new camping areas for the forth-coming Feast.

"The Pine Forest was planted under a government soil-bank program some seven years ago in a reforestation program. Under this program the owner furnished the land and the government furnished the trees with a certain subsidy. After ten years the owner would have been able to do as he saw fit with the trees, but we purchased this property last year, terminating the contract. In our case, some two thousand people will be able to call is area 'home' during the Feast of Tabernacles!

"Two or three other students are working on the plumbing-painting crew. They are primarily installing the plumbing fixtures in the new Imperial



Library Lookout




Two of the most interesting tomes ever to cross the processing desk of our library have recently been added to our stacks. For a thorough and pictorial account of Mormonism, take time to look up *The Mormon Story* by Rulon S. Howells.

This volume is one of the most complete on the subject, covering Joseph Smith, his vision, the exodus from Illinois, and arrival in Salt Lake Valley, the cricket plague, and Mormon colonization of the West. It also brings us up to date with what has been happening of late such as, the choir, missionary work, educational standards, and the articles of faith. The book is crammed with pictures and even shows a rare view of the characters on the gold plates from which the Book of Mormon was translated!

Just to whet your appetite here is a sample of Joseph Smith's own storyin his words, "I had scarcely kneeled down when immediately I was seized upon by some power which entirely overcame me, and had such an astonishing influence over me as to bind my tongue so that I could not speak. Thick darkness gathered around me, and it seemed to me for a time as if I were doomed to sudden destruction. But exerting all my power to call upon God to deliver me out of the power of this enemy which had seized upon me, and at the very moment when I was ready to sin to despair and abandon myself to destruction-not to an imaginary ruin, but to the power of some actual being from the unseen world, who had such marvelous power as I had never before felt in any

House Leveling Proceeds on Campus

With a *cloud of dust* and a *crash* of *timber*, the scenery at Ambassador College took on a new look! The Vernon-Del Mar block isn't what it used to be!

EIGHT houses—including two on Grove Street—became splinters and kindling under the tracks of a D-9 (D for Destruction) bulldozer. As a matter of fact, only four edifices are left on the Vernon-Del Mar block: the Handball Courts, the newly constructed gymnasium, Vernon-Del Mar dormitory, and Mr. Barrett's small abode. The dormitory was preserved to house students again this coming school year.

The whole program of eliminating these houses is part of the Master Plan for further development of athletic facilities and landscaping. A softball diamond, tennis courts, and a longer track are planned as replacements for the evacuated areas.





As the afternoon waned many felt a gnawing sensation within them—HUN-GER PANGS!



Her clear treatment and explicit description allow readers to penetrate both the lore and mystery of each country, bringing to life the signs, colors and sensations of religious rituals and traditional holidays. An interesting sidelight is that Miss Dobler is on the staff of *Scholastic Magazine*—which is used in most elementary schools!
