Ground Cleared for Classroom Complex

There is already visible progress towards beginning the construction of our classroom complex!

The first step, of course, was the actual closing of Olcott Place. The two ends of this short street were jack-hammered out. The west end now has grass and a sidewalk across it, and the east end has become a commercial driveway-type entrance.

Sections of the wall around Ambassador Hall must be torn out, so the iron fence and concrete "pots and balls" have been removed from atop it, to be saved for future use along Orange Grove Boulevard.

The fish pond has been emptied of its inhabitants and drained.

A great many shrubs have been carefully dug up to be transplanted elsewhere. The dichondra is being cut into long strips to be rolled up (it's worth \$.33 a square foot!).

Editorial

Fight Discouragement

During the long months of winter, following the excitement of the Ministerial Conference, bleak discouragement begins to set in.

Problems develop. Correction strikes, and we shoot out our lower lip, saying, "God can never use a clod like me," and we crawl under the bed to "eat worms." Personal problems begin to sap spiritual strength, and we seem to spiral downward.

Do YOU begin to feel depressed and discouraged during winter months? If so, then RECOGNIZE the enemy, and STRIKE a death-blow to discouragement! Here's How!

Winter in God's Plan

Yes, winter has a PURPOSE! Trace the Holy Days backwards instead of forward for once. The last Holy Day pictures the White Throne Judgment, then back to the Millennium, Atonement with God, and Christ's Second Coming. Moving backward to Pentecost, we see the Firstfruits of God's Church in this age, then back to Unleavened Bread (putting away sin) and Christ's Passover Sacrifice. That brings us right back to the beginning.

But what comes *before* "the beginning"? Romans 5:6-10 gives the answer. "For when we were *yet without strength*, in due time Christ died for the ungodly . . . while we were *yet sinners*, Christ died for us . . . when we were enemies, we were reconciled to God by the death of His Son."

Students, these three winter months — January, February, and March — have the purpose of reminding us once again of the NEED for Christ's sacrifice. If you feel "without strength" or "yet a sinner," then God is accomplishing His purpose of preparing you for the Passover. God is showing love to every one of us that is temporarily discouraged, testing and trying us through fire so that we can take the Passover with renewed meaning.

The College and Work also suffer a "frontal attack" this time of year. Two years ago, many students had to be expelled or demoted during MARCH. This was followed the next week by the climax of persecution in England and Dr. Rea's death.


This winter saw the strongest trial of them all with Mrs. Armstrong's critical illness. For many years these poignant trials have hit the College during the winter, and they probably will in years to come (the broadcast will be cut off and we will be persecuted *out of this country* probably during a January-to-March time span in just a few short years).

So, you see, YOU are not alone! When the BODY is under attack, so are each of the individual members.

WHAT TO DO

First of all, LOOK AHEAD! Look UP! Each year that the Work has been tried and tested so stiffly, the HUGE blessings soon follow. The *big* doors soon open. It's the same in your personal life. The bigger the trials that "condition" you, the bigger the following blessings.

Secondly, RECOGNIZE the enemy and FIGHT the battle. James 4:7-10 gives you the battle plan in capsule form. "Resist the devil and he will flee from you. Draw nigh to God, and He will draw nigh to you. Cleanse your hands you sinners; and purify your hearts, you double-minded. Be afflicted and mourn and weep . . . 


