OVER 7800 OBSERVE PASSOVER AROUND THE WORLD

The greatest Passover in modern times has just been observed by members of God's Church. Seven thousand eight hundred and two were known to have kept this commanded Festival of God Almighty.

Here in Gladewater, over 1600 members were in attendance for the Days of unleavened Bread, with 869 adult members of God's Church partaking of the symbols of Christ's death in the Passover service.

Wonderful fellowship, and an inward thirst for the precious knowledge of God's truth, made this a joyous festival that will long be remembered by those who attended. The LIVING, DYNAMIC, PULSATING sermons and sermonettes by Mr. Ted Armstrong, Mr. Ken Swisher, Mr. Les McCullough, Mr. Tom Blackwell and Mr. Arthur Craig, were encouraging and useful.

Mr. Ted Armstrong, on the last day of the Festival, preached a POWERFUL and timely sermon on being sure that each member WILLS in his mind to come back NEXT YEAR and EVERY YEAR to God's Festivals.

Many activities were scheduled during the afternoons that were free, including softball games, roller skating, horseback riding, and square-dancing.

As another Passover ended one could help contemplating that in a very short time from now, we shall, through God's mercy, be taking the Passover with Jesus Christ—PERSONALLY IN HIS KINGDOM!

it is right and proper that we meet this obligation BEFORE other papers are printed.

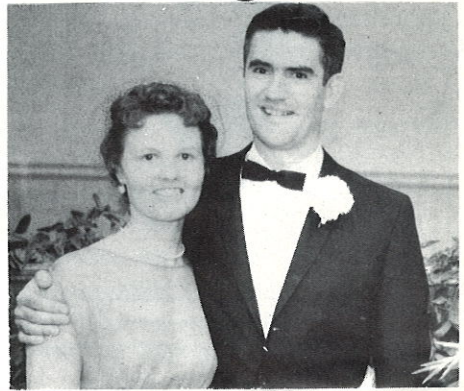
We are kept in contact with the growth in the Church worldwide, as well as to the various activities that take place in the local congregations.

include hard physical labor for conditioning and a proper amount of recreation supplemented by limited classroom instruction in arts and crafts. Each day, students will be awakened early to enjoy an exhilarating half hour of calisthenics followed by a hearty breakfast at the tabernacle cafeteria. The rest of the day will be spent in many *guided* activities.

The first two weeks of camp will be spent working on the grounds eight hours a day. This will not only help pay for the project, but will teach students the necessity of work and how to enjoy a job well-done. Plenty of time will be left during the following six weeks for pleasurable entertainment and development. A full round of scheduled activities will feature: arts and crafts, dancing, camping, and nature studies. To these will be added boating, swimming, and water skiing.

To complete the very full summer, advanced students who qualify will be given the opportunity to participate in a four day canoe trip on the Sabine River or, if they wish, spend five care-free days camping on beautiful Crystal Lake.

This will be a summer to remember for a lifetime by all fortunate enough to attend!

Summer Program Needs Your Help

One of the greatest projects yet sponsored by the Church of God has caused no small stir here at Headquarters. Though its purpose is not to convert or add members to the Church, this project will lay foundations for ministerial training unequaled in the history of our work.

Beginning this summer, our Imperial Schools will operate a "SUMMER EDUCATIONAL PROGRAM" on our own Tabernacle Grounds offered to boys and girls from the eighth through the twelfth grades.

Pledges have been pouring in from members all over the United States offering to sponsor a child or contribute toward supporting a child's attendance. This is a *thrilling opportunity* for many children of the members of God's Church who otherwise would never have such an experience.

Camping and hiking equipment will be needed; canoes, boats and fishing equipment, water skis, softball, kickball, volleyball equipment, bicycles, and much special equipment will be required to train these youngsters in arts and crafts.

You Church members should join effort and search your garages, attics, cellars, utility closets to see what is in storage that can be used. Out of storage came tents, cots, camping equipment of all sorts.

If enough members and enough clubs supply the need out of storage, however, the committee planning the Summer Educational Program will not only have sufficient, but will also consider admitting another hundred or two boys and girls. The original figure was set at 100 boys and 100 girls. This was because of the shortage of equipment.

We have adequate personnel consisting of trained instructors from our own Imperial Schools and Ambassador College, administrators, nurses, etc. *Our main shortage right now is equipment!*

What's gathering dust in your garage that might solve a portion of this problem? What you have might be just the thing to help send another boy or girl to camp. Contact a Spokesman or drop a card to the Editor—you might have just what we need.
