# Dining Hall Purchases New Accessories

Mr. Herbert W. Armstrong and Mr. Mott, Food Service Director, recently selected and ordered a new set of culinary (kitchen) accessories which will add to the superb cultural atmosphere of the new Dining Hall.

These fine accessories include a new set of stainless steel silverware, a service of plates, dishes, cups, and saucers made by *Corning*, an unusually fine salt and pepper shaker combination, genuine glass glasses for the milk and juice and sugar, honey, and cream servers. For the family style meals on the Sabbath and other special occasions, we have a brand spanking new set of stainless steel platters and serving dishes which are teamed up with new china bowls.

The outstanding feature about most of these culinary implements and utensils is that they are *not* of the standard institutional quality—the average institution is not able to have such fine quality! The company handling most of these items deals only with the higher class and more cultured domestic market. In keeping with the HIGH STANDARDS and CHARACTER of Ambassador, Mr. Armstrong and Mr. Mott selected these fine accessories and ordered enough—to be specially made for us—to serve the entire student body.

### Four-Color Press Arrives!

An all new, ultramodern *Nebiolo* press has arrived at Ambassador College Press from Torino, Italy. After the shipping crates are ripped away, 38 tons or 2 train-carloads of cylinders, boxes, rollers and mechanism will be assembled to roll out the 1966 full-color *Envoy*, future *Plain Truth* covers, and full-color booklets. The new press is the *first 4-C Nebiolo* to be shipped to

America, and contains the latest in perfected roller, feeder and cylinder mechanisms.

This new step forward in God's Work will open the door to a capacity for tremendous growth in publishing the gospel. The NEBIOLO press will print 25" x 38" sheets in FOUR COLORS at the rate of 7,000 per hour.

Many thousands of dollars have been saved by buying the press direct from Italy. In spite of a dock strike in Italian harbors and 1 month shipping time on the S. S. Eshkol, this new press should be in operation shortly after the Feast of Tabernacles, 1966.

## BE AN "EYE SPY"

Sunday morning, September 25, before the sun rises over the Dining Hall, three hundred Ambassadors will board buses headed for Squaw Valley and the Feast of Tabernacles. A few days later, the other half of the Student Body will take ten days off to attend services in Long Beach and to take advantage of all the "places to see" in Southern California.

Of course, the primary reason for the Feast of Tabernacles is to receive spiritual food.

But there is another purpose or opportunity especially for us students. It's the chance to expand our EDUCATION! Only one portion of our education comes in a classroom. We learn many important principles on the job. Other concepts we learn by social events and service.

But one of the most important — and most ignored — areas of education is TRAVEL.

The only "travel" done by most other colleges is the Easter Week "blast" at perhaps, Fort Lauderdale, Florida or Seaside, Oregon.

There's no purpose.

No lessons are learned. It's just one sensual but senseless, binge. At Ambassador College, travel means education as well as wholesome fun.

Take advantage of the Feast travel time. Be observant. Be an "eye spy."

As the bus chugs over the "Grapevine" toward Bakersfield, or along the Sierra ridge on highway 395, or through the mountains surrounding Yosemite National Park, *study* that crazy-quilt strata shooting off at obtuse angles, one layer superimposing the other, then suddenly thrust down below the first layer.

Analyze what made it that way.

As the bus heads through Donner Pass, find out the story behind that pass. How did it get its name? Who came across it? What happened to those people?

You will be surprised to find out!

When you arrive in Squaw Valley, don't spend all your time inside. Drink in of the stars, the birds, the unique mountain animals, the trees, the mountains. You can open new vistas with each studied glance.

And remember — one other *ignored* means of education is *meeting new* people. No two people have the same background and knowledge. The more people you venture to meet at Squaw Valley, the more you are *broadening* your horizons.

How about you students attending Long Beach?

Just forget your self for eight days. See how many new people you can meet, new knowledge you can gain, and new sights you can see. Use your extra time and money to avail yourself of some of the educational and recreational activities in the Los Angeles area. Just don't overdo it. Remember the primary purpose of the Feast—that it pictures the world tomorrow!

NOWHERE BUT AT AMBASSADOR would you have the wide opportunities for education that face you in the next two weeks. On the one hand don't reduce yourself to the level of other colleges, spending the break on a "wild time." But be sure to broaden your education and enjoy yourself in the proper way. Be Ambassadors. Learn, analyze, glean, study — and make God's Feast of Tabernacles a Joy.

# PORTFOLIO

The Portfolio celebrates its fifteenth anniversary this November. Like The Plain Truth, The Portfolio began as a mimeographed, hand-cut stencil sheet. The first issue came out in November, 1951.

The second issue, pictured at your right, came out a month later, December 18, 1951. Some of the headlines included "A Big Show on Tuesday" (advertising a student fun show), "Student Goes Home Over Vacation" (BIG NEWS in those days!), "Photos Urgent" (Envoy plea), and "Student Builds Garage." In those formative days of close brotherhood, a blunder on the gardening crew, a new car on campus, Mr. Homberger's new apartment — all were newsworthy.

All the editions in those first two years were mimeographed, photoless newspapers, selling for twenty cents an issue to outsiders (say, there's an idea). The first linotyped issue appeared on October 29, 1953. By then, The PORTFOLIO was coming out every three weeks, and has generally maintained that pace ever since. On February 25, 1954, the first clear photograph appeared, picturing a student dance.

In 1954, the first freshmen interviews appeared, and nearly each edition had an editorial by Mr. Garner Ted Armstrong. On February 17, 1955, Mr. Wolverton's cartoons first hit the pages of *The* PORTFOLIO, and by October of that year, the present PORTFOLIO masthead (by Mr. Wolverton) was an established trademark.

During the late 1950's *The* PORTFOLIO came out once a week for two months at a time, followed by a famine of issues, then back again strong. Then from 1958 to 1962, *The* PORTFOLIO editors experimented with new formats, new type styles, new layout and picture techniques, and various sizes for the editions. Many of the ideas were "brilliant" and others fell by the wayside.

Because of this experimentation and long-range vision, *The Portfolio* finally emerged in 1962 with approximately the same layout and pattern as today. The first page-two box editorial, the first Library Lookout, and the first Ambassador Adventure all came in 1961 and 1962.

The editors during those formative years included Messrs. Kenneth Herrmann, Wayne Cole, Jon Hill, Garner Ted Armstrong, Albert Portune, Bill McDowell, Sherwin McMichael, Leslie McCullough, and Howard Clark. In more recent years, *The* Portfolio editors have gone on to jobs in the publications field, those editors including Messrs. J. W. Robinson, Paul Kroll, and Steve Gray.

As *The* Portfolio launches into its sixteenth year of publication, we hope to recapture the life, enthusiasm, and brotherhood of the early editions, and hope to add IDEAS, ARTICLES, and ENCOURAGEMENT from the entire College. What you have just read is past history. The future is up to *US!*



After a few hours of fun, fun, fun, a cry went up in the camp, "Lunch!" It is truly amazing how quickly a few hundred people can assemble into lines.






We've finished them at last — the Portfolio staff presents its "Freshmen Interviews" for 1966!
