At Last—the World Tomorrow On TV

The second of the three Greatest News events in the history of God's Work can now be announced. For the first time since 1955, the World Tomorrow Program will be broadcast on television. On May 11, 1967 at 8:30 p.m. the World Tomorrow will be broadcast over Channel 22, KWHY-TV Los Angeles.

Many long, hard hours have been spent in preparation for this eventful moment. Many changes have taken place since Mr. Herbert W. Armstrong gave the "green light" to television.

Mr. Dave Hooker, who installed the television equipment for Caltech's Jet Propulsion Laboratory is now our engineering consultant. Several of our own men with experience in electronics have been transferred from other departments to work in the Television Studio. And others have been temporary.

Feast Observed Worldwide

Pasadena Area Outgrows the Civic Auditorium.*

Thousands of God's people worldwide observed the *most important* and most inspiring Feast of Unleavened Bread of this era! At Pasadena, Mr. Portune brought out that this Work is right now on the very brink of the end time with God giving us *unprecedented* POWER to thunder the Gospel to this world as never before!

Tremendous growth was seen in the Headquarters area as it was necessary *for the first time* to conduct services in *both* the Civic Auditorium *and* the College gymnasium to accommodate the increase in the "harvest" here in Pasadena. This record crowd gave morning attendance figures of 2985 in the Civic and 832 in the gymnasium for a total of 3817 on the first Holy Day.

How effective is the U. S. Missile System? Is it a tested, tried, and proven system? Is it sufficient, or are manned bombers still very necessary to our national defense? What is the best plan for coping with the world's military problems? What price are we willing to pay for peace?

In his book *Design For Survival*, which was originally banned by the Pentagon, General Thomas S. Power, USAF (Ret.) analyzes and answers the above questions.

General Power gives his conclusion as follows — "When a strong man armed keepeth his palace, his goods are in peace: but when a man stronger than he shall come upon him, and overcome him, he taketh from him all his armour wherein he trusted, and divideth his spoils" (Luke 11:21-22).

General Power bases his whole theory of survival on the power of deterrence.

He aptly shows that any other way isn't, hasn't and won't work!!!

New Norelco television cameras, Conrac monitoring equipment, a film chain, a Sony video tape recorder (the only one on the West Coast with an editing feature), switching gear, and SYNC generator have been purchased for the production of black and white programs. Color equipment will follow in a few months!

Much of the above equipment wasn't even available in its present miniaturized form until four or five years ago. The Sony video tape recorder was only made available within the last year. All of this points to the fact that now is the

can shut a door once God has opened it! Radio Jerusalem wants to go to *one million thunderous* watts of radio power on short wave *as soon as possible!* It seems as if Jordan is just as anxious to get the Gospel out as we are! Mr. Portune announced that a huge new press building is to be built soon with another web press ordered to go in it. The television work has speeded up to a feverish pace. (See accompanying article.)

There was a very special announcement from Mr. David Antion on the First Day of Unleavened Bread in Pittsburgh. There wasn't enough food to go around for the noon meal, so Mr. Antion told the congregation they would have to take small portions. After the meal, there was so much food *left over* that it was packaged and given away! There were *six* bowls of beans to start with. Afterwards, the men took up *NINETEEN* bowls of beans!!! Reminds me of fish and loaves!

Another history-making event was the observance of the Feast in Paris, France. This may well have been the first time the Feast was kept in France since the time of the Waldenses (1100-1500 A.D.).

Feast messages were carried from Headquarters to the Churches in the field by many of the Headquarters Ministers. Mr. Herbert Armstrong is at home wherever God's people are. This year he kept the Feast at Bricket Wood. Mr. Garner Ted Armstrong enjoyed the Feast at Big Sandy, Texas. Mr. Meredith spoke at Atlanta first, then at New York for the last half of the Feast. Mr. Hill split the Feast between Detroit and Cincinnati. Mr. Portune brought messages to the Portland and Seattle Churches while Mr. Plache was in Denver, then Kansas City. Dr. Zimmerman, Mr. Carozzo and Mr. Frank Brown travelled to the Oakland, Salt Lake City, and Phoenix Churches respectively for a profitable Feast. The largest city in the United States was host to Mr. Raymond Cole during the Feast and the Akron Church was inspired by Mr. Waterhouse.

This was also a *very* special Feast for the nine men who were ordained to the ministry of Christ as Local Elders. Several Deacons and Deaconesses were also ordained to serve God's people.

Yes, this has truly been an eventful miracle-filled Feast of Unleavened Bread. God's Church is growing—the Work is being done.
