Wonders of the Universe

Let us take a look at our galaxy. The nearest galaxy to ours is the spiral nebula of Andromeda. Imagine that we are there and that we are trying to find the earth. From our stellar map, we find that the earth is one of nine planets circling the star called the sun. This sun is located in the galaxy called the Milky Way. So we head in that direction, travelling at 186,000 miles per second. Finally, after traveling at this speed of light for 750,000 years, we reach the vicinity of the Milky Way. We are looking for the star we know as our sun; it is actually one of the smaller stars even though it is 800,000 miles in diameter. There are some stars so large that if the sun were placed at their centers, they would completely envelop our entire solar system and extend far beyond.

Now we look in the direction of the sun and there we see a star which we think is the sun, but on close examination we find it to be the sun's nearest neighbor star Alpha Centauri. Continuing our travel then toward the sun at the speed of light we reach the vicinity of the sun and its solar system in about four years. There we see the sun and its nine planets circling about it and sure enough there is the planet earth.

Just what is so outstanding about the planet earth? It does not have the beautiful rings of Saturn, nor the enormous size of Jupiter. Let us take a closer look at the earth and see if we can find anything outstanding on this planet. Yes! There is something different—there is life on this planet and there is a very delicate balance of everything for this life to exist.

The earth rotates on its axis in 24 hours or one thousand miles per hour. What if it rotated at the rate of 100 miles per hour? Then our days and nights would be ten times longer and the hot sun of summer would burn up the vegetation and the long nights would freeze it.

The sun has a surface temperature of 12,000 degrees Fahrenheit, and our earth is far enough away so we are warmed just enough. If the temperature of the earth changed so much as 50 degrees average for one year, all vegetation and man would be dead, either roasted or frozen. The earth travels around the sun at 18 miles per second. If the rate of revolution had been, say, 6 miles or 40 miles per second, the seasons would change too fast for our form of life to exist.

Many thousands of conditions have to be exactly right. Suppose you take ten pennies, mark them 1 to 10, put them in your pocket and shake them well. Now try to draw them out in sequence 1 to 10. Your chance of drawing No. 1 is 1 to 10. The probability of drawing 1 and 2 in succession is 1 to 720, and your chance of drawing No. 1 to 10 in succession would be the unbelievable figure of one chance in 3,628,800.

So many essential conditions are necessary for life to exist on our earth that it is mathematically impossible that all of them could exist in proper relationship by chance at one time.

There must be some form of intelligent direction. Since this is true, there must be a purpose for it all. You and I know what that great purpose is. We know that God, the Architect of the universe, did not build a stairway leading nowhere! Even as David said in Psalm 8:4—"What is man that You are mindful of him?" Yet we have been given the opportunity to inherit all this universe.

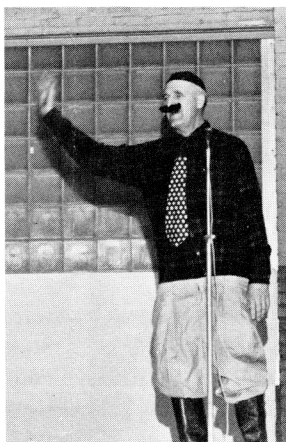

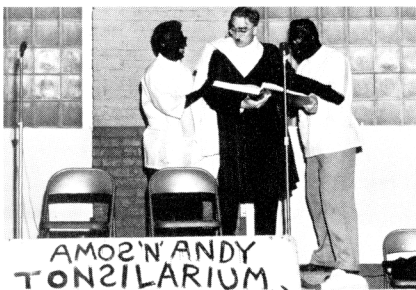

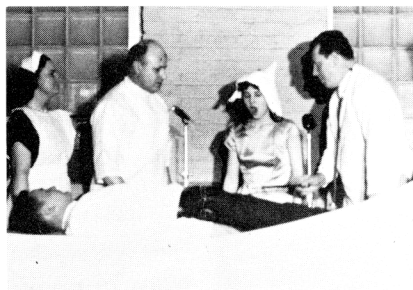
Amos (Mr. Pyle) and Andy (Mr. Blackwell) stop the show with balanced humor and antics.

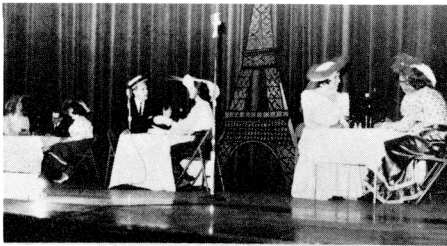

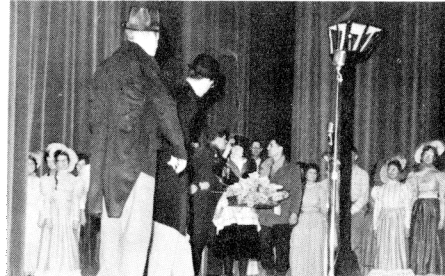

question asked by visiting Pastor Dr. Charles Dorothy in the morning service. YOU have SINS you need to repent of! We need to be concerned about our relationship with God. We all need to realize that Christ **paid** the price of sin so we could sit here today. Will you really be sitting here next year—or will bitterness or neglect keep you away? Christ was despised and rejected by men (Isa. 53:3). **THIS INCLUDES CHURCH MEMBERS.** How often do WE despise Christ by our actions? Repentance is **ABSOLUTELY NECESSARY**—an essential qualification to eternal life! Repentance is a **DAY BY DAY** process; it is repeated and progressive. We need to be ashamed of our sins; Christ was wounded and beaten **FOR US**—think about that the next time you want to sin!!

God's minister in the two Wisconsin churches, Mr. George Meeker, spotlighted the necessity to study and know God's word. The twelve disciples were not just simple fishermen. They anticipated Christ's coming (John 1:38,41). Philip and Nathaniel **KNEW** the scriptures (John 1:45,46). Even the Pharisees knew that Christ came from God (John 3:2).
