#### **EDITORIAL**

#### COME ON—LET'S FESS UP!

Probably one of the hardest things for all of us to do is admit our mistakes. It's hard to say — I goofed — I was wrong!

But why is it so difficult? Why don't we like to admit our mistakes? I don't necessarily mean great gigantic mistakes. I am referring to small mistakes — even the very smallest.

Too often the reason we didn't and won't admit our mistakes is we are afraid of the consequences. We are afraid of what the ministers or faculty will do if they find out we have made a mistake. We look on them with great fear and trepidation, because we think they are "out to get us." We think that they're looking for just any little excuse to kick us out of college.

We tend to picture the faculty as a gestapo that sneaks around corners and looks through key holes trying to trap us in some "sin."

In our own minds we picture them as ogres — THE F.B.I. (FACULTY BUREAU OF INVESTIGATION) — who fiendishly rub their hands with glee each time they catch some student in a mistake.

This is the picture we have conjured up in our minds. It is a picture that has distorted the true function of the ministers and faculty. This distorted picture has caused us to build up a "middle wall of partition" between ourselves and the ministers and faculty. It has caused us to shy away from them to the point that we even hate to take the smallest problems to them in fear that they might expel us from college!

This general attitude that we have all fallen into has literally cut us off from a source of help. If the ministers and faculty don't know our problems they can't help us with them. And too often a problem that begins as just some small mistake will mushroom into a great gigantic traumatic experience that ends in the expulsion of the student or students involved. But had this problem come to the attention of the ministers and faculty sooner all of this could have been avoided. It's far easier to take a little correction now than a whole lot later. That old adage "a stitch in time saves nine" surely applies here!

There is an absolute Biblical promise that we will have mercy if we confess and forsake our sin and mistakes. Let's notice it!

"He that covereth his sins shall not prosper: but whoso confesseth and forsaketh them shall have mercy" (Proverbs 28:13).

This is a concrete promise. If we are willing to admit our mistakes we will have mercy, but if we cover them WE SHALL NOT PROSPER!

Even knowing this it is still hard for us to admit our mistakes because we are afraid of the ministers and faculty. But here again, for no good reason!

God extends His mercy to us through His ministers. He has shown them how to deal with certain situations. A good example of God's mercy is the parable of the prodigal son (Luke 15:11-24).

God's ministers are able to understand the problems we might have. He has specifically chosen men who have had personal problems and made mistakes, as His ministers (Hebrews 5:1-2). Why? So they will be better able to help us with our problems.

Let's begin to smash any wrong image we have had of the ministers and faculty. Let's not be afraid of them! We have the unique opportunity to have a *very special* student-faculty relationship that other colleges don't have. Let's take advantage of it!

And what if you do make a mistake? Well if you do — WELCOME TO THE HUMAN RACE!


