HOW TO DO IT

WATER SAVERS

Pay for what you USE not what you LOSE. This can be good advice as we see the price of water go up and up as well as see our precious water reserves go down and down. The following are some points that can help you save money and water.

Inside Use

1. Don't let your faucets drip, up to 450 gallons of water can drip out of one faucet over a thirty day period. Replace the washer.
2. Check flush ball in water cabinet of your bathroom, an old flush ball will not sit tightly on valve seat and water will seep through without you knowing it.
3. When showering wet down, soap up and then rinse off, you can waste a tremendous amount of water by leaving the spigot run during a shower.

Outside Use

1. Don't waste water when you sprinkle your lawn. Water one time a week. Place an open coffee can halfway between your sprinkler and the edge of waterspray when the can has one inch of water in bottom the water will have soaked down about four to six inches. Too much water will drown roots, too little will allow grass to wither.
2. Water your lawn from 5:00 a.m. to around 9:00 A. M., by doing this water will soak in and sun will not evaporate all the water. If you sprinkle at night fungi breeds on the wet grass.
3. Water your trees at the drip line (limit of limbs) to about a depth of about two inches.

In using water like this you can use what you need without waste.

We have run across some absolutely astounding statistics that show exactly why you are tired. And brother, it's no wonder you're tired! Here are the facts:

The population of the country is 160 million, but there are over 62 million over 60 years of age, which leaves 98 million to do the work. People under the age of 21 years total 54 million, which leaves 44 million to do the work.

Feminine Features

EXTRA-CRISP WAFFLES

- 2 cups whole wheat flour
- 4 teaspoons Royal Baking Powder
- ¼ teaspoon salt
- 3 egg yolks
- 1¾ cup milk
- 1/3 cup Mazola corn oil
- 3 egg whites.

Heat waffle baker according to manufacturers directions. Mix and sift flour, baking powder, and salt. Beat egg yolks until light. Combine with milk. Add milk mixtures slowly to dry ingredients, stirring until batter is smooth. Add Mazola oil. Beat egg whites stiff, but not dry; fold in. Makes 6 to 8 waffles.

If any liquid containing alcohol is accidentally spilled on your varnished furniture a white spot will appear. Immediately pour a little linseed oil over the area. The linseed oil will mix with the liquid and the spot will disappear. Wet a rag with kerosene oil and wipe everything off. Wet another rag with kerosene oil and go over the surface again. Dry and polish with a flannel rag. Even a little wax might be sued in polishing the entire area.

QUICK WAY TO SERVE PANCAKES TO A CROWD

Pancake batter may be poured into a jelly-roll pan and baked in a hot (425 degrees) oven for 15 minutes or so until baked through and lightly browned on top. Cut into squares, remove with a pancake turner and serve hot to a crowd with blackstrap molasses or syrup.

DID YOU KNOW?

In Argentine, where there have been 200 anti-Semitic attacks during the past two years there are two major groups of neo-Nazis composed of young terrorist. (Average age in one group: 17.) They have regular military drills and exercises.

the letters first. Here the letters are opened, counted, and stamped.

The Mail Reading Section, headed by Mr. Gary Sefcak, takes the letters from there. The readers under Mr. Sefcak read the letters, mark requests for literature, and direct the letters on to such places as the Correspondence Course, Letter Answering and Co-Worker Departments.

After the letters are processed by the readers, they are sent to the Tabulation section headed by Mr. Ray Dick. This section records the number of letter responses to each radio station.

Fantastic Potential

The potential for growth in the Mail-Receiving Department is staggering.

THINK!

In 1955 about four hundred letters was considered a good day's mail. Now the average day brings about two thousand five hundred letters. In 1972 a potential of over TWENTY THOUSAND letters per day could deluge the office!
