QUESTION:

What about this changing attitude toward sex among the unmarried people? It is noticeable in many countries besides our own, with some religious leaders even saying it is okay. There is a much freer attitude about it in the colleges and high schools. In many ways, the logic that is presented makes sense. What is your attitude? Are you more liberal, too, or are you still stuffy about it? Don't you think a person is better off when he enters marriage having had some sexual experience?

ANSWER:

While there is increasing talk about the freer use of sex among all types of people, married or not, there is also much argument concerning whether or not it is mostly talk. I would guess that with the increased amount of attention this subject is getting, curiosity becomes more aroused which could certainly provoke more liberal attitudes toward sexual practices and bring about a relaxation of principles.

Talk does nothing to change what is basically moral or immoral. If sex outside of marriage was ever immoral, it still is. Whether your attitude or mine gets more liberal, it does nothing whatever to change God's attitude about it.

At the risk of sounding super pious, or "goody-goody" I will suggest some Scriptural texts for your consideration. Look them up and think about them if you really want a good answer to your question. They are 1 Corinthians 6:9, 10 and 18; also, 1 Corinthians 10:6-8, with particular attention given to verse 8. I Thessalonians 4:3 simply instructs: "For this is the will of God, even your sanctification, that ye should abstain from fornication."

If your neighbor has a much better lawn mower than you do, there is a certain sense of logic involved in your simply going over and taking this newer, better machine for your own use. It is a terribly limited kind of reasoning, but it is there. It does not make the act of stealing moral.

In the very same sense, someone's ability, be he religious or not, to inject a little selfish logic into an immoral practice does not purify that misdeed!

No, I certainly do not think that a person is better off entering marriage with some sexual experience! I'm convinced that the opposite is true. There are plenty of people around who have become involved before marriage who stand ready to affirm my viewpoint. Sexual experience prior to marriage is almost always a hindering factor because it was wrongly motivated which resulted in adopting selfish and brash technique. Sex is properly the fulfillment of an expression of love. Before this love is present, the act is misused, later requiring that basic attitudes and techniques be unlearned and replaced by correct ones. This is most difficult and troublesome.

There is no better way to enter a harmonious sexual adjustment than for both partners to enter marriage unexperienced. They can then learn properly and together. While it may not be impossible to make a good adjustment at marriage, if one or both partners are experienced, you can count on the truth that it is much more difficult, and certainly a decided disadvantage.

We might as well recognize it—all this talk about free love is a part of the pattern of rebellion that becomes more and more characteristic of our age. The truism that the real values of any society are found in its ability to exercise obedience is sadly ignored. The more we rebel, the more miserable we become. A university near my home is offering a class in how to protest. It is actually instruction in how to secure and guarantee misery.

If you, or any other youth, want anything out of life that is worth-while and fulfilling, learn how to recognize and deal with rebellion. Fight it by practicing obedience and helping others to learn the same. This advice undoubtedly sounds stuffy now, but it is a vehicle that will take you a mighty fine distance to places worth seeing!

By the way, it took courage to ask your questions. I appreciate it! I hope this answer helps.

OUESTION:

What advice do you have for teenagers who think they know more than their parents do?

ANSWER:

Your question tends to put me on the spot! Teen-agers who suppose they know more than their parents do have probably already concluded that they know much more than I do.

I suggest that a youth can handle this delicate situation if he understands some of the reasons for his attitude. Parents need some pretty good insight here, too.

When one reaches his teens, he finds that his body, with its glandular development is maturing rapidly. He begins to look adult, and he finds his adult appetites coming to life. He can do more work. He eats more, and he takes a little more time to observe and attempt to gain the attention of members of the opposite sex. Unfortunately, some of these physical developments come more

quickly than his mental and emotional capacity to discipline himself properly. This, in itself, forces many a youth into awkward conflict.

This conflict almost necessarily involves the parents. If one does not have the faculties to make adult decisions consistent with his adult stature, his parents must continue to give guidance, as they did before the physical maturity. So, in many of these complex situations a young man or lady is insisting upon being treated with the full respect due an adult, but he cannot understand that it takes more than physical development to get by. His parents remain unconvinced that he is fully capable of making all the decisions, and they will

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withhold their complete confidence, which is frustrating to a youth.

Many young people, for instance, feel that they know best when it is time to get home at night following a date or evening activities. While they insist they can handle a responsible decision, they often come in far too late, and involve themselves in activities during these late hours which attest only to their inability to discipline their matured physical appetites.

There is no doubt but what parents are often guilty of wanting to treat teen-agers as children. The duty to treat young men and women with the precise amount of respect due them at their particular development is one demanding the keenest wisdom and understanding.

The advanced methods for learning with the many discoveries and inventions make it probable that in many areas a teen-ager actually knows more than his parents. He is enlightened in some areas that are not understood by his father and mother. Realizing that he knows more about some phases of existence, a youth has a strong tendency to try to extend this advantage into all aspects of life. This is a sad and aggravating mistake.

This rather critical period of adjustment is best survived by abundant and patient communication. Talk seriously and often with your parents. In this way you will come to respect what knowledge and perception they have gained through long and valuable experience. At the same time, they will come to appreciate the rather curious, interesting and valuable knowledge you have received through studies and observation. All of this talk will give you a continual chance to measure your parents, and at the same time they will be able to size you up more accurately.

By all means remember to be courteous. You do not have to agree with a person to respect him. Respect is appreciation. Without appreciation your world will shrink and continue doing so until only you exist in it. What a lousy world that makes! The sooner you gain a sense of appreciation and awareness, the sooner you will gain the ability to be respectful.

This is one of the surest signs of maturity. Everyone will recognize it. which will relieve you of your selfassigned obligation of having to show your parents, or anyone else, how much you know and how adult you are.

QUESTION:

How long must a girl know a boy before she should accept a date with him?

ANSWER:

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Good question! No simple, all-inclusive answer can be given because there are so many circumstances to consider.

If a young man comes from a reliable family background and has a reputation consistent with his family's, or if you have heard of the young man for some time and have friends who know him and can youch for him, you might safely accept a date soon after your introduction.

On the other hand, if you just get acquainted at school and in some situation where you know nothing of the young man other than what you see and hear of him at the moment, it would pay to be cautious until you are sure that he will provide the kind of company that will be enjoyable.

It also depends on where you are going and what you plan to do. If you are being asked to go with some other couple to an event at your own church, it would seem quite acceptable to date early.

An evening out with good company, doing something worthwhile, can be most rewarding. If, however, you fail to exercise enough caution, you can end up having one of the most miserable experiences of a lifetime. Be sure you know what you are doing, when you accept a date. There is great danger in accepting an invitation too quickly.

OUESTION:

I want to wear my hair long like many of the other fellows are doing, but I am getting a lot of static from my parents about it. In fact, they just won't let me. What is wrong with long hair, anyway? Lots of others get to wear their hair long. I'm 15. Don't you think I'm old enough to know what I'm doing without all the nixing from my parents? So they don't agree with my taste—I don't agree with theirs!

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ANSWER:

There is one thing you ought to get clear—crystal clear. That taste you think you have is not taste! You are just afraid you will be caught not conforming to some odd notions, even if that conformity makes you look like a displaced female gorilla!

You might as well see the light, friend, the task of trying to pass off long hair on a male as good taste is utterly impossible. You make the sad mistake of so many other ignorant and misguided narcicists, who attempt to apply acceptable labels to demonstrations of rebellion. It is a frustrating journey to untold misery, and only a self-awakening within you can prevent future anguish.

While we must exercise as much patience and kindness in church as possible, I sincerely hope that your teacher will not allow these overgrown children to disrupt the valuable and short time you have in class to learn and discuss the precious and abiding Word of God. OUESTION:

What can be done to make the Sabbath school class more interesting?

ANSWER:

Making a Sabbath school class interesting requires effort. An old bromide suggests that in order to get something out of class you must put something into it.

Study your lesson during the week. Make every attempt to try to understand what each question is trying to teach. Determine how references given in the lesson fit into the context of the chapter from which they are taken.

Write down any questions that come up during your home study. Ask them of the teacher or class when you get to that part of the lesson in Sabbath school. If you have an interesting observation to make about a point in the lesson, write that down, too, and offer it in class.

Many youth classes have no commenting or discussing at all. They probably would if they had some young person in the class who would lead out. Personal study through the week qualifies a person to ask questions and make comments. Others will follow the example.

If you have suggestions to make to your teacher that would help make the class more interesting, advise him. If he seems negligent about giving them a try without offering a reason, talk to your pastor.

I like your question. If these ideas make sense to you, I surely hope you'll give them a try!

OUESTION:

Is it contrary to church teaching to wear costume jewelry, such as bracelets, earrings, rings, necklaces, etc.? What about the use of natural makeup or nail polish? Many people in our church wear it. What does the Bible sav?

ANSWER:

I'll give you a partial answer and ask that the subject be brought to the attention of your pastor, Sabbath school teacher, or other established leader in the local church.

This question has to do with cultural standards. This kind of standard is well characterized as being relative, being determined largely by the culture in which a person lives. This is why those who live near you must give the more specific answers to this kind of question.

The fact that standards are relative is proven by their continual change; from generation to generation, and location to location. What was wrong years ago may be tolerated (even fully accepted) now, such as transparent hose, dresses with short sleeves and hemlines, curled hair on the ladies, etc. With these changes a person's attitude toward them classifies him as one who is liberal (accepts changes readily) or conservative (tends to resist change). Most people feel they are moderate, not resisting change much, nor accepting too readily.

What is acceptable or not must be determined by local brethren because these are the standards that influence an image of the church in its community. Once the image has been established, it is rather important that a local member respect it. There is constant danger that where the church has established an image in the community, and a single person chooses to ignore it, that individual might be considered as one who disavows the teachings of his church. One ought to be very careful not to give that kind of witness. Please consult your pastor and listen with open heart to what he has to advise concerning these standards.

To see what the Bible has to say, you might consider Isaiah 3:16-26; 1 Timothy 2:8-15; 1 Peter 3:1-9. Study these references at length until you feel you understand as accurately as possible what the Scriptures teach in these passages.

Church

We find that the church was first established after Christ had ascended into heaven. The name of the first Church was the Church of God, and by what information we have in the Bible it was composed of Christians. The name Christian was probably first applied to Christ's followers by the Pharisees and Scribes in reproach or contempt, because they were followers of Christ, just as other people were called Galileans or Nazarenes.

When I think of the name *Christian*, and how we apply it to ourselves, I am made to wonder if we live up to the standards that the first church had—or do we disgrace it?

We find in Ephesians 1:22, 23 that the church is the body of Christ; and Ephesians 5:24 tells us that the church is subject unto Him. We Christians

form the Church, so we are subject to and must be obedient to Christ.

Jesus told the disciples in Matthew 28:20 to teach and observe all things whatsoever He commanded them. In order for us to be Christ's body and be true Christians we also must teach and observe what Jesus taught. We must pattern our lives after some image, the image being Christ. 1 Peter 2:21 tells us Christ was our example; therefore let us be followers of Christ in truth and righteousness.

In order for us to be like Jesus, Jesus told us to pray always (Luke 18:1 and 21:36). The more you pray, the closer you are to Him. David's prayer was Psalm 119:18: "Open thou mine eyes, that I may behold wondrous things out of thy law." We must know about Jesus so we can follow Him. Paul said, "Study to shew thyself approved

For even hereunto were ye called: because Christ also suffered for us, leaving us an example, that ye should follow his steps (1 Peter 2:21).

unto God."

OUESTION:

I do not know for sure what I would like to be when I am ready to enter a vocation. Does our church have women missionaries? Is it all right for a woman to be a missionary?

ANSWER:

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The standard role of any minister in response to questions like this is to say, "Wonderful! The Lord needs missionaries, and I'm sure you will make a good one!" My answer is going to be more involved. I hope that other young people will read this and feel moved to do something in response to it.

It is Scripturally permissible for a woman to be a missionary. I doubt there is much to discuss about that. The New Testament refers to several women who were active in the work of the Church.

"Does our church have missionaries?" I presume by this question you refer to people of our country who are serving on foreign soil. The answer is "No."

Worse yet, according to present trends, by the time you will be ready to go, you will not be a missionary in our church because the church will

be in no position to make use of your services—unless significant changes in attitude and purpose are made quickly. At present our church pays only the slightest heed to the needs we have in foreign fields. We retain a good foreign work because the loyalty and faithfulness of our workers in foreign fields are much stronger toward us than ours are to them.

We spend barely 1% of our church dollar on foreign work. Recently, an appeal was made to double this amount by requesting that 1% be added to support our foreign missions work (making it 2¢ of every \$1.00 spent). The proposal was rejected-not because of any attitude on the part of a few who had to make the immediate decision, but because they reflected the thinking of too large a segment of our church.

Am I suggesting that you give up the notion of being a foreign missionary? To the contrary, you and many young people like you must become missionaries for the cause of missions at home. Become active boosters of our foreign missions work in your own local churches. There are many ways in which this can be done.

1. Read as much as you can about

foreign missionary work, including accounts of the activities of actual missionaries. Learn what it is all about so that when you speak to others they will be impressed by how much you know about it.

- 2. At youth meetings, have periodic themes that deal with foreign missions. Beyond this, suggest that your pastor use foreign missions as a theme for the regular church services. Encourage special offerings in connection with these services, so that the folks attending will have opportunity to actually do something to express their new burden for the foreign work.
- 3. As you have opportunity to talk to ministers and leaders of the church, bring up the matter of missionary work and suggest that it be given more support-financial and in every other way. It needs to be "talked up."
 - 4. Contact the National Youth De-

partment to find out ways in which you may get into contact with young people in foreign lands to correspond with them, if you have not already done so. Your letters of encouragement to them will be the beginning of your career in foreign missions work.

As a church we simply must awake to the burdens we should help bear in distant lands. If those of us who are more established in the church cannot presently see the need, we will have to hope that the coming generation will catch the vision and exercise responsibility toward it. If we do not act soon, it will be difficult to give answer to a Righteous Judge. Pray much. I will be remembering you, praying that God will give you and many other young people much success in arousing a new understanding of the compelling needs in our foreign fields.

OUESTION:

How long should teen-agers be expected to give in to their parents? Shouldn't an older teen-ager have some independence in his home?

ANSWER:

When he calls the home "his," I presume he is speaking about the one that his parents have provided and share with him. I would guess that this teen-ager is actually wanting some freedom, rather than independence. To be independent suggests that one supports himself and assumes full responsibility for his existence and well-being. This is more obligation than most youthful freedom-seekers bargain for.

If there is going to be any order in a home, someone must have the authority to declare a final decision. Parents are more qualified to assume this responsibility than teen-agers. There is one worthy and underlying reason for giving parents the sayso. They know more and are more often correct. We survive and learn to get along well when we learn to do what is right.

Freedoms are secured as one matures. Maturity is largely demonstrating ability to assume responsibility. Freedom and responsibility always go hand in hand.

A teen-ager should expect to give in to his parents as long as he shares a home with them. No one has independence while he remains part of a family unit. He will be given added freedom, though, as he proves that he has enough maturity to be responsible for it.

QUESTION:

Do you think that Christian young people should listen to today's modern music?

ANSWER:

No, I don't. In fact, I don't think anyone ought to listen to the greatest share of the pop music assaulting the ears nowadays. It is too bad that social pressures keep young people who are unable to break chains of conformity bound to these musical cesspools. While some may not like my stating so, I'm convinced that most young people, who claim they like the noisy, thumpy, monotonous strains by hairy humans with effeminate voices, are being both artificial and naive.

These shaggy-haired, herky-jerky

"musicians" come closest to proving the Darwinian theory that man evolved from the ape of any evidence offered to date! We have some people coming to our church who don't go along with proper church standards. I say this because the lady wears make-up and other such things that we don't allow. Why isn't something done about this?

ANSWER:

Sometimes in our youth and enthusiasm for the Church and what it stands for we tend to become a bit impatient when others do not readily accept our mannerisms, tastes, and habits.

It takes time for people who are newly introduced to our church to understand why we have certain attitudes toward dress and the use of cosmetics. If these people are earnestly seeking what is right, and if our standards are right, the seekers and standards will get together in time.

Your question reflects a rather disapproving attitude on your part toward these people. You are not the only one who tends to react this way toward those who do not conform to our traditional standards, but such an attitude is both harmful to you and the Church. You apparently feel that unless these people look and be-

have like you, or like you think they ought, that they need to be "straightened out." It is better to try to understand people than to judge their moral worth, and your self-righteous attitude is preventing that.

Be sure to do what you think is right. On the other hand, do not make acceptance of your standard by others a qualification to earning your fellowship, respect, and loving acceptance. Be Christ-like. If Jesus were to love only those whose actions and appearance He approved of, we would all be doomed. I'm thankful He had the compassion to show concern to an erring sinner.

QUESTION:

This boy and I have been going together for over a year, and we are beginning to talk about marriage. I am bothered, though, when I see him sneak a look at other girls, and I can't convince myself that he would always be faithful to me. Do you suppose that we should continue seeing each other?

ANSWER:

If your friend gives you the impression that the girls he sees are more attractive to him, and that he

would probably prefer to be with them, you have cause to be apprehensive. On the other hand, you must realize that just going with you does not eliminate the entire female sex from your boyfriend's eyesight. Some girls want to draw attention, and they succeed.

Marriage is based on mutual faith in each other, or it will suffer from false accusation and suspicion constantly. There is nothing that will convince you that your mate will always be faithful to you if you stand ready to suspect him and look for proof of his unfaithfulness.

Whatever the circumstances are involving his "sneak" looks at other girls, you ought not to marry until you

have confidence in each other, and you are quite sure that the confidence will remain. If he has tendencies to be unfaithful, the marriage would do you an injustice. At the same time, if you are overly suspicious and refuse to place confidence in him, you should spare him the agony of being married to one who provides no faith to live up to.

Your suspicions will either get more intense or they will disappear. If faith replaces them and other circumstances are favorable, there is no reason why you should not become more serious in your relationship. On the other hand, as suspicions grow stronger, you would do well to let the romance fade away.

Youth Questions answered by Ray L. Straub



QUESTION:

I really feel that I'm a born-again Christian, but for some reason I cannot be sure that I have as much inner peace as I should. For one thing, there seems to be so little accomplished in our church, and I can't even say that I'm doing all I can. What can I do to get more of a feeling of "success" into my Christianity?

ANSWER:

Some question. Many of us have been trying to answer it from the pulpits, through the printed page, and via other methods of communication for years. Of course, having the right answer and putting it to use are quite different.

Instead of sermonizing here, I'll just list a few points briefly, based as directly as possible on your question.

In reporting your new birth, you reported at the same time that you were called to a vocation (Ephesians 4:1). This means work. Be a willing worker in your church, and do not easily dismiss positions you have not held previously. You are young enough to learn.

All of us have limitations. If you

feel you must refuse a position on the basis of limitations, and it is an honest refusal, you have justification. When you become selective in accepting positions just because you prefer not to serve, you've cheapened the extent of dedication to your heavenly calling, and satisfaction has been turned over to your enemy.

Beware of making a mockery of your determination to put God first. Some people "put God first," but they let P.T.A., social organizations, extra income projects, television, quiet times with their family, etc., take precedence over their responsibility in advancing the cause of Christ. No one can respect that kind of an employee; why should we presume God should be satisfied with him?

Your happiness in Christ is not dependent upon your evaluation of how much the Church is doing. Far too many people have their joy in Christ drained from them because a lack of confidence in the church's progress

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has thrown bitterness into their fountains. The church is what you are. If you are a good and willing worker. the Church will go places. Your criticism of your church is like a criticism of your family-it directly reflects back on you.

You would do well to consider that while the Church probably ought to be doing more, it is presently seeing some of its strongest and most progressive times in years. It could do even better if it had a greater degree of your dedication.

Finally, stop worrying about your own success, or your own happiness in serving our Master. Be concerned about others. Do all you can to add to the spiritual well-being of your fellow members. Encourage everyone you can, because they need your support. Be a "live wire" in your church, ready always to participate with enthusiasm. Comment in class. Testify when given opportunity. If you have musical ability, use it. Share progressive ideas with leaders. Offer to work with the youth and children. Seek out and become acquainted with visitors. Be cheerful to everyone. When your life becomes lost in happiness of others, you will have a surprising and abundant answer to your very worthwhile question.

QUESTION:

Why is it so important that I attend all of our youth meetings? I'm willing to go to some, but at other times I would prefer to go elsewhere. I really don't see why the Church places so much emphasis on church attendance.

ANSWER:

Your parents and leaders of the church are sincerely interested in

what is good for you. Attending church is one of the most excellent activities for anyone.

Young people have long lives ahead of them. The sooner they learn good influences to follow, and are convinced that these are worthwhile the quicker their lives will take on deeper mean-

For a young person, satisfaction is not easily found. While it hardly seems believable at times, more satisfaction can be gained out of attending church -particularly youth meetings, than most other activities.

The church, in its necessary work and goals needs consistent support. It needs your support. Your presence there helps a great deal-more than you can imagine. Your absence causes some injury, often more than a person realizes.

Support your church work as much as you can. It will not be long until you realize fully that you have invested wisely in a most worthwhile cause.

TO BE TRULY GREAT IS TO-

Strive for self-improvement, and yet to be charitable toward those who are satisfied to remain mediocre.

To continue one's education all through life, yet to not scorn those who are unlearned.

To be reaching ever for a greater degree of culture and refinement; yet to be tolerant of those who have neither culture nor refinement.

To do one's best to be a success in one's chosen profession; yet to look not with contempt upon one who fails.

To be great, not scorning the lowly. In fact only with true greatness comes true charity for all who have not attained the heights one has gained.

Youth Questions answered by Ray L. Straub



OUESTION:

The church (ministers) seem to have definite ideas on what is right and wrong. Why don't they preach on it more? Is it because there is so little agreement amongst the ministers? Why are you so reluctant to take a definite stand in this column?

ANSWER:

Most questions I receive are concerned with the question of what is permissible and which activities should be shunned. Yours is the most "loaded."

It is my opinion that the ministers preach on these matters quite a lot. Some dwell on them more than others, but a large segment of any minister's audience will learn rather rapidly over a short period of time where their pastor stands.

Each minister has his own approach on how to deal with these issues. In my opinion, more can be gained through dialogue with young people; that is, in a type of meeting where direct questions can be asked and answered. In this way, specific reasons can be given for specific attitudes.

Any lack of preaching on this sub-

ject would not be due to disagreement amongst ministers. In fact, disagreement tends to cause more expression, not less.

The nature of standards is such that there will always be some disagreement concerning them. Lack of uniform thinking was always manifest during the Apostle Paul's ministry. Standards change from time to time and from place to place. It would be a terribly static church that did not have some varying viewpoints concerning its standards. The amount of disagreement cannot be considered nearly vast enough to be serious. Few churches experience more harmony amongst the ministers than ours, particularly in view of the freedom they have in the Church to express themselves on these matters.

It is because standards relate to the communities in which we live that I do not give specific recommenda-

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tions in this column. What is permissible in one area can easily be offensive in another. An inquirer needs to discuss specific taboos with their pastor or minister nearest them. If you move into our community it will not be long before you have some idea where I stand.

OUESTION:

What is a good argument against evolution?

ANSWER:

1. It is not logical to believe that the cosmos came out of chaos. Any masterpiece in planning and organization results from intelligence. It takes a precise amount of measuring, beating, and baking to make a good cake. It takes precise chords to compose good music, and it takes a correct alignment of words to write a good thesis or book. Understanding this, how can one believe that anything as beautifully organized as this universe came about through accident?

2. There is no known explanation for beginnings. The mind can only go so far until its incapabilities leave it dangling. Experiencing this, it leaves us with only one believable explanation-way back God existed "in the beginning." I admit, readily, that this is no proof that God exists. However, believing He existed in the beginning, it is logical that He created the earth and set the universe in motion.

3. There is neither agreement nor proof supporting the evolution of the species. No valid proof exists that there has ever been a change from one species to another. Changes have come about only within the species.

4. The best argument against evolu-

tion is to get to know the Creator personally.

OUESTION:

How old should persons be before they begin kissing?

ANSWER:

Most of us have kissed someone or other almost all of our lives! Seriously, though, I understand that this involves boy-girl relationships, and it is a good question. The value of any item is determined somewhat by its supply. This is particularly true in the matter of gems, antiques, stamps, coins, etc. No one gets too concerned about an item that can be picked up anywhere at any time. Kissing is something like this. For it to have value, to be meaningful, it should be used sparingly.

Dating should be getting somewhat serious before there is much of this kissing business. It should be an expression of affection for a partner, not a mere conquest to boast about to others.

Kissing can be dangerous exercise. It should be restricted to those people and occasions that will keep it from going farther, if those indulging are unmarried.

How old should a person be? Actually age does not dictate the appropriate use of a kiss. It would seem that anyone younger than late high school age is rushing things. The questioner sounds anxious. I hope he is not. There is no value gained in having a great experience and reputation as a kisser!

OUESTION:

As you know, there are many activities—ball games and social affairs -that are held on Friday night. In order to get full value from my school activities, why shouldn't I be permitted to attend these functions?

ANSWER:

Because you will get far more values out of your religion by being true to it. Missing these functions on Friday night will, admittedly, cause you to miss opportunities to join your classmates in social events, deny you the privilege of being a cheerleader, member of the band (perhaps), and other extra-curricular activities. It is a sacrifice. It is one you need to make.

You are a Sabbathkeeper. It is a life of obedience to God that you want to convey, more than to participate freely in school activity. If you are a Sabbathkeeper, you observe the Sabbath. It is simple in its analysis, even though difficult to live by completely.

Many of our young people had to give up Friday night activities while attending a public school, and they were well-accepted by their classmates. You do not need these activities to have a full school life, in most cases.

If this problem causes you consistent difficulty-or any problems at all, you should consider enrolling in Spring Vale Academy.

OUESTION:

I plan to be married soon. What are some of the issues you think should be settled before marriage? What do you think of church weddings? Are you in favor of big weddings?

ANSWER:

Before marriage, you should decide your religious affiliation, if you need to. Further, you should decide with determination that you will support that religion.

You should have agreement on the approximate number of children

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you wish to have. It need not be precise, but if you want several and your "intended" wants none, you had better look for someone else! Further, you should have some idea as to when you think it appropriate to have the first baby.

You should have some notion of which vocation each of you has in mind. Some women prefer working out to remaining home with housework, while some men are determined that their wives will remain home. Some newly-wed husbands expected that their wives would get a job to supply a good financial start, and the brides had no such intention. Some young men are content to have a comfortable income in modest surroundings, but their wives have the urge to climb the social and economic ladder. Any such differences should be exposed and reconciled be-

fore the trip to the altar.

I have a strong preference for church weddings. In the case of a pre-marital pregnancy, I consider it appropriate to slip off to a justice of the peace, although I do not consider that a small ceremony performed by a minister is lacking in good taste. I question the wisdom of a large wedding where it is a second marriage for either or both partners.

For young people entering the first marriage, I am all for big church weddings, provided that such a venture does not bring financial ruin to someone. A large wedding is a great lot of work and tries the patience. It leaves a bride exhausted on her wedding day quite often, but for all that, it is worth it. The memories you take from such an occasion enhance marriage in a way that no other occasion can. I support big weddingsup to a reasonable degree.
