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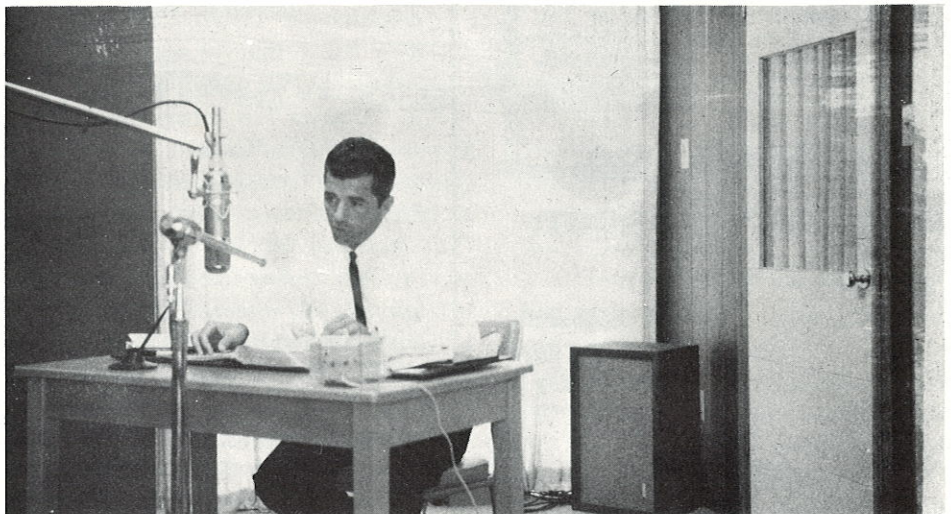
AMBASSADORS READY GROUNDS

Garner Ted Armstrong records **WORLD TOMORROW** Broadcast

Big Sandy Recording Studios

"And greetings, friends around the world! This is Garner Ted Armstrong from Ambassador College, **BIG SANDY**, Texas, bringing you the **GOOD NEWS** of the **WORLD TOMORROW!**" Yes, as many of you have already heard, Mr. Armstrong is now making programs right on our own College grounds!

Because of his tight schedule, Mr. Armstrong directed the Recording Studio Manager, Mr. Chapman, to set up a temporary studio in the office of the Executive Home. Previously, when Mr. Armstrong wished to make a broadcast, he had to drive some 20 miles to Tyler to rent the studios of a radio station. The new studio will also allow Mr. Armstrong to spend more time here, thus better enabling him to direct the development of the establishment of the

third branch of Ambassador College.

Modifications to the office were necessary in order to improve the acoustics. A heavy rug was laid, acoustical tiles were added to one wall and the new door, and eight large reflectors were constructed and installed to help disperse the sound evenly throughout the room. It is hoped that eventually the acoustics will be identical to those of the studios in Pasadena, but because of the office's much smaller size, this may be impossible.

Continue **TO PRAY** that Mr. Armstrong will be inspired to make *powerful*, **DYNAMIC** programs and that God will provide the *necessary* funds to build a really **TOP QUALITY** permanent recording studio facility here at Big Sandy!

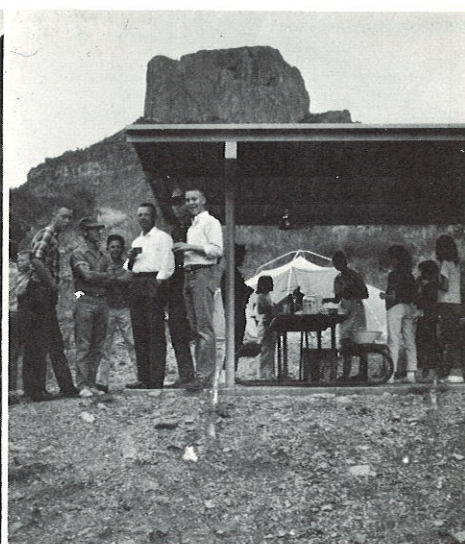
A full course buffet dinner was provided. What a variety of well-prepared food! Truly the best we've ever had at a combined meeting!

Big Bend---Big Success!

"I can't go another step!" groaned some of the footsore hikers as they made their way up the steep trail to the South Rim of the Chisos Mountains some 7200 feet above the big river in Big Bend National Park. But *up they went anyway* to learn the lesson of perseverance and to see the breath-taking panorama of the Rio Grande Valley stretching out far below. And beyond the Rio Grande the blue-hued mountain peaks of Old Mexico stood out against the bright afternoon sky. A sight to be long remembered!

What started out as an item of new business in Spokesman Club only a few weeks earlier became a wonderful reality on Sunday, Monday and Tuesday, June 21-23. For many of the young campers it was the first such trip of their lives. For 13½ miles they hiked up and down steep mountain trails—a trip which usually takes about nine hours but which was completed by the hearty band in only SEVEN! This proved they weren't as "soft" as some had suspected!

Besides the BIG HIKE, we were able to view the other main attractions of Big Bend: *The Window*, a narrow "V"-shaped gorge in the mountains; *Boquillas Canyon* to the east of the Basin camp ground; and *Santa Elena Canyon* to the west. Both of the rock-walled canyons which rise hundreds of feet above the river were cut by the mighty Rio Grande in much less time than

evolutionists suppose! These canyons reminded us of "The Siq," that narrow entrance into Petra. For that matter, the whole desert scene and climate of Big Bend seemed very "Petra-like." Perhaps our trip was good practice for the future. Who knows???

By Tuesday morning, time and food ran out, so we struck camp, loaded our gear, and after a few final photos headed back home. We were all a little weary from our three days of constant, rigorous activity, but we all had a sense of enjoyment, satisfaction, and accomplishment to compensate for our blisters and tired bones!

We were blessed with an ideal camp site and perfect weather, while best of all God gave us His Divine Protection so that not one person had any injuries or accidents to mar the trip. By Tuesday night everyone had returned home safe and sound.

The big day came for the initial picnic in the Tulsa Church's own picnic grove. *It rained!* It rained in TORRENTS!
