President Holds Special Assembly Unique Opportunities Opened

He had originally gone to England on a fact finding mission. The recent restriction on the outflow of U. S. dollars by President Johnson was about to put our overseas work in a financial bind. Mr. Armstrong needed to go to England to see how the problem could be solved.

His trip turned out to be far more than just a fact finding tour. It ended by being one of his most significant trips to date!

How It All Started

Mr. Armstrong went to visit our German office in Düsseldorf with Mr. Schnee, the office manager. They later went to our branch office in Bonn, the present capital of West Germany. Our office in Bonn is located in the same ultramodern building complex that houses the West German Government!

Our staff can be on hand for any important developments that will come up — and they will come!

Our offices are located just one floor above a huge glassed-in area where all

Housekeeping Before Marriage

Last Sunday four Ambassador co-eds began a three-week course at boot camp in preparation for their intended career. Joyce Cafourek, Sandy Holliday, Cathy Smith and Elaine Hull are learning about homemaking by doing it. At 405 South Orange Grove they are pioneering in the *second* phase of the newest course in the Ambassador curriculum, Home and Family Management.

This class starts by providing the girls with the know-how and wherewithal to maintain home and hearth. Then during the course of the semester, each girl in the class will have the opportunity to practice what she is learning. All Senior girls and those Junior girls planning to get married after this semester are required to take the class. Counsellors and instructors in the class are Mrs. Velma Van der Veer, Mrs. Janet Eickoff and Miss Bernice Lange.

Classroom instruction will run the gamut of necessary information to make a house a home. The lectures started with family finances and will end with the responsibilities of Ambassador College women. On the latter topic, various faculty wives will contribute their wisdom and experience.

Another apartment, 504 South Orange Grove, is being converted for the class. The two apartments will house 4 girls each. Each group will spend three weeks experiencing the joys and labors of apartment living. They will do all their own shopping, cooking, laundering, and cleaning. They must stick to a budget of \$30 a week for each group. If they can't, they face famine. This can only be averted by the smuggling in of contraband from compassionate fellow Ambassadors. At the end of the three weeks another group will move in until every girl (32 this semester) has had the opportunity.

The Home Management Class is another addition to the genuine progressive education being developed at Ambassador College.

"CO2 TO SERVE YOU"

—Computer Fire Extinguisher System

Would you believe a radioactive IBM 360 computer room? No, there aren't any H-bombs lying around. Nor are any thick lead shields needed to protect our efficient computer operators.

The radioactive material is located in 9 highly sensitive smoke detectors situated in the 360 computer room. What business has radioactive material got doing in a smoke detector? To answer in layman's language: it is the source of an electric field used to maintain a balance across each detector. (For a less confusing and more technical explanation — just ask any friendly computer man.)

Anyway all it takes is a little smoke and — wham — there goes the balance. If you don't believe me, try to walk in with a lighted cigarette. (But don't really try it, or you will find yourself on-the-outside-looking-in, possibly from a floor eye view.)

Where there's smoke, there's bound to be fire. This detector system makes no bones about it. If you still happened to be around with your lit cigarette here's what would happen. The fire alarm would sound simultaneously in three different places: the computer

room, the security dispatchers' office, and the Pasadena Fire Department. Then you would see a mass exodus of people fleeing from the gas to come — CO₂.

Short for carbon dioxide, CO₂ is automatically dumped into the computer room at 75 pounds pressure. You can't live off of CO₂ and after a few minutes this heavy gas would have forced all the oxygen and, hopefully, the people out of the area.

Why flood a room with CO₂ when you suspect a fire? Why not use water or some other agent? In the first place, if the computer room ignites, the cause would be an electrical fire. Water will not quench an electrical fire, but would certainly damage highly sophisticated electronic equipment. CO₂ is one of the best smothering agents available which will not harm costly electronic equipment. Once it has replaced the oxygen in a closed space such as the computer room, combustion of any type is impossible.

We can be very thankful that the computer is protected by such marvelous mechanical and electrical devices.

Eric Williams' aggressive offense lead to 3 straight baskets and a Faculty lead of 6. Before the Sophs could regain their balance, Mr. Petty added a few points of his own and the Faculty was out of sight with a 13 point lead, 69-56. Then, disaster struck for the Faculty — Eric Williams fouled out. The odds were quickly evened up as Sophomore Ray Pyle left the game with 5 personals and 23 points.

The scoreboard showed 5 minutes left to play and a Sophomore deficit of 10 points. With 1:25 left the Sophs were




