


Our Active Chancellor





Midyear Vacation






Expansion and Growth



Year's End


The end of the academic year brings with it welcome relief from the pressure of a long study-work schedule. Flagging spirits perk up and the campus comes alive with a refreshing round of events.









Loma Hall


Ambassador Clubs





Concert Time

Berlin - '68






They did. Here in the beautiful East Texas countryside those pioneering students learned to live the ideal that brought them here.





Ambassador College Agriculture

Registered Herefords gain rapidly at the Big Sandy Ranch feed lot. Constant upgrading of stock and improvement of feed-out techniques have resulted in amazingly high yields from our livestock program.

The agricultural program at Big Sandy is unique among our campuses. Being new to Ambassador has not restrained the young department's growth, however, and many students are taking advantage of growing opportunities to develop interest in and talents for animal husbandry and farm science. A large portion of meats, poultry and vegetables supplied to both the Big Sandy and Pasadena campuses comes right from our own farm. The experimental programs conducted on our grounds have led to the development of new and improved techniques of soil and herd management. Our policy of seeking new, better and more profitable farm methods has influenced the Texas State Department of Agriculture to an interested participation in our various research programs.




