The green team, led by captain Mitchell Knapp and sprinters Danny Overcash and Linda Untiedt, took the high school championship. First places in the 100 yard dash and the 220 yard dash went to both Danny and Linda as Mitchell took second in the 440 yard dash and first in the high jump.

The green team scored a total of 78 points; the red team, $67\frac{1}{2}$ points; and the blue team, $66\frac{1}{2}$ points.





Mr. Lochner presented the graduates with their diplomas.


