

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How the Savior Has Dealt With Me

ISAAC N. CRAMER

(This article is an excerpt from the booklet Just A Brief Sketch of My Life.)

I was born on August 1, 1895, to Sabbathkeeping parents near Pierre-



pont, N. Y. It must have been about the summer of 1903 that my parents left New York, and moved near Welch, La. It was shortly after the great San Francisco earthquake

and I remember that I had just finished the second grade reader.

My mother's father had been an ordained Methodist minister. My father's people for many years did not profess any religion, later becoming members of the Episcopal Church.

The church to which my parents belonged was over ten miles from our home, and they seldom attended because of the distance. We were too poor to have any means of transportation but to walk. I always attended church. Mother would pack me a lunch, and I would eat it after services.

I worked eight miles from our home to help make the living for the family, since my father was very ill most of his life and was not able to work for many years. After work on Friday night, I would walk the eight miles home to take my pay to mother. I would rise early on Sabbath day and would walk over ten miles to the church, and then ten miles home again, visiting with my parents briefly before taking the eight-mile walk back to my job.

Worked for Atheists

My job was with atheists who argued against all religion. They swore, drank, smoked, and told dirty stories. The religion of my parents helped me to keep on the right track. My mother had taught me the Commandments, and told me that the Savior's example was the only safe pattern to follow. She warned me never to allow anyone to influence me to do that which I knew was wrong. Therefore, I declined all invitations from those with whom I worked, to smoke, drink, or do other forms of evil.

We lived on the prairie at the very edge of the great pine timber lands where wolves could be heard at night and panthers had been seen in nearby areas by people who were cutting logs in the woods. The power of the Creator was the only thing that kept me from being killed as I walked alone those many nights to and from work, and to church and back.

It was in the spring and summer of my fourteenth year that I had some personal experiences with the power of the Heavenly Father that I could never forget. I was miraculously saved from a herd of wild long-horned cattle. Later I was saved from an attack by a timber wolf which must have weighed more than I did at the time.

A Dream

Then I had a dream which I never told anyone else for many years. I dreamed that our nation was in serious trouble, and that I was to help get it out of its trouble. Little did I realize the spiritual significance that dream had at the time, but realized it many years later.

I told my mother that I wanted to go to school and prepare myself to work for the Savior and help advance the cause of the Kingdom of God on earth. But circumstances existed which kept me on the farm working to help support the family. Although a school existed only about six miles from the farm where we lived, I was not able to attend because I had to work. Therefore, I had not reached the fourth grade by the time I was twenty years old. This hurt me very much at the time, because of my sincere desire to get an education and prepare myself better to serve the Savior and promote His gospel.

Looking back, I can now see how my Savior, who sees the end and the beginning, was working all things together for my own good and His glory. He had called me to do a work for Him according to His purpose, a purpose for which I could not prepare myself, but for which He, by the power of the Holy Spirit, would prepare me.

During the months that followed, doubts began coming into my mind. I began to wonder, was there really any hope for me? Must I always continue to be a slave to extreme ignorance and poverty? Could my parents, in whose religion I had trusted, defeat the Savior's purpose for my life? The next couple years dragged on. I became discouraged and stopped going to church altogether.

Voice Heard on the Road

I quit my job because I felt that I was spending my life working for wages and still had nothing to show for my time.

Then one afternoon as I was riding horseback under a clear sky, I heard a voice call my name and ask me a question: "Isaac, where are you going?"

I thought that perhaps someone was playing some sort of trick on me by hiding behind the tall grass on the side from which the voice came. I stopped my horse and searched the area, finding nothing, so went on, chiding myself for thinking I had heard something when I had heard nothing. I was determined to ignore it and tried to brush it aside as only my imagination.

But I heard the voice again: "Isaac, where are you going?" Instantly everything became black all around me and I could see nothing.

I heard it again the third time. I was so horrified that I cried out to whatever it was that had spoken to me, saying, "Oh, save me from this!"

Instantly the promise that I had made to the Savior when He had saved me from the wolf and wild long-hørned cattle came to my mind. I renewed my promise to Him and everything became normal again. Still I doubted; what was I to do in my ignorance and poverty? I had no education, no opportunity to get one, and it looked as if I was bound on the farm.

I knelt on the ground and dedicated my life to Him, asking Him to guide me in the way I ought to go. He told me that I was not to trust men to lead me, but that I must trust Him to guide me in the study of His Word. I can never forget that moment.

World War I

I left home finally in 1915 and took a job at a book binding factory where I earned enough money to enter school and pay my own way. I finished the ninth grade by the time I was 22, just in time to be drafted into service for World War I under the slogan, "Help Make the World Safe for Democracy." While at South Lancaster, Mass., just before entering the service, I was baptized and became a member of the church of my parents.

While in the Army I attended religious services of both Catholics and Protestants and stayed as close to the Creator as possible. I was honorably discharged in 1919 and went back to the farm to work for a year. At that time I read the book Faith of Our Fathers, by Cardinal Gibbons. While it condemned Protestantism for the most part, it seemed also to condemn Catholicism for rejecting the authority of Him whom they

professed to adore, by transgressing the true Sabbath, which they admitted was Saturday, and by observing Sunday, the Sabbath of man-made tradition.

In the mid-1920's I went to work at Washington, D.C., at the publishing house of the denomination in which I was born and reared, and attended the denominational school, studying church history and doctrine. Conditions beyond my control, however, forced me to discontinue my formal education and help my parents once more. I was never able to complete my educational ambitions. I was half-way through high school when I had to drop out, never again to return.

I married in the fall of 1928 and began to raise a family. Then the great economic depression hit, with the stockmarket crash early in 1929. But by the help of the great Creator we managed to survive without accepting charity.

Later Experiences

During these years I developed a philosophy of nonsectarian religion, believing that freedom of thought is essential to spiritual progress, and that we should take a right attitude toward all believers whether we agree with their theological views or not. I promoted the International Brotherhood of Christians, an interdenominational movement calling for Christian unity.

Since that time I have been doing my part in giving the message I was called to give to this generation. I have served on the board of directors of the Bible Sabbath Association and during the 1960's my

Sabbath History of the First and Second Centuries

About ten years before the destruction of Jerusalem, the Apostle Paul was accused by the Jewish leaders of being a "pestilent fellow, and a mover of sedition among all the Jews throughout the world, and a ringleader of the sect of the Nazarenes" (Acts 24:5).

Of those early Christian believers, including those who fled to Pella, the historian Hugh Smith says: "The first Christian church established at Jerusalem by apostolic authority became in its doctrine and practice a model for the greater part of those founded in the first century.... These Judaizing Christians were first known by the outside world as 'Nazarenes.'... All Christians agreed in celebrating the seventh day of the week in conformity to the Jewish converts' (History of the Christian Church, pp. 50, 51, 69).

The learned Gieseler explicitly testifies: "While the Jewish Christians of Palestine, who kept the whole Jewish law, celebrated of course all the Jewish festivals, the heathen converts observed only the Sabbath, and, in remembrance of the closing scenes of our Saviour's life, the Passover, though without the Jewish superstitions. Besides these, the Sunday, as the day of our Saviour's resurrection, was devoted to religious worship" (Church History, Apostolic Age to A. D. 70, Sec. 29).

"The Jewish converts, or, as they were afterwards called, the Nazarenes, who had laid the foundations of the church, soon found themselves overwhelmed by the increasing multitudes that from all the various religions of polytheism enlisted under the banner of Christ.... The Nazarenes retired from the ruins of Jerusalem to the little town of Pella beyond Jordan, where that ancient church languished above sixty years in solitude and obscurity" (Gibbon's Decline and Fall of the Roman Empire, Vol. I, Chap. 15).

"For fifty years after St. Paul's life, curtains hang over the church, through which we vainly strive to look; and when at last the curtain rises, about 120 A.D., with the writings of the earliest Church Fathers, we find a church in many aspects very different from that in the days of St. Peter and St. Paul" (The Story of the Christian Church, p. 41, by Jesse L. Hurlbut).

It was during this interval of obscurity in the history of the early church that the "falling away" from the apostolic faith commenced (Acts 20:29, 30; 2 Thess. 2:1-7). By the middle of the second century the church had altered its course and practices so much that it was hardly recognizable as the church founded by the Messiah and His apostles.

Of this James Wharey says: "...

When the heathen converts were received in the church, it was natural they should bring with them some taint of their old philosophy, and former superstitions: and some fondness for the rites and ceremonies of their idolatrous worship.... Indeed we shall find, that when Christianity became the established religion of the Roman Empire, and took the place of paganism, it assumed, in a great degree, the forms and rites of paganism, and participated in no small measure of its spirit also. Christianity as it existed in the dark ages, might be termed, without much impropriety of language, baptized paganism" (Sketches of Church History, p. 23. Presbyterian Board of Publications, 1840).

In Justin Martyr's time, less than fifty years from the apostolic age, the communion cup was mixed with water, and a portion of the elements sent to the absent; the Lord's Supper began to be administered to infants; and the sign of the cross was introduced. Among many other elements that entered the picture was the commencement of observing, or at least holding services on, the first day of the week. Mosheim and others indicate that meetings were held on both days.

The Sabbath had been a prominent feature in the Jewish creed and practice, and since much bitter prejudice grew up between the pagan converts and the Jewish elements in the church, the heathen element gained control, gradually, and succeeded in effacing much of what they considered Judaistic. The fact that Justin Martyr and others began to press their antinomian theories shows that the Sabbath was yet an institution which had a strong hold on the

church, even on the Gentile converts. The Sabbath was not discarded during apostolic days.

"But if some, through weak-mindedness, wish to observe such institutions as were given by Moses (from which they expect some virtue, but which we believe were appointed by reason of the hardness of the people's hearts, along with their hope in this Christ, and the eternal and natural acts of righteousness and piety, vet choose to live with the Christians and the faithful, as I said before, not inducing them either to be circumcised like themselves, or to keep the Sabbath, or to observe any other such ceremonies, then I hold that we ought to join ourselves to such and associate with them in all things as kinsmen and brethren" (Dialogue with Trypho, Chap, xlvii, p. 218, Vol. 1. Clarke's Ante-Nicene Library, or The Ante-Nicene Fathers, 1953 edition).

Justin spoke these words of Sabbath-keeping Christians. He spoke of them as weak-minded believers, yet he would fellowship with them under certain conditions. Not all of the Church Fathers denied the Sabbath. Some of them bore positive testimony to the perpetuity of the Ten Commandments. Some also asserted the origin of the Sabbath at Creation. Several of them bear witness to the existence of Sabbathkeepers all along, as we shall presently see.

In an old treatise on the "Morality of the Fourth Commandment," William Twisse, D. D., says: "Yet, for some hundred years in the primitive church, not the Lord's-day only, but the seventh day also, was religiously observed, not by Ebion and Cerinthus only, but by pious Christians also, as



Real Significance of the Sabbath

LET it be understood that merely refraining from work is not God's idea



of Sabbath keeping. It may be Saturday keeping, but it is not Sabbath keeping, The idea of Sabbath is spiritual and in no other way can the Sabbath be kept in the fullness of its spiritual meaning.

It is true that in genuine Sabbath keeping there will be complete cessation from unnecessary physical work, but that in itself is not Sabbath keeping. If it were, man could rest one day as well as another. A special blessing was attached to the day of the Sabbath as well as the act of resting therein. The real significance of the Sabbath inheres in the sacredness of the consecrated and hallowed day.

A man needed healing and Jesus healed him on the Sabbath day. He and His disciples walked through the grain fields and, being hungry, they plucked grain. He raised no question beforehand as to the rightness of these acts, although they were done on the Sabbath day; yet the storm of opposition which broke at once showed that He had cut to the quick some of the legalistic observances and had put a new significance on Sabbath observance. How beautifully He

states it: "My Father worketh hitherto, and I work" (John 5:17). For the human race, the Father whose Sabbath began in ages past, was not in quiescent rest, but imminent in human affairs and active in human interests.

There is an ever-pressing need of bringing Jesus' words and practice to bear on modern life. God made the Sabbath for the good of mankind. By going to church, studying the Bible, visiting the lonely, and practicing deeds of mercy and service on the Sabbath day, our lives are enriched. This, then, is the real significance of the Sabbath of Yahweh.

My Summer Travels

I AM writing you while on the road, having appeared as a guest speaker in twenty American cities at local churches and denominational conventions during the summer months. Because of the importance of this tour, I have not been able to spend much time at my office.

Because I know of your interest in my work, I want to give you this first-hand news report of the success of this tour.

The heavenly Father has placed before me doors of service and opportunity for enlarging the ministry of the Bible Sabbath Association International. It has become my responsibility to create a program that will magnify and visually interpret our task as an interdenominational Sabbatarian organization. The opportunity of serving the association in a greater capacity has given me a tremendous sense of responsibility as well as new insight into the affairs of the association in general.

I have worked to facilitate the spirit of the Bible Sabbath Association, which can be expressed with such dynamic adjectives as friendly, cooperative, systematic, and unifying. This nature is revealed through my willingness to assist, promote, and support ALL Sabbatarian bodies and build up the kingdom of God, and in turn to enthusiastically educate these groups about the outstanding success of the Bible Sabbath Association and to encourage support of its program.

My appearances at the various churches, assemblies, camp meetings, and conventions have been given good acceptance and hundreds of new people have heard of the BSA and its program because of them. I have crossed denominational, ethnic, and cultural barriers, speaking at the General Convention of the Church of God. Cleveland. Tenn: The Mary Street Church of God, Nashville, Tenn.; the Church of the Living God, Baton Rouge, La.; the Seventh Day Baptist Church, New Orleans, La.; the House of the Eternal, New Orleans, La.; and the Alpha and Omega Mission, Harvey, La. I spent a week visiting with the People of the Living God in New Orleans, La., and presented the New Orleans chapter its charter. Then I spoke at the Apostolic Evangelistic Center, a Seventh Day Pentecostal Church in Mobile, Ala., and the House of Prayer, Birmingham, Ala. While in Birmingham our southwestern field representative, Joseph M. McGuire, and I made calls on 15 "Echoes From Eden" contacts and laid the foundation for establishing a BSA chapter in Birmingham. Then I spoke at the Seventh Day Baptist Church in North Loup, Neb.; went from there to the Fairview office, spending a week assisting the Burrells with general BSA work, and spoke at the Church of God (7th Day) at Fairview, Okla, From there I went to Meridian, Idaho, and spoke at the camp meeting of the Church of God (7th Day); the Church of God, Caldwell, Idaho; and visited with the

president of the Seventh Day Pentecostal Assemblies, Inc., Elder Garver Grav. I was invited to attend their general camp meeting, but had to decline at that time due to an already crowded schedule. From there I traveled to Michigan and spoke at the Churches of God (7th Day) at Petersburg and Monroe. Pastor W. H. McCann and I made calls on 12 contacts and laid the foundation for establishing another BSA chapter. Next I spoke at the Assembly of Yahweh, Cincinnati, Ohio; the Church of God, Crandell, Ind.; the Church of God, Central City, Ky.; and visited isolated members in Kentucky and Tennessee.

Many challenging doors of opportunity were opened to me. I tried to enter each one in faith, seeing each one as a responsibility and applying my stewardship accordingly.

The demands on my time and energy were great. I have been away from the comforts of my home, my wife, and children, but I enjoy my work: I consider the time and effort rendered for this worthy cause is an investment rather than a sacrifice.

Fountain of Youth?

HEN Dr. Wiley founded the Pure Food and Drug Administration, he wrote that in the future foods will be our medicines and our medicines will be our foods. Forty years later research has yielded dozens of specific common foods which act to maintain and/or restore diseased tissues and functions lost from degeneration due to prolonged nutritional deficiencies.

In search of long life and radiant health, researchers often agree with Josephine Lowman: "Of course there is no youth vitamin; however, vitamin C comes as near as a vitamin could. There is much evidence that vitamin C is important in delaying the aging process and that we require more of it as we grow older."

There is no evidence that vitamin C by itself can prevent aging; we need all the essential elements for vibrant health. However, this vitamin seems to be particularly effective against many of the usual signs of deterioration. A few of these are puffy gums, loss of teeth, shrinking and wrinkling, and easy bruising.

Dr. Edward Burtis in his book, The Real American Tragedy, says, "In the past nutrition has been more often scoffed at, its importance denied or discounted, than taken seriously. The obstinate pertinaciousness of this attitude underlies many of our present difficulties. It accounts for the utter complacency with which we as a nation have permitted our foods to be destroyed, our health plundered."

If many of us, rather than the almost insignificant few, had given any real thought to the most basic and vital element of our physical existence, this could not have happened and we would not be confronted with the conditions of today.

Dr. Burtis further states: "We must learn the problems we are faced with and how to overcome them to the best of our abilities something like walking through a mine field full of booby traps, with newer and more deadly ones being devised every step of the way."

Authorities generally agree that no one really dies of old age *per se*. It is this "Achilles' heel" tendency which ultimately brings about the death of most, if not all, of us except those dying from external causes.

It is a tribute to the innate intelligence placed within the body by the Creator that we manage to exist as well as we do, considering what our many requirements are and the wide gap that usually exists between these requirements and the way in which they are met. In addition to the

Though I never knew Elder C. O. Dodd, now deceased, it has been a pleasure to learn of him and his work through his writings and memories of those who did know him.

Brother Dodd's regular employment was with the Hope Natural Gas Co., of Salem, W. Va., as a district clerk for some 36 years. He was a conscientious and dedicated student of the Bible, a prolific writer on Bible subjects; and a Sabbath-keeping follower of Messiah. In addition to his full time job, Brother Dodd found time to serve as secretary-treasurer of the Church of God (7th Day) at Salem, W. Va., for about three years in the early 1930's; to edit The Bible Advocate from 1933 to 1936 and edit and publish The Faith magazine from 1937 to 1954; to write numerous religious articles and tracts; to prepare and broadcast a Bible lecture radio program in the 1930's, to preach and teach Bible subjects often; and to attend many feasts and meetings with fellow believers. He did this religious work without salary. Obviously, much midnight oil was burned to accomplish this volume of work.

Brother Dodd died in 1955, but the work he did still lives in Salem, W. Va. His widow, Sister Martha Dodd, now age 80, continues this work by republishing and distributing many of his tracts and publications. Recently she has republished the first five issues of *The Faith* magazine, originally published in 1937.
