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What Is It?

AND WHEN the children of Israel saw it, they said one to another, It is manna [meaning, "What is it?"]: for they wist not what it was. And Moses said unto them, This is the bread which the Lord hath given you to eat" (Exodus 16:15).

Because of their need for food the children of Israel had grumbled against Moses, not realizing (or perhaps not caring) that to grumble against God's appointed leader is tantamount to grumbling against God. Grumbling is a familiar characteristic of man. It is sometimes easier for a carnal man to grumble than to trust the Giver of all good gifts (James 1:17).

The story in Exodus 16 does not magnify man's fault in grumbling nearly as much as it does God's love and concern for mankind. In spite of the Israelites' lack of faith and their grumbling. God provided for their needs. It reminds us of our Savior's compassion for the multitude which had followed Him many hours and for a great distance without taking food. He worked a miracle to provide food for them rather than sending them away to faint before reaching available supplies. Again it reminds us of how He supplied our greatest of all needs in that "while we were yet sinners" and enemies of God. He died for us, at the same time commending His love for us (see Romans 5:6-8).

The Master did not argue with the children of Israel about the reality or the seriousness of their need. Rather. He employed a means of supplying their need that was designed to help them appreciate His provision for them. They had to go out and gather it in the fields every day. We are told that He cares for birds (Matthew 6:26), but many times the little sparrow has to leave his comfortable perch in a barn and go out into the wind and rain to find his food or it even has to scratch it from under snow. Even salvation through Christ, the greatest of all treasure, "is like unto treasure hid in a field" (Matthew 13:44). It must be sought after, discovered, and acquired on God's terms. He does this for our good to make us more appreciative or to make us realize that often the only real helping hand (besides His) is the one at the end of our own arm.

God's plan for the distribution of the manna reveals the sanctity of the Sabbath. "Six days ye shall gather it; but on the seventh day, which is the sabbath, in it there shall be none" (Exodus 16:2b). In our frantic search to satisfy our need for material things the Master demands that we pause, take a break, and recognize our greater need, the need for spiritual refueling and refreshing from the Lord. THE EDITOR

THOSE READERS who live in the United States finish a year-long celebration of the bicentennial of American Independence on July 4. It has been a big event to us as we realize that our nation has been independent for two hundred years. Perhaps our Canadian, Australian, and New Zealander brothers smile at our elation over "independence" when they have secured virtually the same freedoms without having to stage a revolution.

But the American Revolution was a turning point in the history of freedom. Some of the principles stated in the Declaration of Independence — equality of everyone, government by consent of the governed, the right of the people to overthrow a government that does not serve their needs — had never before been stated outside of philosophical works. Now they became the official pronouncement of a people.

But after two hundred years it is interesting (and perhaps also surprising) to speculate on how "free" we are, either as a nation or as individuals.

As individuals we find that we are more dependent on others than at any time in the history of mankind. What would most of us do for food if transportation were halted by a lengthy nationwide truckers' strike? How many of us nowadays make our own shoes or grow our own wool and flax, weave it, and make our own clothes? How many of us could even get to and from work without the aid of others — either the oil industry or the electric company?

Nationally we are dependent upon other nations for our very existence. Nations such as Rhodesia, Spain, Japan, and even the Soviet Union supply us with strategic materials that we do not have and cannot produce here.

So either as individuals or as a nation we find we are anything but independent. But — even more important — we have almost forgotten our chief dependence. Without the Lord's blessings, we could not have become great.

In a proclamation for a national day of fasting on March 30, 1863, President Lincoln wrote:

It is the duty of nations as well as of men to owe their dependence upon the overruling power of God, to confess their sins and transgressions in humble sorrow, yet with assured hope that genuine repentance will lead to mercy and pardon; and to recognize the sublime truth, announced in the Holy Scriptures and proven by all history, that those nations only are blessed whose God is the Lord. . . .

Over 70 years before, Benjamin

Franklin had said before the delegates to the Constitutional Convention in Philadelphia, "Gentlemen, I have lived a long time and am convinced that God governs the affairs of men. If a sparrow cannot fall to the ground without His notice, is it probable that an empire can rise without His aid? I therefore move that prayers imploring the assistance of heaven be held every morning before we proceed to business."

So on this Bicentennial it would be "altogether fitting and proper" to "rededicate" ourselves to the fact that we *are* dependent upon our Creator and Redeemer.

The apostle Paul realized this dependence when he declared in 2 Corinthians 5:14, 15:

We are ruled by Christ's love for us, now that we recognize that one man died for all men . . . so that those who live should no longer live for themselves, but only for him who died and was raised to life for their sake.°

We don't even belong to ourselves, for he said, in I Corinthians 6:19, 20:

Don't you know that your body is the temple of the Holy Spirit, who lives in you, and was given to you by God? You do not belong to yourselves but to God; he bought you for a price. So use your bodies for God's glory.

Most appliances come with manufacturer's instructions, which tell how they should be used. So it is reasonable to expect that people, too, come with instructions from the Manufacturer. And this is true; these instructions for the most satisfactory life of the "product" — in fact, for everlasting life — are contained in Exodus 20:2-17. (See also Matthew 19:16-19).

Among these instructions is one which says:

Observe the Sabbath, and keep it holy. You have six days in which to do your work, but the seventh day is a day of rest dedicated to me. On that day no one is to work. . . . In six days I, the Lord, made the earth, the sky, the seas, and everything in them, but on the seventh day I rested. That is why I, the Lord, blessed the Sabbath and made it holy.


But during the intervening years it seems most of the Christian world has forgotten that the seventh day is the day dedicated to Yahweh; instead they have substituted another day, the first day of the week, which has a history tainted with sun worship. It is as if a doctor prescribed a certain medicine and the pharmacist substituted not another medicine which had the same generic name but a drug with totally different characteristics.

The Commandments of God — all ten of them — need to be remembered by all nations today; they need to be observed by each individual.

In seeking to keep them, however, we run into a problem; we find that our sinful nature is not capable of living up to the Lord's ten-point standard. Then, like Paul, we are apt to cry out in despair, "O wretched man that I am!" (Romans 7:24, KJV). And in Romans 8:1 he gives the glorious answer he discovered: "There is no condemnation now for those who live in union with Christ Jesus."

That's the solution! Living "in union with Christ Jesus" gives us access to all the resources of heaven to live up to the divine standard; when we do fail, our failure is covered by Christ's righteousness. "No longer do I have a righteousness of my own, the kind to be gained by obeying the Law. I now have the righteousness that is given

One Hundred Years Old

T ALL BEGAN a hundred years ago when three men stepped from a train in Marion, Ind. June had provided a warm, clear, and beautiful day, so they immediately began looking for a lot to pitch a tent on. In just a few days the city was to hear the first Seventh-day Adventist sermon. Some people stayed, some didn't. Some came back again, others didn't. Interest was sufficient, however, to begin holding Sabbath services in homes after the tent meetings were over.

On Thanksgiving night, 1876, a church was organized with twelve charter members. As the membership increased the need for a house of worship grew. Using mostly donated lumber and a lot of donated labor, the first church house was finally finished. Years later this structure became too small, so it was moved to another part of the city and enlarged to meet the needs. As years went by this was replaced in 1954 by a larger and more beautiful house of worship made of Bedford limestone.

This, too, shall pass away, because plans are in the making to replace it. Marion is now the oldest organized Seventh-day Adventist church in Indiana. Proclaiming the seventh-day Sabbath keeps it alive and growing. June 26 was chosen for the centennial celebration.

Letter from Billy Graham Association

Dear Reverend Littrell:

Dr. Graham has asked me to thank you for your letter, and we on his counseling staff appreciate the privilege of corresponding with you.

In his book, *Practical and Perplexing Questions Answered*, R. A. Torrey suggests that there is no commandment in the Ten Commandments which says that we were to keep the seventh day of the week. The words "of the week" are added by man to the commandment as given by God. What God really commanded through Moses was: "Six days shalt thou labor and do all thy work, but the seventh day is the Sabbath of the Lord thy God." It does not say "the seventh day of the week," but rather, "the seventh day after six days of labor." Whether it should be the seventh day of the week or the first day of the week depends upon whether one is a Jew or a Christian. Whether we keep the seventh day of the week or the first day of the week, we are keeping the Fourth Commandment to the letter. If one is a Jew belonging to the old creation, let him keep the seventh day of the week, but if he is a Christian and on resurrection ground, let him keep the first day of the week, resurrection day.

The Jewish sabbath was not changed to the Lord's Day. The Lord's Day and the Jewish Sabbath, while both are a literal keeping of the Fourth Commandment, are not the same day and do not stand for the same thought. One belongs to the old creation and the other to the new. History proves that Christians kept the first day of the week in New Testament times. It was the first day of the week that the early disciples came together to break bread and also that believers gave their offerings; read Acts 20:7; I Corinthians 16:2. Paul explicitly teaches that a Christian should not allow himself to be judged in regard to the Jewish Sabbath. "So don't let anyone criticize you for what you eat or drink, or for not celebrating Jewish holidays and feasts or new moon ceremonies or Sabbaths. For these were only temporary rules that ended when Christ came. They were only shadows of the real thing — of Christ Himself" (Colossians 2:16, 17). Also read chapter 3 of Galatians.

Thank you for writing. May the Lord enrich your life, filling you with all joy and peace in believing.

Happy Birthday America!

THIS MONTH marks the two hundredth birthday of the United States of America. At this time in our nation's history there are over 116 million churchgoers in the United States — an increase of 30 percent in ten vears - vet illegitimacy has gone up 300 percent, and pornography has become a \$500 million-a-year business. Venereal disease has jumped 72 percent. Our annual crime bill is over \$20 billion and is increasing four times faster than our population. What we expend on gambling is more than all the money spent on churches, education, medicine, and cars. Our divorce rate is one in two, and our nation has five million alcoholics and three and a half million problem drinkers. Coupled with inflation, large-scale unemployment, and rapid uncertainty and unpredictability, these statistics make the situation almost unbearable.

This bicentennial celebration will remind us of people like George Washington, but when General Washington sank to his knees in the snows at Valley Forge, he had precious little hope that he would ever successfully pull off the War of Independence.

This country was torn in half in the 1860's and Americans fought Americans, but from the day that two great generals faced each other at Appomattox Court House, we started building again.

In World Wars I and II the young democratic culture helped provide the force that saved the universe from exploding into self-destruction. Through each trial and tribulation that has challenged America she has been able to pull herself up by the bootstraps and get going again. The question remains, can she do it this time?

This is not a country that depends on the ruins of the Parthenon to remind us of its greatness. This is not a country that looks to the Tower of London to recall ancient memories, nor to the pyramids and sphinx of Egypt for the glamor and genius of early men.

What is the secret of our greatness? It lies in the fact that we have acknowledged the Creator of the universe as our God and our source of strength. It was nurtured in prayer and has prospered under the special favor of God. The Bible has concluded, "Blessed is the nation whose God is the Lord [Yahweh]: and the people whom he hath chosen for his own inheritance" (Psalm 33:12).

In the early days of our country no one was ashamed to say that it was a Christian nation . . . dependent upon God. The fifty-six signers of the Declaration of Independence, among whom were such distinguished names as John Adams, Samuel Adams, John Hancock, Benjamin Harrison, and Thomas Jefferson were not reluctant to express their dependence upon

Pondering Proteins

UALIFIED nutritionists vary considerably in what they believe to be the proper amount of protein for the human diet. One writer recommends that 80 percent of the diet should be protein. Another says the equivalent of a 4 ounce steak is the minimum. Some say less, even much less. It seems good practice to reduce the animal protein as much as possible and increase vegetable protein when necessary. Animal protein breakdown leaves nitrogeneous wastes to accumulate in the tissue spaces, where it may lead to a number of chronic diseases, including arthritis.

The offical food and nutrition board of the National Research Council has set a recommended daily allowance for adults of average weight and height of 70 grams for males and 60 grams for females.

These figures are basic minimums; according to the board and other nutritionists a bit more should be added to make sure there is enough protein to make all the necessary repairs, realizing that your system may not be as efficient as the average.

Carlson Wade in his book *Miracle Protein* says, "Food protein cannot be used by your body unless it is first transformed into amino acids by enzymes.

"These protein-like substances act

to break down the protein in your food so it can be turned into amino acids and then absorbed into the bloodstream." Enzymes, Mr. Wade goes on to say, are found in raw foods such as fruits, vegetable seeds, nuts, grains, and raw juices. Without these raw food enzymes, Mr. Wade continues, food protein would remain in a lump and be useless.

So remember to begin each protein meal with a large raw fruit or vegetable salad. End each meal with a large fruit or vegetable salad or raw juice.

As you probably know, proteins are classified as essential and nonessential (speaking of their amino acid content) — not that any amino acid is actually nonessential, only that the body may synthesize the "nonessential" amino acids from other substances. We may, however, run into serious problems if we fail to consume all these ten (some say eight) essential amino acids regularly.

The list of essential amino acids, and something important to remember about each, follows:

- (1) Valine deficiency may cause nervousness, poor mental health, and insomnia.
- (2) Lysine deficiency may cause red "spider webs" in the eyes and/or chronic tiredness and fatigue.

Who's Who In the Sabbath World



Fordyce W. Detamore

Fordyce W. Detamore, an evangelist of The Voice of Prophecy Evangelistic Association, lives in Orlando, Florida.

Born in St. Paul, Minnesota, March 10, 1908, he has served many years as an evangelist and missionary of the Seventh-day Adventist faith. At age six he went with his missionary parents to Singapore, where the family spent seven years.

He was graduated from Andrews University in Michigan with the B.A. degree in 1928. The day after his graduation he married Aletha Stout. He was ordained as a minister at St. Louis, Mo., in 1935.

The Detamores then entered the work of the Seventh-day Adventist Church in Michigan, and later in Indiana. "My wife and I received a total salary of \$85 per month," says Pastor Detamore, "and our car payments were \$43! We really learned what it means to 'live by faith'!"

In 1930 a call came to administrative work in the Malayan Union Mission of the Adventist Church, where he served until his return to the United States in 1935. During these years Pastor Detamore and another missionary became the first Christian leaders to enter the wild portion of Burma to establish a mission station on 1931.

Pastor Detamore visited Philadelphia, where he studied the work of a successful evangelist. He put the new techniques to the test, baptizing 64 person in one crusade and 63 in the next one held only a few weeks later. It was in St. Louis that Pastor Detamore first began using radio in his ministry. He became convinced that a Bible correspondence school would be a good way to follow up interests created in his evangelism. He organized such a school and soon had 2,000 students enrolled.

During his work with The Voice of Prophecy Pastor Detamore initiated the Book for the Month plan and wrote and produced Bible correspondence lessons, including a course in braille for blind students.

Desiring to continue in field evangelism, he went to Texas in 1944. "From that day to this we have been literally living out of suitcases — and enjoying every minute of it," he says.

After many evangelistic campaigns throughout the southern United States, Pastor Detamore returned to the Orient, arriving in Shanghai on January 1, 1948. Next came evangelistic crusades in Hong Kong, Siam, Ceylon, Singapore and Manila.

Back in the United States in 1953,

the Detamores returned to evangelism in Texas, but crusades in which he was "on loan" took him all over the United States.

Pastor Detamore makes the base of his evangelistic operations the state of Florida, from which he has continued his practice of holding seven or eight evangelistic crusades each year.

In early 1970 Pastor Detamore joined The Voice of Prophecy Evangelistic Association, headquartered in Los Angeles, Calif. He has recently directed evangelistic crusades in San Bernardino and Sacramento, Calif; Albany, N.Y.; Indianapolis, Ind.; Phoenix, Ariz.; Modesto, Calif.; Turlock, Calif.; and Walla Walla, Wash.

The Detamores have three children.





The first American day of humiliation, fasting, and prayer, in 1776, was so designed by Congress so that the thirteen colonies might "through the merits and meditations of Jesus Christ, obtain His pardon and forgiveness."

In many other eras of this nation's history there were such times of calling the citizenry to repentance, and within my own memory there is the recall that those times were taken with a great deal more seriousness than they are by many of the leaders of our ruling bodies today. Thank God there are such men as Senators Randolph and Hatfield, Congressman Conlan, and others who speak out unashamedly about the Creator.

One of our greatest historians, Arnold Toynbee, speaks of nineteen civilizations that have existed since man began to form governments. Of the nineteen only five still remain. Ours is one of the five.

The average age of the world's greatest civilizations has been two hundred years. Whether we shall continue as a nation — or whether or not our most glorious years lie just ahead — remains to be seen. One thing, however, is sure; if we are recreant to our trust, we shall sooner or later join the procession of empires that have risen one by one, flourished, and tottered to their fall.

America does today, and always will, rate tops with me, and I want to take this opportunity to say "HAPPY BIRTHDAY AMERICA!"

some 2500 years after the heavenly Father had instituted the Sabbath at Creation He was mindful of His special day, and He required His people to recognize it too.

God's provision for our needs is sometimes not easily recognizable, especially His provision for our spiritual needs. Like the children of Israel, we may be inclined to question its worth and ask, "What is it?" His answer to our needs, like a rare coin, may be corroded or almost obscured by debris, but the trained eye will recognize it even among the ruins of a past civilization. Once retrieved, polished, and put to use, it is a thing of beauty and value.

This matter of true Christianity may not make sense to the unconverted individual. To him, seeing his Christian neighbor engage in Sabbath observance, regular church attendance, and working for community welfare programs may seem to be a waste of time, because the carnal mind does not comprehend eternal values. But to a person with spiritual understanding those same things are the answer to spiritual needs. He is willing to divest himself of all worldy possessions that he may be able to acquire such profound and "unsearchable" riches as those provided through God's abounding grace.

- (3) **Tryptophane** is important for rich red blood, youthful skin and hair, and healthy nerves.
- (4) Methionine helps remove poisonous substances and protects against destruction of delicate tissues and capillaries of the liver.
- (5) Cystine supplies over 10 percent of the insulin.
- (6) Phenylalanine is needed that the thyroid gland may secrete thyroxin. Some visual disorders may be traced to a deficiency of this amino acid.
- (7) **Arginine** deficiency may cause sterility and/or accumulation of toxic wastes.
- (8) Glutamic acid. Brain health responds to this amino acid, affecting in some situations intelligence and personality.

(9) Histidine feeds and stimulates the auditory nerve and is needed for good hearing.

(10) **Threonine** helps the digestive and intestinal tracts to function better.


