# **Huge Office Building Purchased!**

On October 21, 1966, Mr. Herbert W. Armstrong gave final approval for the purchase of the present Parsons Electronics Company building, located two blocks east of the campus, on DeLacey Ave. and Valley St. The building itself is tailor-made for Ambassador's needs: space for twenty-five to thirty offices, floor space half again as large as the huge Administration Annex,

parking space *two* to *three* times that of Administration Annex, and close proximity to the college "mainland."

According to Mr. Armstrong's comments in last week's Bible Study, our Transportation Department may move into the Parsons building as early as January, 1967. The Construction and Maintenance Department may follow. Within a year, both departments should be thoroughly established in these new offices, with openings for other small departments as well.

Why expansion? The proposed Pasadena Freeway is scheduling to go through the present Construction and Maintenance Building at 239 W. Green, and the Transportation garages have long been an eyesore at the *entrance* to campus. These two offices had to move *somewhere*, so God opened the tailor-made building at a very reasonable buy.

Even during austerity, Ambassador College can't refuse to walk through these open doors. The college and Work of God are ever expanding. Let's rejoice in this blessing, and grow with the College.

How would you like to be in top physical condition? Rank in the 95th percentile of the nation in physical fitness?


Sound impossible?

#### Editorial

## Ambassador Colleges, B.C.!

When did Ambassador Colleges begin? "1947!" you say!

You're wrong! Just the latest *era* of Ambassador Colleges has sprung up since 1947. Three thousand years ago, at least three other "Ambassador Colleges" dotted the Middle East!

Let's take a look at what the Bible calls "Samuel's School of Prophets."

The caliber of the Levitical priesthood hit a new *low* under Eli, at the end of the Judges period. So "ere the lamp of God went out in the temple of the Eternal," Samuel was called to rescue the Israelite kingdom. As the years passed, Samuel found he couldn't undertake this mammoth calling ALONE. He needed a group of young men, teachable, pliable, and dedicated, to learn and disseminate God's Way to prepare for His physical Kingdom under David.

Samuel formed two "Ambassador Colleges!" One was at Ramah (I Samuel 19:18, 20) and the other at Gibeah (I Samuel 10:5, 10). After him, Elijah and Elisha were responsible for carrying on three more "Ambassador Colleges," at Gilgal (II Kings 4:38), Bethel (II Kings 2:3), and Jericho (II Kings 2:5).

"Sons of the Prophets" sounds somewhat sanctimonious, but remember that the King James language uses the word "prophet" for "inspired speakers." These students were inspired preachers or *spokesmen* for God's Way.

Notice the Building Program they had! II Kings 6:1, 2—"And the sons of the prophets came unto Elisha, 'Behold now, the place where we dwell with thee is too strait [crowded—like Mayfair dining rooms] for us. Let us go, we pray thee, unto Jordan, and take thence every man a beam, and let us make us a place there, where we may dwell.' And he answered, 'Go ye.'"

The married students lived off campus, just like our present-day Ambassador Colleges. Notice II Kings 4:1, where a wife of one of the sons of the prophets came to Elisha pleading for help from the creditors after her. No doubt Elisha had some form of today's merciful loan limit.

Samuel's schools stressed *music!* They were liberal arts colleges, NOT "religious schools" or seminaries by any means! Saul came to Gibeah and met "a company of prophets coming down from a high place with a psaltery, and a tabret, and a pipe, and a harp before them; and they shall prophesy" (I Samuel 10:5). Is it possible they performed a type of "special music"?

Samuel formed God's schools in that day to prepare for David's physical kingdom of Israel. He trained kings and priests in the "West Point" of Israel. Those students trained long and hard, but were only prepared to serve as physical priests under David.

WE are preparing to be the priests and kings under the SPIRITUAL kingdom of Israel! And God has provided *this college* to train us for that. Do we see this purpose before us? Do we see each science class, music class, physical education hour, and Bible class as we *should?* Training for the imminent priesthood in God's *spiritual* kingdom!!!

God's colleges are *not* new. They are the oldest institutions of all, and still as *new* as tomorrow. God has always given special training and preparation for His select few. Samuel, Elijah, and Elisha had their schools; the Apostles had three-and-a-half years' special training under Christ, and we have the benefit of God's largest and most ambitious training project of history.

Do we appreciate it?







Dr. Chaboikacheck — "I will dig up the whole college to find my man."




