

# THE NAME **GAME**

"Pardon me. What's your name again? - I'm sorry, I still don't remember it. - I guess I just can't remember names." Have you said those very words after meeting someone for the second, third, or would you even believe the fourth, fifth, or sixth time?

The next few weeks and months are going to be filled with students meeting one another in friendly conversations. 197 students meeting the upperclassmen could become a real fiasco if we fail to remember one another's name. So how do we attack the problem? First, have the DESIRE to learn and remember names. Second, have a PLAN. Here's a plan employing seven EASY points applying the "three natural laws of remembering." Try it! I guarantee that you will have such immediate success that it will become like a game to you, a NAME GAME.

I. Make Sure You Hear the Name Clearly

Hear the person's name PRECISELY. Insist on it. Ask him to repeat it. Ask how it is spelled. Picture the letters in your mind. You have the best camera available - the MIND. Focus it and snap the picture.

II. Repeat the Name Aloud

Repeat the name during the conversation as many times as possible, and you will be performing two purposes. First, you will be making sure that you understand the name correctly. Second, you will be hammering the name deeper into your memory. Each repetition will anchor it there more thoroughly. III. Form an Association Between Name and Appearance

Observe a person's looks. Note the color of his eyes, hair and observe his features closely - associate these with his name.

IV. If the Name Has No Meaning, Find a Substitute

If the name is not descriptive of anything, you cannot form a direct association. So look for a descriptive word that comes as close as possible in sound to the name that you want to remember.





# Television Work Grows-More Stations Added!

The race to reach the people is on! The news of the wonderful world tomorrow *must* go out *soon* with increased POWER! To make this possible, new media are opening up. One of the biggest of these new openings is television.

What about television? Where is it headed? How far has Ambassador College come already? What stations will *The* WORLD TOMORROW be on in the near future?

Since the decision to go on television has been made the television work has shot ahead. Shortly after the equipment was installed, Mr. Garner Ted Armstrong came in and sat down behind his broadcasting desk. The cameramen took their positions. The lights were turned on and the first rehearsal became the first program to be aired on channel 22.

Weeks have passed since and the program has been steadily improving with *immense* strides forward in both the technical and production areas.

Now the word is out! The WORLD TOMORROW is on a television station in Bermuda!! Bermuda, a Crown colony, is situated in the Atlantic Ocean — 580 miles east of North Carolina.

Of the population of 48,000 sixty percent are Negroes, the rest are Europeans. The literacy rate is abut 98 percent. The people are mostly "Christians."

The chief industry of Bermuda is tourism. The climate there is very mild

and humid — the temperatures averages 70 degrees.

There are about 12,500 television sets in Bermuda and two publicly owned commercial television stations, ZBM and ZFB. ZBM operates 55 hours each week and ZFB operates 38½ hours each week. *The* World Tomorrow will be on station ZFB at 5:30 p.m. Sunday.

The cost for putting the program on in Bermuda is quite low. It actually costs *more* for the labor and wear on the recording tape than it costs for the station time! It costs only 36 dollars for the station time while tape depreciation and labor required to deliver the program (not including postage) is about 44 dollars.

No big response to the program is expected. It will be considered successful if there are three letters received each week.

But that's not the only news! The World Tomorrow may soon be on a station in Texas. A program has been sent for audition to KLTV in Tyler. It is planned to have the program on at 10:30 p.m. one night each week. This will give Texas campus a chance to see the television version of The World Tomorrow too!

The future plans include full-color television and network coverage! No definite dates have been set, but hang on — this work is blasting forward at a fantastic rate!

Pizzazz is dating *all* the students, not just our favorites.


Pizzazz is sitting beside a girl at breakfast who doesn't want her eggs.

Watch out! That luscious cream filled cake in the beautiful package isn't as good as it looks. The problem of chemicals in food has been one of growing concern in recent years. Since World War II a deluge of chemicals in the form of dyes, bleaches, emulsifiers, antitoxins, preservatives, flavorbuffers. acidifiers, ings, alkalizers, moisteners, drying agents, extenders, thickeners, defoliants, fungicides, insecticides, neutralizers, sweeteners, anticaking and antifoaming agents, conditioners, curers, hydrogenators, maturers, fortifiers and many others, have been added to the food you eat!

In the book, The Poisons in Your Food, by William Longgood, a definite link-up is given of the above chemicals and these hair-raising statistics. In the United States today (1958-it's worse now) there are a total of 88,959,534 registered cases of chronic illness. Allergic disorders affect 20,000,000 persons; nervous diseases, 15,000,000; psychosis and psycho-neurosis, 16,000, 000; arteriosclerosis and degenerative heart diseases, 10,000,000. Besides these degenerative disorders, one retarded child is being born every fifteen minutes! Only a small percentage of Americans are relatively free from some sort of physical defect. And it's getting much worse!

Why isn't anything being done about it? Mr. Longgood explains about the conflict between health authorities and food processors, whose preoccupation with the shelf-life of their products often negates their concern for human life. The public remains the guinea pig as both sides haggle over the moral issues.

The Poisons in Your Food will help you become more aware of the quality of your diet and help you avoid some potential problems. You can order this book through the Campus Center Bookstore or read it at the library.
