"World Tomorrow" Reaches Jerusalem

"... the law shall go forth of Zion, and the word of the Eternal from Jerusalem" (Micah 4:2). For the first time in nearly nineteen centuries, this Scripture is soon to be fulfilled. Mr. Charles Hunting has assured Headquarters that the 200,000-watt Jordanian Hashemite Radio will soon broadcast The WORLD TOMORROW weekly from the Jordanian side of JERUSALEM!

Mr. Hunting made final arrangements yesterday (Sunday), and word has not yet reached the PORTFOLIO of any final details, but the door has already opened, and it is sure God's Work will walk through one of the most important doors yet opened in this age.

Mr. Schreiber to Head Transportation Dept.

Ambassador Press Expands

The printing division of Ambassador College is scheduled to *double* in size and machinery over the next year-and-a-half, according to Mr. Herbert W. Armstrong's announcement last Sabbath. A second new web-fed

press and a second color separator are the two major purchases in a manyfaceted press expansion. The web-fed press should take fourteen to eighteen months to deliver, since it has to be made to specifications in England and then shipped.

In composing, Mr. Merk will have the benefit of nine durable Intertype and Linotype machines to add to the three now there.

In pre-press, Mr. Schoon will be able to expand into the new block shown above. He will have a new color separator (the original one is now at work 24 hours a day), new plate-making equipment, and a new photo processor. The pre-press section will no longer have to be split between two offices a block-and-a-half apart.

This long-range expansion will streamline another section of God's Work in preparation for the monumental work ahead of us.

We on the staff hope you enjoy this new format. It's a challenge to produce it each week, but a joy to see the service and unity that a newsy weekly paper can give to the entire student body.


