Mail Receiving Adopts New Reading System

Mail Reading has taken a GIANT step forward! The Mail Receiving Department, under the direction of Mr. John Wilson, has just launched a two-week project to speed literature to interested radio listeners the same day their request reaches our offices! This immediate service has been impossible for years under the system that was being used to mail out the requests.

Intensive work and study went into this new project before it was finally launched. The basic idea developed from a suggestion made by Marion McNair perhaps two years ago. Practically the entire staff of the department collaborated to finally bring the idea to fruition. But Mr. Gary Sefcak's idea of having the reader indicate the symbol of a requested article directly on a manila envelope that will go directly to interested radio listeners is one of the main time-savers. Under our old process our readers indicated this symbol on the front of the envelope that the request letter came in. The symbol had to be subsequently transferred to a manila envelope by a typist or keypunch operator and checked by a verifier.

The new process consists of: reading the letter and coding a manila envelope, addressing the envelope, and filling it with the requested literature, all in one continuous operation. Listeners receive (Continued on page 7)

Conference Reviews 1964: The Million-Dollar Year

Plans 1965 Growth

Last morth concluded the biggest year yet in the Work of God! 1964 was an austere year—a year in which it was imperative that God's Work build a total working capital of one million dollars.

made. Cut-backs were instituted, and although the Work by no means stopped growing, unnecessary growth was curtailed.

And then God began to bless us! Stop and think of all the GIGANTIC steps that have been taken by this Work in just the last one year.

First of all, God allowed us to build that million dollar bank account as a cushion for any sudden demand. For the first time in the history of this Work we are operating with a *one million dollar working capital*. But our blessings didn't stop with the accomplishment of just that one necessary goal!

The next blessing was the acquisition of the web-fed press on which we are running The PLAIN TRUTH magazine right on our own campus grounds! This represented a huge expense for the Work. But with the expense came many other blessings. For one thing, that press will pay for itself in just a few years! It also simplifies matters in publishing what is the most amazing and eye-opening magazine on this earth!

Presently we are printing in our own shop a magazine with a circulation of over half a million! The GOOD NEWS has gone full color on the cover signature. We printed 250,000 copies of a three hundred and forty page BOOK by Mr. Armstrong. And all of this isn't mentioning the tremendous growth in the number of booklets and reprint

Editorial

Wouldn't You Be Different?

What if YOU had to write this editorial? How would you try to put into words the need for more hard work by God's students?

Each student ought to ask himself that question—"How would I inspire others to work harder?" Because that question and how it is answered is going to determine the future of each Ambassador College student.

On Monday we will begin the second semester of the 1964-65 school year. For some, this will be the last semester of college for the rest of your lives! And for many others, this coming four-and-one-half months is going to decide whether you will be back to begin another year next fall. Did you ever ask how your NEED to return to or to graduate from Ambassador College is measured?

By need, I mean, why do you need to attend college, or why do you need to graduate from college?

Right away you can see that good grades alone don't create the real need. Once you graduate, your grade-making days are past. From then on your progress is measured in a different way. But how thoroughly *do you learn* your present class material?

You women—are you learning to be truly feminine, and have you learned to be a good conversationalist and a helpful date? Could you be a real help in a local area?

You men—are you learning to be good leaders, helpful to your dorm mates, encouraging to the co-eds? Are your speeches improving each time you give one in club or in class? Are people starting to consider you a campus leader?

If so, fine. But what's a good speech or a good date going to do for you once you graduate?

You're no doubt three steps ahead of me already. Because you know that ALL OF THESE THINGS ARE IMPORTANT. And unless you are *steadily* improving in each separate detail of college life—whether it be study, dating, sports, Bible knowledge, social functions, or any other part—unless you are growing in *everything* you will not be called upon to be an Ambassador of God's Work!

For each of you there is a time coming when you will no longer be a student. You're here so that you can leave—so that you can be a servant. You need to graduate so you can help teach others the things you have learned.

Are you going to be able to convince them of the need to work, and to work hard? Would you be able to inspire others to learn how to date, how to give a good speech, how to play clean ball, how to study their Bibles enough and properly, how to be good husbands or helpful wives, how to become stronger leaders to help set up the world of tomorrow?

Students, you're answering that question right now in your conduct this second semester of this school year. If you're doing well in all of these things, then you will soon be facing the necessity of getting out and helping others to experience the same happiness. But if you're not undergoing some major changes in character, a tremendous increase in your wealth of knowledge, and if you're not becoming just plain level-headed and CONVERTED, then you'll never need to graduate. You simply don't NEED to attend college! Because you aren't fitting yourself with the tools that DEMAND graduation: character, drive, leadership, knowledge, wisdom and maturity!

So, what if you had to write this editorial? Wouldn't you see the need to *change*, and change faster than ever before in your life? Yes, you would! And if you were faced Monday with graduation, wouldn't you want to be different? Ambassadors, get started NOW, *this semester!*

Face It Alone?

Ever thought of the problems you would encounter in making thirty thousand cups of coffee in a period of less than 24 hours? That includes heating 12,050 gallons of water. Now that you have the water hot, you need about fifty men to sell this coffee to cold people. The men come easily—Freshman men from Ambassador College.


The cold people? You have to go find them. They will be mixed in with the one million people lining Pasadena's Rose Parade route. They come at sunset on December 31 and camp out all night on the streets and sidewalks along the parade route, shivering in thirty-degree weather.

After a while they get hungry, so why don't you feed them? They'll eat about 2,800 roast beef sandwiches, 8,000 hot dogs and about 7,000 donuts. You let the college girls make the sandwiches and hot dogs. Use the same 50 men to sell the food along with hot, steaming coffee. If you sell everything, the total profit will figure an average of \$24 for every student on campus.

To help matters, set up six food and

drink stands along the parade route. Get some of the merchants along the route to allow you the privilege of setting up stands on their property. Talk to such people as the owner of the El Rancho supermarket, and the railroad people who own some property by the tracks just below the campus. Set up a double-sized stand in front of Mr. Norman Smith's home.

Now, to be sure you have all the business you can handle, set up two stands by the corner where nation-wide television cameras are set up, and the parade begins. Place the stands on opposite corners so you can cover all available trade on both sides of the street.

Have a campus that is the largest single piece of property along the parade route and you can have someone set up stands along the street. He'll pay you for it, of course. Not to neglect the fact that you can park hundreds of cars on campus for about three dollars a parking place. You won't even have to worry about selling the spaces. Everyone wants one!

Now, add a few more men in the stands to show people to their seats and to take tickets as the people come in. He'll even pay each man. What is left with the proceeds you can take the whole college on educational and entertaining excursions throughout the Southern California area. Sounds like a great idea, doesn't it?

Street Closure-A Reality!

One of the most gratifying events in the history of Ambassador College occurred on the 22nd of December, 1964. And in the process, the college was enabled to save multiple thousands of dollars! That day at City Hall in Pasadena, we received tentative approval for the closing of Mentoria Court and Camden Drive!

Everything that happened was a literal, tangible, almost overwhelming answer to prayer! The presentation of our proposal to close the streets was received with favor and no opposition by the city's Board of Directors. No opposition made this a most startling event that morning! Where we had ex-

pected many not to want this allowed—there was no one who opposed. In fact, only three local citizens came to the hearing. The two that spoke were completely behind the project!

Then came the second pleasant surprise. The cost of the entire project to Ambassador College to close the streets themselves, would be approximately one-fifth of the expected cost!

All that now remains is final approval by the Board of Directors, and that is expected momentarily. And within the next few weeks, the Building Program will be in full swing again as the Dining Hall is rushed to completion, followed by the auditorium.

Students, let's be extremely thankful for this tremendous blessing because without it, Ambassador College would have had to slow growth.

Chorale Visits Bakersfield

The Ambassador College Chorale is on the move! With one concert already behind them, enthusiastic Chorale members boarded Bakersfield-bound buses on January 2, 1965. In spite of their long and tiring work hours the day before for the Rose Parade, the smiling students eagerly anticipated this opportunity to sing. Brethren from the Fresno area came to Bakersfield, making a total of over 300 to hear the Chorale.

For the special music during the Sabbath service, people were moved by the very inspiring and stirring numbers, The Lord's Prayer and The Battle Hymn of the Republic.

In the evening there was a Church Social with dinner, dancing, and the special attraction of the evening—a Chorale concert! This musical entertainment consisted of two parts. The first was a medley of church hymns beginning with God of Our Fathers and ending with Onward Christian Soldiers. Just three short months ago, the St. Louis Cardinals won the seventh game of the 1964 World Series. Already plans are being laid for the Ambassador College Softball League. their requests by return mail, instead of sometimes weeks later.

In addition to the tremendous savings in time to get requests filled and in the mail, this will help to build up the good will of our radio audience.


But, there is yet another great advantage. This new reading process will save the Work of God MULTIPLE THOUSANDS OF DOLLARS in the coming years. The cost per letter to process and mail out the requested literature was 19.3 cents under the old method. Under the new system it is only 13.4 cents! This would represent a savings of over \$44,000.00 for 1965 alone,

and would amount to over three quarters of a million dollars for the next seven years!


The first day we put the process into effect we got under way about three p.m. Then approximately two thousand requests were completely read, typed, filled and in the post office within six hours.

The first whole day for the experiment included some 3850 letters. This is more than an average day, but still we were able to get all these requests ready and completely processed and mailed by the end of the working day. We call that a tremendous success!

This is blazing the way for greater things in the Work of God during 1965!

"Every two and one-half years the Work doubles in size!" Looking back over the years, this saying has proved to be true of Ambassador College as well as the Work itself.
