# BIBLE STORY RECEIVES A WARM RECEPTION




### **Library Outlook**

This apartment has a bedroom for five students in the southeast corner, one for four at the southwest corner, and two smaller bedrooms with spaces for three in the northwest corner.





Last week's play saw them shellac the Graduates 81-44. The turning point of the game was when the Juniors won the tip-off, scored the first bucket-the rest was sheer havoc.

The Freshmen are still clinging desperately to third place, having barely squeaked by the Seniors in an exciting contest. Coach Westby with a twisted knee directed from the bench as Paul Flatt and Jerry Baker found the touch and poured the ball through the hoop.

Ragged defense and mostly-miss offense rendered the Freshmen ineffective. They won by only 3 points! To add to their consternation, a fired-up Sophomore five thumped them soundly 87-69. The Sophomores had an exceptional night from the field, hitting 65% of their outside shots in the first half to build up an impassable 20point lead which they clung tenaciously to throughout the game.

In other action the Juniors and Sophomores squared off in what proved to be one of the most foulridden games of the year. Four men fouled out and the game degenerated into a defensive fiasco. At half-



time the score was knotted at a lowly 28-28, but somehow climbed to 78-63 Juniors by the final horn. The last five minutes were a mad scramble which saw neither team score over six points.

Still struggling, the Seniors and Graduates were both 0-2 for the week with 1-5 and 0-7 over-all records respectively. The cellar door is still up for grabs as they meet once more in the final round of play.


was informed that he was to be sent again to Düsseldorf on February 25. This good news had the couple scurrying about preparing for their return trip.

Their work consists of answering letters, mailing booklets and keeping subscription files of the German edition of The PLAIN TRUTH which is printed at Bricket Wood, England.





### The B.C. -- A.D. Controversy

It's the talk of the campus! It's revolutionary!

Students of the second year Bible class were expected to figure 2520 years, using A.D. and B.C. figures. *The* PORTFOLIO, always concerned with campus problems and willing to lend "the helping hand," offers this time-saving explanation.

First, realize that there is no year zero. Second, there are two year 1's, 1 B.C. and 1 A.D. Calculating 2520 years from 539 B.C. or 718 B.C. you come up with 1981 and 1802. Since there is no year zero and two year 1's, you must

add *one* as you subtracted in going from B.C. to A.D.

The rule is: when you add, you subtract and when you subtract, you add! Now, 1802 plus 1 equals 1803 and 1981 plus 1 (you subtracted before) is 1982 minus 7 (number of perfection) equals 1975, which when added together amounts to 22 (three 7's and a 1, whatever that means).

In summary, remember 1 B.C. and 1 A.D. and no year zero, so in going from 1 to 1 with no year none, you add because you subtracted—except when you subtract because you added.
