




# ***Here's How We're Situated***





## **Producing the Portfolio**






***At Work On The ENVOY***






Ambassador is certainly an impressive campus — open, spacious, carefully landscaped, well equipped to educate its students.




# ***Japanese Gardens***






*...a busy world of action*


This educational travel broadened our students' background—adding firsthand experience to the knowledge gained in classrooms.



Would you please send it?" — or, "I've got a problem, and from the seemingly inexhaustible flow of facts and knowledge broadcast on your radio program, and printed in The PLAIN TRUTH, I believe you have the understanding to help me . . ." These are examples of the many letters received, as a result of the Ambassador College world-wide educational program by radio and by the printing press (British plant located in Watford).

By assisting part time, many resident full-time students, as well as graduates off-campus, are privileged to have a part in furthering the education of countless thousands in many parts of the world. Letter answering and mailing departments are being forced to rapidly expand into much-needed office facilities which are already on the architects' drawing boards.

Scores of dedicated individuals — who will soon occupy those new offices — read and answer the many requests. Last year the mailing department posted more than one-half PLAIN TRUTH requests alone. If those copies had been stacked, they would have soared more than one mile high — or equal to the dizzying height of five Eiffel Towers. Our Royal mailman staggered away with more than sixty-five tons of PLAIN TRUTH subscriptions.



Many educational institutions maintain printing plants for producing educational literature: as, The Oxford University Press; The Cambridge University Press, etc. etc. Ambassador College is no exception, but there is this difference: The Ambassador College Press has nothing to sell - it is totally non-commercial, non-profit. The plant, of course, is located off-campus, in nearby Watford. From a printing pygmy to a sprawling complex of colour

presses and processes - that's the history of Ambassador College Press. And that story is far from being completed.

This year's additions will play a vital role in producing the thousands of booklets, reprint articles, PLAIN TRUTHS, and Correspondence Courses which are mailed annually.

Ambassador College Press has added to its arsenal of machines a Roland two-colour press, a Muller stitcher (most modern of its kind), a Nebiolo single-colour press, a Heidelberg single-colour press, and a Zaandam postal wrapper to handle the British edition of The PLAIN TRUTH.

On August, 1966, a Heidelberg four-colour press is expected.

And other new equipment is planned and ordered to assist a staff of thirty-one.






















# **Business Office Annex**





## **Art, Camera, Stripping**




Once copy has been "set" and the pictures taken for each layout in a publication, it is sent to the Art Department for touchup. From there it travels to the Camera Room where it is photographed on a special copy camera. The films from this camera are then sent to Stripping where they are assembled or "stripped" onto "flats" which are used to produce the press plates with which we print the final copy.







By far, the most exciting news to come from the Printing Department this year was the "flooring" of our new Nebiolo Press in time to print the ENVOY. This 78,000 pound mechanical jewel from Torino, Italy, is the real Rolls-Royce of the printing trade. Quality is its earmark from appearance to production. Seven thousand 25"x38" sheets of paper per hour ran through the rollers of the four-color units of the Nebiolo in producing your colorful 1966 ENVOY. 

The Bindery Department plays its role in the finishing of all publications. The signatures of each magazine are folded on our high-speed folding machines. They are then gathered and sent to the McCain Binder crew. Here the signatures are collated, wrapped with a cover, saddle-stitched and then trimmed to final size before passing on to the awaiting hands of our mailing staff. Our book-size, paper-backed publications are bound at our "Perfect Bindery." Each book is in turn gathered, collated, wrapped, and glue bound by the Selby "88" perfect binder.


# **JEKYLL ISLAND REPORT**




## **HAYLING ISLAND INTERNATIONAL**










