Work Accelerates At Furious Pace

The BOOMING Work of God is shooting ahead at a new dynamic pace! Astounding growth, challenging assignments, a new foreign office opened, more radio stations added and plans to expand into **READER'S DIGEST** in **SIXTEEN** different countries are marking the new stepped-up pace!

Skyrocketing mail receipts flashed past the first half of 1962 with a **BIG 64%** increase! The total number of letters received for the first six months of 1962 was 593,212! While the Work of God races ahead with phenomenal growth, our Pan American Advertising Agency reported that other religious works are **down 15%** and **MORE** for the same period!

Good news! Big news! God's Work thrusts forward into India, Africa, the Middle East and Europe.

The contract has been signed for opening an office in **Dusseldorf, Germany**. A suite of five rooms will be ready for occupancy within a few weeks. Five more rooms are available as an addition when required.

One of the German-born students from Ambassador College in Pasadena, Mr. Frank Schnee will move to Germany with his wife and two children to take charge of the office there. This phase of the work will be directed from the Bricket Wood office by Mr. Gerhard Marx, also German-born and a graduate of Ambassador College.

To step up the **spiritual Gospel offensive on Germany**, there will be a monthly purchase of **two pages** each issue in the **German** edition of **Reader's Digest** and also the Austrian edition—a total circulation of 1,015,000 copies. This means actually between **three million and five million** readers.

Mr. Longuskie will rendezvous with Mr. Waterhouse to help lay the groundwork for the office that will fill the multiple hundreds of requests for literature prompted by the ads now appearing in the **PHILIPPINES FREE PRESS**.

Mr. Arthur Craig, who was leading a baptismal tour, received word to immediately take over the pastorate of the Opp and Montgomery, Alabama churches vacated by Mr. Waterhouse. Mr. Hal Baird then replaced Mr. Craig as leader of the tour covering the southeast, and to continue the whirlwind pace, Mr. John Bald took over the pastorate of the St. Louis and Bloomington churches in place of Mr. Baird!

Three more Ambassador graduates are being transferred "down under" for thrilling and challenging new assignments. Slated to depart for Australia in a few short weeks are Messrs. Bill Myers, Leroy Cole and Miss Jessie Emmet. Mr. Myers will replace Mr. Frank Longuskie in the office, Mr. Cole will double in the office and also in visiting, and Miss Emmett will be the new receptionist and secretary to Mr. Wayne Cole.

On the other side of the world, Ambassador College, U. K., awaits the arrival of Mr. and Mrs. Dart, (formerly scheduled to open the Indianapolis church,) to its teaching staff for this fall.

Meanwhile two new radio stations have been added to the log—**KMAC, San**

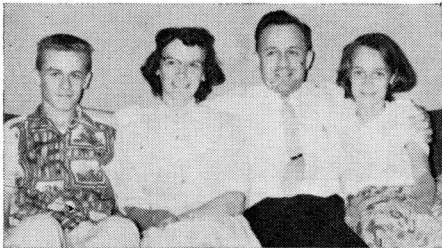

little of South Bend's Church history. Mr. Dean Blackwell started a Bible Study in March of 1961, with seventy-five in attendance. After about four months of Bible studies, Church services began with about one hundred fifty in attendance. By the third week there were two hundred and twenty! In the fall of 1961, Mr. Frank McCrady moved to South Bend to feed the newly formed Church and rapid growth continued; by the first of the year as many as two hundred and fifty were attending. Following the ministerial conference in January 1962 a new minister (to this area) was sent to South Bend.



Mr. and Mrs. Lester McColm and their two fine teen-aged children arrived at South Bend, and moved into the apartment vacated by Mr. McCrady.

Mr. McColm's spiritual begettal oc-

curred in the Pacific Northwest where his parents had moved during the thirties of dust bowl fame. This was a "Grapes of Wrath" exodus from North Dakota.

Mrs. McColm was called first, causing many a stormy day at the McColm home. God soon opened Mr. McColm's eyes, and I believe the first scripture he read was—"Whatever you set your hand to do, do with your might" (Ecc. 9:10). In two years he was ordained a deacon, and under the tutorship of Mr. Raymond Cole he was soon giving sermonettes, and in 1961 he was ordained a Local Elder. The McColm family was next moved to Salem, Oregon to assist in the Church there, and in the fall of 1961 the entire family moved to Pasadena where Mr. McColm attended Ambassador College for one semester.

Since their arrival at South Bend the Church has continued to grow at an accelerated pace with as many as three hundred and eighty-five attending Sabbath services.

With brethren scattered over three states, Michigan, Indiana and Ohio, Mr. McColm found it impossible to counsel as he had hoped, especially with prospective letters coming from Pasadena at the rate of one per day.

The answer was evident—group councils on Bible Studies would help. The Glen Keeley family graciously opened their home (located near Gobles, Michigan,) to cover South Western Michigan and to date the highest attendance has been seventy-seven. To help the Indiana and Ohio area a Bible Study was inaugurated at Fort Wayne with up to sixty-three attending. To help those farther north in Michigan a Bible Study has been conducted at the home of Mr. Neil Skinner, west of Shelby, Michigan.

The training of leaders for the Church and the home, as well as for the coming Kingdom of God, has not been neglected. The night of May 6 brought a group of thrilled men to the plush Pick Oliver Hotel for their first Spokesman Club meeting. After several meetings it became evident a second club was needed.

For the Sunday morning club Mr. Joseph Tkach was imported from Chicago to take over the duties of President. Other Club officers are—Vice-president, Mr. James Hambrock; Secretary, Mr. H. Huber; Treasurer, Mr. J. Buckley and Sergeant at Arms, Mr. G. Keeley.

The Sunday evening Club is presided over by your writer, Mr. R. Van Slooten. The other officers are—Vice-president, Mr. R. Johnson; Secretary, Mr. J. Moore; Treasurer, Mr. J. Hosterman; Sergeant-at-Arms, Mr. G. Johnson.

Australia — Part 5

Early in March an unprecedented event occurred—three arrivals in one day! Gene Hughes and wife with son, John, arrived at Mascot from the U.S. just a few minutes before Mr. Waterhouse's return from Manila, followed by the arrival of Mr. Portune, a flight behind him.

Mr. Hughes arrived as the Work expanded to become the Business Manager of the office under Mr. Waterhouse. The two ministers had rendezvoused in the Philippines to survey the Work there. Under Mr. Ortiguero's direction the Philippines showed great possibilities for adding more radio stations as God directs, and conversion of many people there. Groups scattered through the Islands observed the Sabbath and Holy Days.

Then came news of the proposed ex-

pansion to Africa, with Mr. Waterhouse leaving Australia to direct this new office.

Sunday, 7 January 1962, Mr. Tony Hammer stopped in Sydney while on his way to the Ministerial Conference. Days later it was announced that Mr. Waterhouse was not to return to Australia, and that Mr. Wayne Cole was officially the director placed in charge of the Australian Work. This event brings us up to the present. *Since its beginning the work that God began here in Australia has taken tremendous leaps and shown phenomenal growth. A great deal of respect goes to the first director sent here—Mr. Gerald D. Waterhouse, for his diligence in doing God's will. For his part in this growth, we salute him, but as he himself would be the first to admit, this work is just "beginning to get ready to commence to start". So while we can rejoice in what has been done, let's at the same time set our hands to the plow that we have been given.*

It has been arranged to purchase two pages every month in the FRENCH edition of Reader's Digest, probably by early autumn.
