Basketball Concludes - Faculty Victorious


A capacity crowd thrilled to the last game of the season Saturday night, as the Faculty faced the only team that had beaten them — the red-hot Freshmen. Unprecedented Freshmen support, a red-and-white printed program with Frosh yells, and Ray Pyle's 40 points weren't enough to beat the purple-and-gold unbeatables, as the Freshmen's near-upset failed, 84-80.

It took Ray four seconds to score his first basket, and he went on to hit four-for-four, and all of the first nine freshmen points! What started out to be a consistent five-point red lead exploded into a *twelve*-point lead with 3:20 left, as Mr. Petty called a time-out. The time-out strategy was worth one point only, because the Freshmen closed the half with a respectable 49-38 *eleven*-point lead.

Mr. Petty and Mr. Armstrong quickly (Continued on page 6)

Classroom Contract Signed

Groundbreaking Set For April 1, Completion In January, 1968

Last Wednesday, Mr. Herbert W. Armstrong signed the contract with O. K. Earl Company for construction of the proposed classroom complex just west of Ambassador Hall. Construction not only includes the two huge *science* and *music* halls, but also additions to Ambassador Hall

and further beautification of the Sunken Gardens.

The contract came on the heels of Tuesday's contract from an Eastern insurance company to finance a good share of the fabulous classroom complex.

Groundbreaking is set for the beginning of April, and it is hoped the outside construction will be finished before the rainy season next October. The inside finishing is scheduled for completion around January of 1968, in time for second semester classes next year.

This is just one of the many BIG news breaks opening up for the Work (for latest progress on the BIGGEST news break, see page 2, column 1). Let's put our heart behind this growth and be sure we grow with the college.

In Monday "A"! ("A" for action).


To prove it, this energetic club recently had a ladies' night with the theme of "wine and cheese." A total of four different kinds of wines and as many varieties of cheese spiced the night.

Along with the tug-o'-war, the present senior class has not been dethroned in handball, table tennis, or volleyball but we miss Tom Williams!


Women's 220-Yard Dash



But it failed! So now the Seniors close out their season with a 3-9 record and cellar-Dwellers third year running!




