Clarence Paul Meredith 1902-1968

Dr. Meredith was a rare example of one who served his Creator above all else. Although we were shocked

to hear of his death this week, he lived a long, very interesting and extremely productive life.

Ambassador was the seventh college Dr. Meredith attended. He considered his Master of Arts Degree in Theology from us by far the most important of his degrees. From the first, Dr. Meredith had the desire to serve humanity. Because of a serious accident affecting the steadiness of one

hand, he was detoured from his desire to become a physician and became a veterinarian instead. However, he definitely planned to retire early and go into scientific pursuits in the interest of serving his fellowman.

With the outbreak of World War II, Dr. Meredith changed plans he had made for scientific service. He now saw clearly that—as General Douglas MacArthur stated—"It must be of the *spirit* if we are to save the

flesh." Therefore, he began a deep and comprehensive quest to find God's purpose in life and the true way to solve the world's problems. Dr. Meredith began hearing the WORLD Tomorrow broadcast in early 1942. He checked it carefully - along with The PLAIN TRUTH - and soon began eliminate other broadcasts and literature which he had been studying

from many different sources. He became a heavy contributor to God's Work and was one of three men whom God used as human instruments to "rescue" Ambassador College in the terrible financial crisis it suffered in 1948.

In August, 1949, Dr. Meredith resigned a prosperous veterinary (Continued on page 5)

Editorial

You Cost God's Work Over \$30,000!

Do you realize you're being paid to attend Ambassador?

"Being paid to attend Ambassador College?" you say. "Why that sounds silly! You can't tell me I'm being paid! Just look at my bill!" This might be your first reaction, but let's not jump to any conclusions. Let's look at the financial records.

The total expenditure per student is estimated to be *ten thousand dollars* per year. Figure it out sometime. Throw in the expense for buildings, salaries, materials and all the other cost factors.

To offset this, we are charged for room and board, and we pay thirty dollars per semester hour for our classes. But that *only* comes to approximately *two thousand dollars a year*. And that's a *far cry* from ten thousand dollars — in fact it's only one fifth of what it actually costs to put us through college!

When we subtract the two thousand dollars from the ten thousand we come up with an eight thousand dollar deficit! This eight thousand dollars is actually what Ambassador College is paying you each year to be a student! When that eight thousand dollars is divided equally by the number of school days, we find that we are being paid thirty dollars a day just to attend classes!

By the time a student has graduated that eight thousand dollars will have grown to *thirty-two thousand dollars*.

Think of it!

THIRTY-TWO THOUSAND DOLLARS! That's more money than most of us have seen in our life, yet this is the investment Ambassador College — God's Work — is making in each and every one of us!

In one sense Ambassador College is like a multi-millionaire investor. A man who is trying to use his money wisely. A man who is willing to invest in a product that he knows will bring returns. Not a man who is going to make a gamble on some "get rich scheme."

Every Ambassador student has been carefully screened to be sure that he or she is not a bad investment. To be sure that after thirty-two thousand dollars has been invested, there will be some returns that will benefit God's Work in some way!

But from time to time one of these investments will not "pan out." Perhaps they looked like a good investment, but turned out to be a gamble. A gamble that may have cost God's Work from eight to thirty-two thousand dollars!

Usually the number of investments that don't make good are *small*. And *hopefully they will stay small* if we will take it upon *ourselves* to be an investment — a good sound INCOME PRODUCING INVESTMENT — and NOT a GAMBLE!

You are attending one of the most beautiful college campuses in the world. Everywhere you look you will see beauty and quality.

No stone has been left unturned to give Ambassador College a cultural atmosphere conducive to study. The beautiful new Academic Center, the exquisite Student Center, and the magnificent Physical Education Facility are all part of this exuberant atmosphere.

But even more of a blessing than the beautiful surroundings is the fact that we have God's Truth. Here we have the fantastic opportunity to learn how to live, as well as how to make a living.

All of these things put together make us the most blessed college students in the world. Let's use that blessing — and the investment — and make good on what we've been given.

Animated envelopes are now being sealed at heretofore unheard-of speeds in the Ambassador College Mail Department. Gone are the days of the waterwheel, sponge, and sticky tongue.

The Mail Department has the ultimate in sophisticated sealers. There is none as fast on the commercial market!

The Dunlap sealer bears the name of its inventor and builder, Cliff Dunlap. You could call it the Cadillac of envelope sealers. This sealer was preceded by the Dunlap daddy sealer which has recently been retired because of old age.

Why write about a simple little envelope sealer?

Mr. Eddie (Barber) Koo—Former Yo-Yo Promoter For Duncan

Remember those Duncan Yo-Yos you had as a kid? Did you know that millions of American youngsters owe the fun they get out of these Yo-Yos to none other than our own Ambassador College barber, Mr. Eddie Koo?

The Yo-Yo is a Filipino toy with which Mr. Koo was quite familiar when he came to the United States from the Philippines in 1929. He spent the depression years cutting hair in the Chicago area, having learned barbering at the age of eight.

With the coming of World War II, Mr. Koo joined the army, and was sent to the Philippine theater of war. However, when General MacArthur's forces abandoned the islands to the Japanese in 1942, Mr. Koo did not go with them. Instead, he was left behind to raise up and train Filipino resistance groups. By the end of the war, Mr. Koo was something of a hero. Meanwhile he had attained the rank of captain.

Following the war, Mr. Koo returned to the Midwest, and it was in Michigan that he met and married Mrs. Koo.

It was also at this time, that Mr. Koo showed the Yo-Yo to Mr. Duncan, a former teacher of his, who felt he would like to market the toy. However, he retained Mr. Koo to be in charge of promotions and advertising.

Yo-Yo, incidentally, is the Filipino name for the toy and it is a Duncan trademark. That is why the Duncan people say, "If it isn't a Duncan, it isn't a Yo-Yo."

Having achieved material success, Mr. Koo came to realize he was lacking another kind — spiritual success. In 1951, the Koos came out to California. It was in California where Mr. Koo heard *The* WORLD TOMORROW program. God immediately led him to understand the truth and where His church was. A short while later, he came to Ambassador College to be employed as a gardener.

Being quite adept at barbering, he began to give students haircuts for free in his home. A short time afterwards, word of this came to the ministers and Mr. Koo became a full-time barber. Notwithstanding, he continues to serve the students in many ways helping with shopping, watch repairs and in various other ways.

So, next time you're up in the barber shop, or anywhere you see him, ask Mr. Koo about some of his interesting experiences. I'm sure he'll have some hairy stories for you.



practice and moved here to Pasadena, California. He came out, he said, "To help out in any way in God's Work." He often stated he would be glad to "shovel coal in the basement" if this would help build this Work. Completing all the undergraduate Bible and related courses, Dr. Meredith went on to receive a Master of Arts Degree in Theology from Ambassador College.

Because of Mr. Armstrong's growing concern for the need of a well-planned, comprehensive Bible Correspondence Course to aid our thousands of scattered members and co-workers — at that time we had very few churches anywhere -Dr. Meredith volunteered his services to this vast undertaking. Working with Mr. Armstrong and others, he began outlining, planning and finally writing and producing the Ambassador College Bible Correspondence Course in 1954. The enrollment of this course grew steadily and became one of the most vital arms of God's Work to strengthen our members and prospective brethren in the detailed knowledge of God's Word.

The enrollment of the course grew fantastically — and now includes some 82,000 students, worldwide. Dr. Meredith also wrote many basic and helpful articles for *The Plain Truth Magazine*. But Mr. Armstrong told him years ago that his service in founding and writing the Correspondence Course alone enabled him to accomplish more in his lifetime than most men who have ever breathed.

Dr. Meredith will always be remembered by those who knew him well for the twinkle in his eye, the wry humor and the constant interest in real truth—the knowledge of God, world conditions and the "basic answers" to all phases of life which he constantly sought. He did live an interesting life, and God permitted him to enjoy greatly his chief recreational and educational pastime, world travel. For Dr. Meredith enjoyed fantastic trips through Europe, the Middle East and Far East, Africa, North and South America and even the Soviet Union.

But the most memorable of all Dr.

Meredith's weighty contributions to the happiness and welfare of his fellowman will be his early and vigorous support of God's Work and Ambassador College in the difficult early years, and the fantastic service rendered to increasing thousands of human beings through the Ambassador College Bible Correspondence Course. Mr. Petty broke the scoring ice with a great move followed by an easy lay-up. Mr. Alexander quickly followed suit with 2 more.


The Sophomores were down 4-0 but big Ben Wesley cut the margin in half with a high archer from 20 ft. and the sophs began to roll.




