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#### · History of the Sabbath Through the Ages

JOHN KIESZ

#### Origin of the Sabbath

THE Sabbath question has been of concern to mankind in general throughout the religious history of the human race. The Creator Himself, after six days of labor, rested on the seventh day of the week (Gen. 2:1-3; Ex. 31:17). The weekly cycle, measured by the Sabbath at the end of the week,

is the oldest division of time (Gen. 8:10; 19:27). Although there have been eight- and ten-day cycles introduced by some over the millennia, the weekly division of time has been the general rule, especially among all Semitic races.

Of one of these groups Professor A. H. Sayce says: "The Sabbath-rest was a Babylonian, as well as a Hebrew, institution. Its origin went back to pre-Semitic days, and the very name, Sabbath, by which it was known in Hebrew, was of Babylonian origin. In the cuneiform tablets the Sabattu is described as a 'day of rest for the soul,' and in spite of the fact that the word was of genuinely Semitic origin, it was derived by the Assyrian scribes from two Sumerian or pre-Semitic words, sa and bat, which meant respectively 'heart' and 'ceasing.' The Sabbath was known, at all events, in Accadian times, as a 'dies nefastus,' a day on which certain work was forbidden to be done, and an old list of Babylonian festivals and fast-days tells us that the seventh, fourteenth, nineteenth, twenty-first, and twentyeighth days of each month the Sabbath-rest had to be observed."-The

Higher Christian and the Monuments, p. 74, 1895.

Secular and sacred history reveal that the Sabbath was observed from times very ancient. Although not mentioned by name, the Sabbath was kept by the old patriarch Abraham, as seen from his complete obedience to his Maker. "Because that Abraham obeyed my voice, and kept my charge, my commandments, my statutes, and my laws" (Gen. 26:5). Abraham lived at approximately the same time that Hammurabi, the founder of the old Babylonian Empire, lived; Hammurabi has been called the Babylonian Moses because he promulgated a code of laws which in some respects were the same as the Mosaic code of the Hebrews.

What the children of Israel practiced in respect to Sabbath keeping while in Egyptian bondage, is not recorded. We do know that they did not lose sight of the righteous principles of the Most High, as is evidenced when the Hebrews midwives were asked to kill the newlyborn babes; they refused because they "feared God" (Ex. 1:17). We

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Mrs. Lawrence Burrell, member of the Church of God (7th Day) at Fairview, Okla., a member of the Bible Sabbath Association since 1951, now serving with her husband as assistant secretary-treasurer for her 19th year: "Brother and Sister Main sacrificed everything they had for this cause.... Brother Main was our teacher for two weeks.... We went back the second time.... That was a beautiful beginning... but since then our blessings have been made manifold by working in the Bible Sabbath Association."

R. D. Bradshaw, former member of the World Wide Church of God, resident of North Carolina, a member of the Bible Sabbath Association for two years, now serving on the board of directors filling out the unexpired term of Mr. Leo L. ## New Chapter is Organized

A group of Commandment-keeping Christians held a meeting on Sunday, November 25, 1973, at the Seventh Day Baptist Church in New Orleans, La., for the purpose of forming a branch chapter of the Bible Sabbath Association International. Elder Jesse Lee Andrus, Sr., led the meeting in which officers were elected as follows: Jesse L. Andrus, president; David T. Scullen, vice president; Mary C. Johnson, secretary; J. D. Allmon, treasurer; and William Payton, chaplain.

A motion was made and carried that an application be filed for official affiliation and charter in the Bible Sabbath Association International with headquarters at Fairview, Okla.

Regular meetings began to be held in January, 1974. The first meeting was conducted at the Seventh Day Baptist church in New Orleans. President Andrus asked for suggestions as to how the chapter might effectively promote the program of the B.S.A. Suggestions offered were:

- (1) Distribute B.S.A. tracts.
- (2) Conduct open air meetings.
- (3) Use free space and time available in newspapers and radio.
- (4) Do house to house evangelism.
- (5) Support interfaith services at various Sabbatarian churches.

The first such service was held in February, 1974, at the New Orleans Seventh Day Baptist Church. It was announced at the meeting by President Andrus that a single sheet tract, like the one used by the Washington, D.C. chapter, advertising the New Orleans chapter, was being pre-

# Former BSA Officer Dies

Dr. Charles E. Monroe, who served as second vice-president of the Bible Sabbath Association from 1966-1971, and as the association's field representative for six months in California in 1970, passed away at Boise, Ida., April 15, at age 43.

He was converted early in life and organized the Mount Zion General Baptist Church of Granite City, Ill., at age nineteen. He joined the U. S. Navy in 1952 and spent four years in the Korean War. While stationed in Guam he organized a General Baptist Church.

After his discharge from the Navy, he attended Southern California Bible College and was graduated from Evangel College, Springfield, Mo., in 1957. The following year he became a Sabbath keeper and after teaching one year in the Missouri public school



system at Lincoln, Mo., he joined the staff at Spring Vale Academy at Owosso, Michigan.

He married Marion Shapitka of Langley, B. C., Canada, in June, 1962. The Monroes made their home in Boise, Ida., where he had been the founder and director of Maranatha Bible College in Meridian.

Because of his outstanding contribution to Christian education, he was awarded the honorary doctor of divinity in 1968 from Ridgecrest Theological Seminary.

Dr. Monroe was an outstanding leader and will be missed by his friends. He is survived by his wife, Marion, and three daughters.


The members of the Bible Sabbath Association say "Good bye" to our dear brother, in sure hope and faith believing that we shall meet him again when all things are made new.

#### Take Two Tablets

T AKE a look in the average medicine chest. Ours is not "average," for we shy away from medicine as much as possible. A quick survey, however, revealed eight containers of various pills: Phillips' Milk of Magnesia in its familiar blue bottle ("chew thoroughly 2 to 4 tablets"), a 100-tablet bottle of Vitamin C ("one tablet daily or as prescribed by physician"), a small brown bottle of Cystex ("a modern analgesic and germ combating treatment"), some St. Joseph aspirin, and several prescription tablets for various family members' long-forgotten illnesses.

This seems to be the age of the tablet. When people get together, after they have exhausted the subject of weather, the topic of which tablets they are taking for what will often be good for at least a quarter hour of conversation.

Yet there are two tablets badly needed by the people of the world that are almost forgotten—hidden away in the dark recesses of the world's "medicine chest."

These tablets are old, but they have been tested through the ages and found to be effective. They are the Ten Commandments, which were

given millenniums ago to mankind—two tables, or tablets, of stone, "written with the finger of God" (Ex. 31: 18).

They might be compared to the tablets given to school children, which, when chewed, show by red color which areas of the teeth are not being properly brushed. These divinely-prescribed tablets show how deeply the crimson stain of sin has permeated one's life.

In his letter to the Romans, Paul said, "Indeed I would not have known what sin was except through the law" (Rom. 7:7, New International Version). And he went on to say (v. 13), that it was through the commandments that he found out how "utterly sinful" sin is.

He begins chapter 8 with the glorious declaration that he had found the cure for the ailment revealed by the commandments. "Therefore, there is now no condemnation for those who are in Christ Jesus (Rom. 8:1, NIV). Later in the chapter he explains that the law—far from being abolished—is still in effect, and that the Savior's sacrifice enabled the requirements of the law to be met fully in us.

There we have it—the two divine tablets pointing out the illness and the divine sacrifices providing a remedy.

Why have so few found and used them?

Perhaps one reason is that many who profess to follow the Savior do not show by their actions that they truly love Him (John 14:21).

also know that on their way to Mt. Sinai, before they ever received the tables of stone and various other laws, statutes and judgments (Ex. 16:1-29), they were reminded to keep the Sabbath as well as the other commandments and laws. When in the Fourth Commandment they were asked to "Remember the sabbath day, to keep it holy," it more than indicates that they should observe that with which there had been an acquaintance previously.

The Iewish historian Josephus refers to the Sabbath institution, not as something that originated for them at Mt. Sinai, but as something in effect from the very beginning of time, in these words: "Moses says that in just six days the world and all that is therein was made. And that the seventh day was a rest and a release from the labor of such operations. WHENCE it is that we celebrate a rest from our labor on that day, and call it the Sabbath; which word denotes rest in the Hebrew tongue" (Antiquities of the Jews, Book 1, Chapter 1, Section 1).

When we leave the books of Moses, in six consecutive books of the Bible, for a period of about five hundred years, the Sabbath is not mentioned. Nevertheless, idolatry and

Sabbath breaking were some of the besetting sins of Israel, which finally, in the days of the prophet Jeremiah, caused them to be taken captive by Nebuchadnezzar to Babylon for a period of 70 years (Jer. 17:20-27; 25:8-11; Ezek. 20:23-25).

Upon their return from the Babylonian captivity, when some of the folks in Judah became negligent in Sabbath keeping, Nehemiah contended with the nobles and said, "What evil thing is this that ye do, and profane the sabbath day? Did not your fathers thus, and did not our God bring all this evil upon us, and upon this city? Yet ye bring more wrath upon Israel by profaning the Sabbath" (Neh. 13:17, 18).

The next period in Hebrew history which reveals their attitudes toward Sabbath-keeping is the Maccabean age. Under the reign of the Syrian Antiochus Epiphanes, about 175-164 B.C., during a portion of that time the Jews were greatly oppressed.

He wrote to his whole kingdom that all should be one people and all should leave their laws in favor of his, with which all the heathen agreed, and even many of the Israelites consented to his religion, sacrificing to idols, and profaning the Sabbath.

But the greater part of the Jews remained faithful to their God, for which they were persecuted. Many lost their lives because they would not consent to profane the Sabbath. In fact, by that time they had already loaded the Sabbath with many rigorous and burdensome ordinances, so much so that they would not even defend themselves against their ene-



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mies on the Sabbath day (1 Maccabees, chapters 1, 2, and 2 Maccabees, chapters 5, 6.

When in history we arrive at the conclusion of the old covenant and the ushering in of the new, we observe that the Jewish people were extremely strict in the matter of Sabbath keeping and their various man-made traditions, which brought them in conflict with the One who had arrived to be Israel's Messiah. In our next installment we will consider the matter of Sabbath keeping in the Gospels.
