

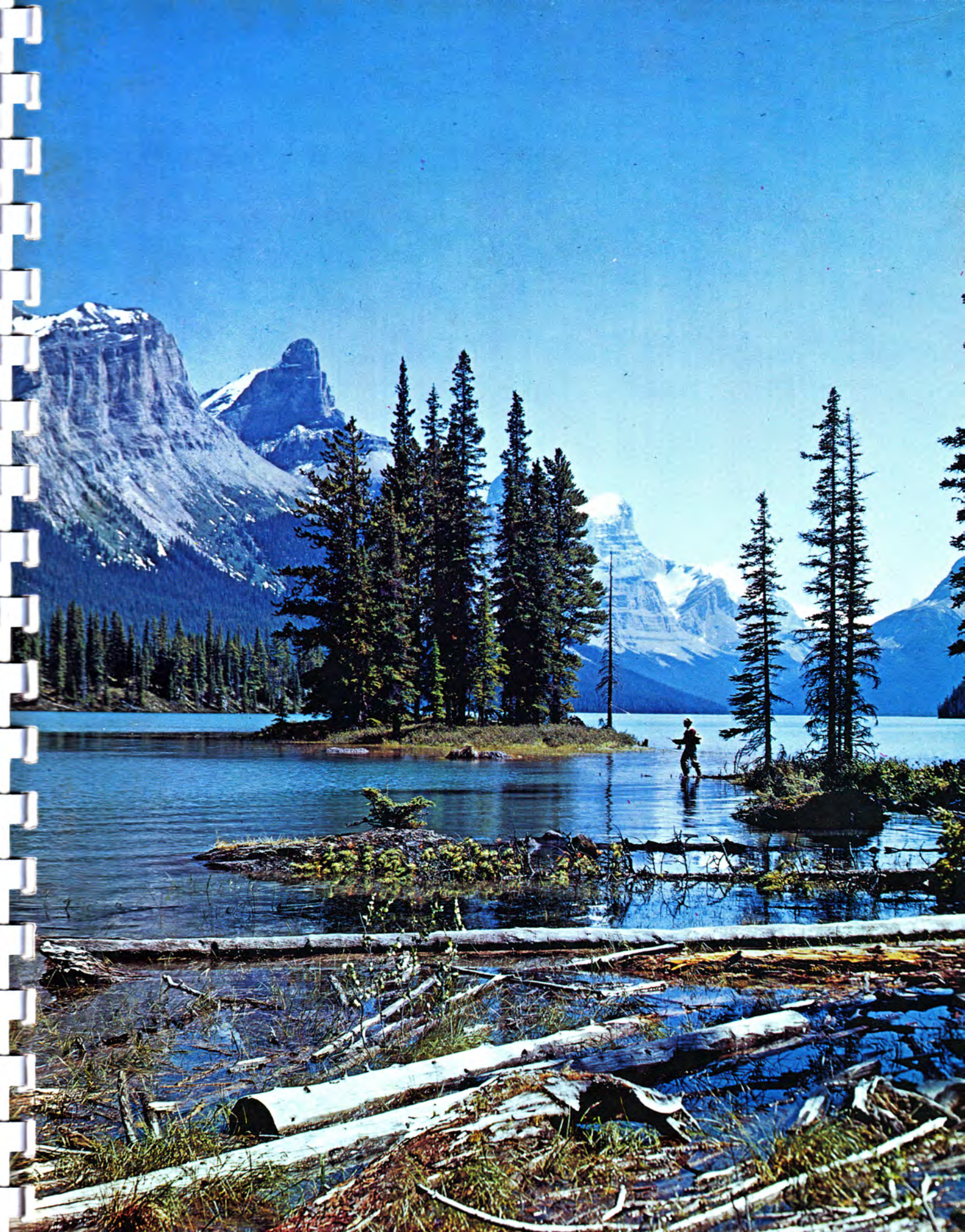
partially redeeming balance of an opposition.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS

In the Orient they have just completed the year of the Rooster and are now in the year of the Monkey. This year, the year 1970 for the Festival Office has been the year of the Visit. Government officials, including mayors, politicians and dignitaries of every description have descended upon Pasadena to see the power source of your light — the light of Matthew 5:14-16.

They want to know why you are the way you are — what makes you tick, or as they phrase it, "Why are all of you so happy, so well organized and efficient? Why are your children respectful and obedient, no hippies and the like?" They just can't get over it.

One official told us that he actually saw some of you picking up paper that you didn't throw down and that you discarded it in the paper receptacle. He seriously wanted to know why you did what you did!

Brethren, God's laws do work. You are a living example of this law in motion. Your light shines with the brilliance of a billion candlepower. Time is no barrier to the power generated by you, the people of God. The power from eighteen little groups keeping the Feast from Alaska to Australia will reach all the way into the Great White Throne Day.

Your obedience, your happiness and your light help us immensely in doing our work here at Headquarters and at the various Feast sites. The contracts, the working agreements and the planning for the Feast always fall in order, because everyone wants you back each year.

Thank you in advance for continuing the good work. The instructions that follow are a major source of the power for your light. Be sure you plug in! Some of the instruction is a repeat, some of the instruction is new. Make sure you carefully review each year.

"Let your light so shine before men, that they may see your good works, and glorify your Father which is in heaven."

YOUR FEAST BROCHURE

One brochure per family has been distributed through your local Church or Bible Study. Additional copies will be available at Feast time for all adults who have not yet received one. They may be picked up at the Registration Booth. Children old enough to take notes will receive their copy during the Feast until the supply is exhausted.

HOUSING HANDLED BY THE CHURCH

Handling our own housing became necessary a number of years ago when we found ourselves being priced out of several Festival areas. We looked for assistance and found that either an organization did not exist, or when it did, it lacked knowledge of our needs and the wherewithal to house so many people. Since that early beginning, housing by the Church has grown enormously into quite a responsibility.

We are all concerned that our housing problems be handled effectively and intelligently. Therefore, brethren, to insure continual success, *under no circumstances* should anyone make his own housing arrangements! The effectiveness of any housing control is predicated on the fact that we have complete control of all housing assignments in all areas!

Therefore, for the good of all, we have taken steps to insure this complete control for each Feast site. Even though it will cost a few thousand dollars to make these assignments, we will in the long run save you, as a combined group, many thousands of dollars! At the same time we will be performing the necessary work to insure our continual use of the area. In so doing, we are making it possible for the area businessmen to reap a fair profit for an otherwise slack period of the year.

We know that each one of you will co-operate completely in helping us carry out the housing assignment for the benefit of the total membership attending the Feast of Tabernacles. Your cooperation and your adherence to instructions has been and will continue to be a source of amazement to the businessmen of all areas where we keep the Feast.

CONFIRMATIONS

You will not receive notification of your housing assignment until some time in August. All confirmations will be sent *simultaneously* because of computer time requirements. Please do not become overanxious about your housing confirmation or write us about it. Your letters of inquiry only slow down the confirmations.

CHANGES IN HOUSING

If a change in housing must be made prior to receiving your confirmation, please write to Pasadena giving the particulars. If a change is

required *after* receiving your confirmation, follow the same procedure and return your confirmation with the request for change. Remember, a **CHANGE AT THIS LATE DATE SHOULD BE REQUESTED ONLY IN AN EXTREME EMERGENCY!**

FINANCES

Plan your finances before leaving for the Feast. Make sure that your money is in a usable form. Traveler's checks are usually the safest and most convenient form. Do not plan to use personal checks. Most establishments will not accept them and the Business Office will not be able to cash them for you.

EQUIPMENT RECEIPTS

Some of you will be purchasing new camping equipment for the Feast. Be sure you bring along your receipts for the equipment! A few continue to show up without receipts and verbally request the equipment ordered. Should we try to issue equipment under such circumstances, some would not receive what they ordered! Please make yourself a list so you won't forget such important items as your receipts.

TRANSPORTATION

If you are without transportation and need a ride to and from services, see the dispatcher at the Transportation Booth or your motel monitor. They will assist you in arranging transportation.

Members having extra passenger space may serve by volunteering this information. Notify transportation and your motel monitor as soon as possible after arriving if you have extra room.

For those areas where bus service will be available, schedules will be announced.

AUTO SAFETY

Your automobile and how you drive it, is a major responsibility in your life. Feast time is a time to insure that this **IMPORTANT** responsibility is not neglected. With the many hundreds of automobiles on the roads and on the grounds during the Festival, complete cooperation of everyone is essential for safe and orderly traffic flow.

Plan to have your car in top-notch running order. Some, in years past, came to the Feast in poorly equipped cars — slick tires, weak springs, and cars that were generally in bad condition. They were not sure whether they would arrive, much less make it back home. This is dangerous! Lives are at stake! Please plan ahead and make sure your car is in good condition capable of the trip before you leave home.

PARKING

Sufficient parking is available at each Feast site. Parking attendants will be on duty to direct you to your parking space. Please be responsive to their directions and always drive cautiously, watching for pedestrians at all times.

Park your car as close as you can to the next car and still have adequate room to exit from the car. After parking, make sure your headlights are turned off, valuables are out of sight, and the doors are locked. Under no circumstances should small children be left unattended in an automobile.

As each Feast site increases in number, traffic delays will also increase. Remember, patience is a great virtue in God's sight. Consider the purpose of the Feast. Thousands endure serious traffic problems just to see a ball game or a parade. Our freeways are clogged from morning to evening — bumper-to-bumper traffic. Shouldn't we, who have so much to gain, patiently endure, and even plan for, delays?

SCHEDULE YOUR ARRIVAL TIME

Schedule your arrival at the Feast to allow ample time to take care of all business, including registering, unpacking and getting settled in your quarters. This year the first service will be held at 7:30 p.m. on Wednesday, October 14, 1970. Plan on being comfortably settled in your quarters several hours prior to sundown and the beginning of God's Sabbath. Naturally, no business or work is to be done on God's Sabbath.

Each family should begin arriving, at the very latest, in the early afternoon to accomplish everything that needs to be done. Don't, by any means, allow yourself to carelessly arrive at the last minute, then race to beat God's Sabbath. Remember, Wednesday is the preparation day for the greatest remaining event of the year.

In Jeremiah 17:21-22, God commands that we do not work on the Sabbath day. "Neither do you any work, but hallow you the Sabbath day, as I commanded your fathers." We enjoy the Sabbath as intended when we anticipate and plan for this most important event. Plan on stopping your work several hours before the

Sabbath, take time to shower, put on clean clothing and be comfortably relaxed, ready to keep and fully appreciate the Sabbath of the Almighty God.

REGISTRATION

All persons attending the Festival of Tabernacles are required to check in at registration upon arrival at the Festival site. Again this year all who have filled out a Festival Application have been pre-registered by our IBM computer. However, you must confirm your attendance by checking at Registration. You must turn in your name and pick up a bumper sticker for your car to allow you access to the grounds and parking lots.

It is very important that everyone register!

PETS

Everyone is asked to leave his pet or pets at home because of the number of problems that have occurred through the years. We must consider damage to rented facilities and to other people's personal property as well as the noise factor, together with other circumstances. If we are negligent, someone could be bitten or harmed by a pet which might become uncontrollable because of the unusual surroundings and excitement involved in traveling. The other factors of potential damage, disturbance and inconvenience are obvious. With a little forethought in planning you should be able to provide a place for your pet with a neighbor, friend or local kennel while at the Feast. There is only one exception to this rule, and that would be, of course, in the case of seeing-eye dogs which are vitally needed for the blind owner.

OFFICES PROVIDED FOR YOUR CONVENIENCE

The offices listed here will be in operation at each Feast site to meet your administrative requirements while at the Festival. Exact locations of the offices will be posted. All offices will operate according to the following schedule unless otherwise posted or announced:

8:00 a.m.-9:45 a.m. . . . mornings
12:15 p.m.-6:00 p.m. . . . afternoons
(Closed during services)

REGISTRATION: As soon as you have checked into your accommodations, make registering your first item of business.

INFORMATION: The staff is well equipped to answer your general Festival questions. If you don't know, ask. It may help you have a more enjoyable Feast.

HOUSING: Personnel from headquarters will be on hand to handle any last minute housing needs. Whenever possible, contact your motel monitor first if any problems arise in your assigned motel. Under no circumstance should you change your housing without first clearing the change with the housing office.

BUSINESS OFFICE: Refer all business matters

to this office. You may turn in your tithes, offerings and excess second tithe here.

TRANSPORTATION: A dispatcher will be available to answer your questions. If you require transportation to and from services, make your need known to him as early as possible upon arrival.

LOST AND FOUND: All lost items will be turned in to this counter. Please be sure to check here for misplaced articles.

FIRST AID: The First Aid room will be open for emergency cases during all services. Nurses are available for after-hour emergencies by calling the information booth. Remember, this service is an "emergency service." Please do not take unfair advantage of it. Chronic illnesses will not be cared for at the Festival.



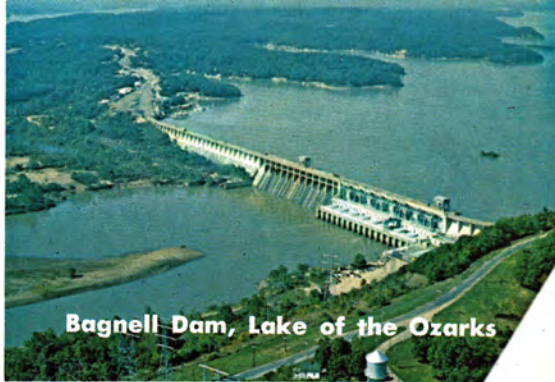
The Festival is an especially good time to get to know one another.

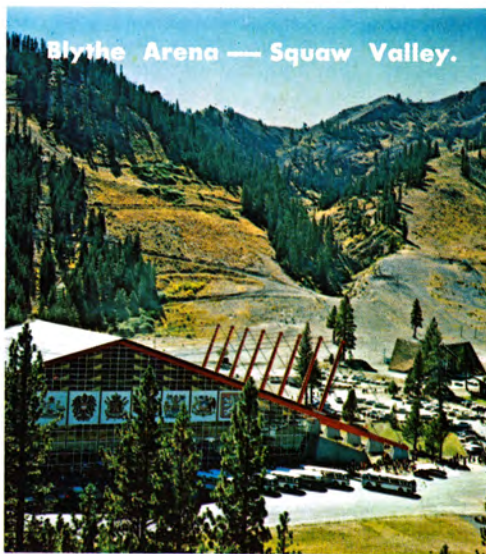
If you have a problem, be sure to leave it here — don't neglect this valuable service which has been provided for you.

Bagnell Dam, Lake of the Ozarks



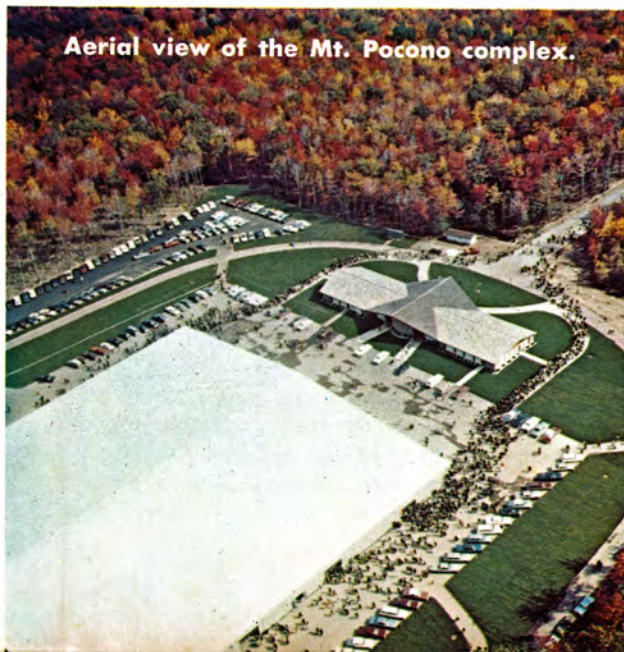

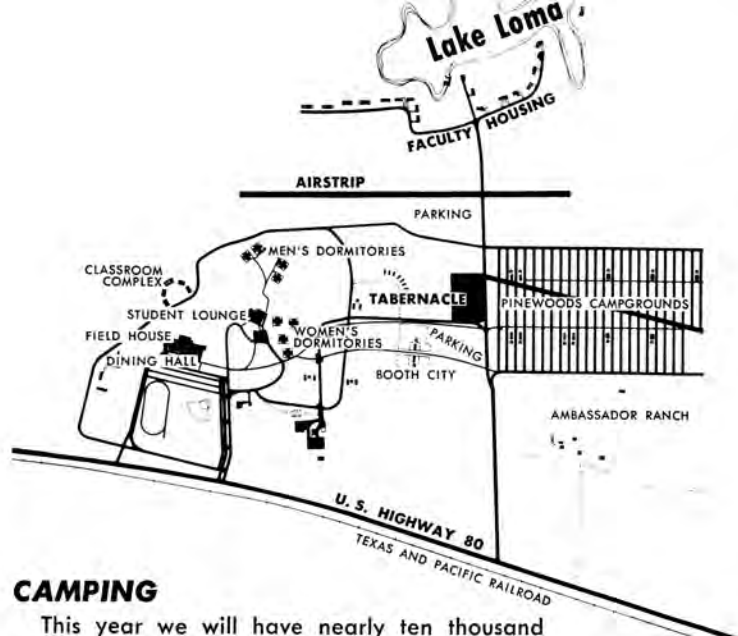

UNITED STATES FESTIVAL SITES



BIG SANDY



POINTS OF INTEREST

Ambassador College, Big Sandy, Texas, nestled beautifully in the quiet East Texas woods, once again welcomes God's people to the annual Feast of Tabernacles. Big Sandy is the oldest active Feast site in this era of God's Work.

There have been many exciting changes since the first Feast here in 1953, when 750 "pioneers" attended. The Feast in the early '50s was held in the old redwood "tabernacle," now converted into a fine library and student lounge.

The huge tabernacle built in 1958 today houses faculty offices, an auditorium, the breathtaking student dining hall and a fabulous faculty dining room. The new convention center for the Festival is the giant metal auditorium capable of seating over 15,000 people.

One of the highlights of your visit to Big Sandy will be a tour of the College grounds and experimental farms. Tour schedules will be announced. You will be inspired by the numerous improved facilities dotting the campus. New waterfalls, fountains, sculptures and streams have been added since last year. Be sure to look them over.

In nearby Tyler you can visit the colorful rose gardens known as the "rose capital of the world."

WEATHER

The weather in this area varies considerably at this time of year. Normally it is quite warm during the day. However, the evenings may be cool and rain is always a possibility. It's best to come prepared for everything!

RECREATION

There are plenty of recreational activities on the Ambassador College grounds. Waterfront activities are available at Lake Loma with College lifeguards on duty during swimming hours. Nearby lakes will also interest water skiers and fishermen. Horseback riding, roller skating and many other enjoyable family sports are within easy driving distance. There will be plenty to do and see in Big Sandy!

CAMPING

This year we will have nearly ten thousand people camped right here on God's own grounds. You can see that even with the added sanitary facilities, we will be operating at maximum capacity. You should bring your own washbasin and mirror to alleviate some of the pressure on the sanitary buildings.

You will be assigned to your Church area if at all possible. Your assignment will be mailed to you with the street name and lot number. It will also include the name of your camp captain. If you have a tent space location problem, please contact your camp captain, he is there to serve you. The highly organized captain system will be used again to maintain organization and cleanliness, as well as for the purpose of gaining practical experience in exercising God's form of government. There will be captains of tens, fifties, hundreds, and thousands. Captains are over family units for the purpose of serving and attending to the routine details and problems that may arise. Even if you are not a captain selected to serve, set up your camp as soon as possible so you may assist others in your Church area.

Regular shuttle bus transportation will be provided on the perimeter roads of camp areas leading to the tabernacles. Signs will be posted at boarding areas along the route. Elderly and handicapped should be given priority when using the shuttle bus service.

DINING

With almost fifteen thousand people attending the Feast in Big Sandy, dining can be a problem. There are many fine restaurants within driving range (20 to 30 miles) of the grounds. The most efficient means of providing your family quality food is cooking it yourself, or dining in our own Dining Hall.

Tickets for meals served at the Big Sandy Dining Hall will be available at the Registration booth upon your arrival at the Festival. All meal tickets will be sold in sets of breakfasts only, lunches only, dinners only, or all 24 meals. Single meals may not be purchased.

The price will be \$40 for a complete set of 24 meals. The breakfast ticket will be \$10, lunches \$14, and dinners \$16.

The College-operated concession stands, with sandwiches, fried chicken and cold drinks, which proved successful the past few years, will again be in operation. Milk and ice will also be available on the grounds.

TELEPHONES

Two pay telephones are located at the dining hall. Additional telephones will be located at the west end of the Pine Woods and at Booth City. Our inside private telephone exchange is not to be used for personal calls. All incoming calls from relatives or friends will be received at the Message Center located in the Field House. The Message Center number is area code 214-636-4311. If you are expecting a call, please contact the Message Center.

Office and emergency numbers will be posted on bulletin boards.

MAIL

There will be a small post office located in the Registration-Business Office where stamps and envelopes may be purchased. Please pick up all your mail at the Post Office. The correct address for receiving mail is:

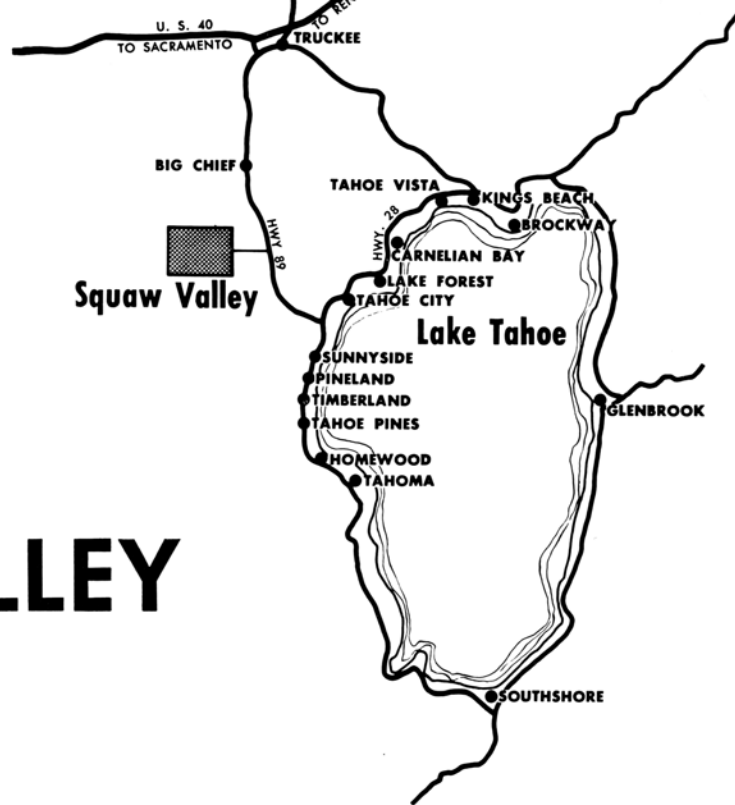

SQUAW VALLEY

POINTS OF INTEREST

Nestled in the high Sierras among the lofty peaks of Northeast California lies majestic Squaw Valley. The valley was the home of the 1960 Winter Olympics, in which 60 different nations took part. Squaw Valley was chosen over all other sites because of its fantastic ski runs, and its beautiful scenery. And now we have the fantastic opportunity to enjoy this tenth anniversary in an even more happy and balanced way!

Lake Tahoe, the "Lake of the Sky," is located nearby and represents one of the largest bodies of water at this elevation. All the colors of the rainbow are combined in a fantastic array of color, from emerald green to azure blue and royal purple.

Tahoe's Hidden castle, Vikingsholm, overlooks Emerald Bay. This 38-room castle is considered the finest example of Scandinavian architecture in North America. It was built in 1928 from an authentic replica of an 800 A.D. Norseman fortress.

WEATHER

Squaw Valley's superb climate of late fall combines warm and balmy days with cool, invigorating evenings to form ideal conditions. The splendor of Squaw Valley's "Indian Summer" adds an additional touch of beauty to the surrounding area. In the past there have also been snow flurries — so come prepared!

RECREATION

The recreational opportunities of the Lake Tahoe/Squaw Valley area are vast and very exciting. You can range all the way from a thrilling mist-sprayed speedboat ride across the lake

to some really fine fishing in the Truckee River. There are many opportunities to hike in the verdant green hills of the snow-clad Sierras or to go horseback riding in the starry moonlight. And for a real thrill, why not try riding on two of the largest cable cars in the world to the top of rugged Granite Chief? The view from the top is truly a "must" for all those taking pictures.

DINING FACILITIES

Many of you will want to take advantage of the centrally located cafeteria in the Olympic Village Hotel. This year you will have the option of purchasing meal tickets either on your arrival in Squaw Valley or immediately preceding the individual meal you wish to purchase. In addition to the cafeteria, several other dining facilities are available in Squaw Valley itself.

Excellent restaurants and dining rooms can be found scattered up and down the scenic shores of Lake Tahoe. Although most of these are too far away to be of use between services, they are certainly well within reach for the other meals of the day.

MAIL

The Post Office is located in the Squaw Valley Shopping Center. The hours are 8:30 a.m. until 5:00 p.m. Mail arrives twice daily at 8:15 a.m. and 4:15 p.m. Adequate parking is available. Your festival mailing address is:

JEKYLL ISLAND



POINTS OF INTEREST

Off the coast of Georgia, washed by the blue waters of the Atlantic, lies beautiful Jekyll Island — perfect setting for God's Feast of Tabernacles. The Island is rich in history and tradition from the millionaires and multimillionaires, the great and the near-great, who have vacationed on Jekyll for decades. At one time a hundred men — who owned one-sixth of the world's wealth — formed the Jekyll Club. Now all the beauty and splendor of this famous vacation spot is yours to enjoy during the annual Fall Festival.

You can see the mess kettle from the Wanderer, one of the last "slave runners." Stand at the very spot of the first transcontinental phone call. View the "Rockefeller Cottage" (25 rooms), now a museum. Look for the former governor's mansion, never lived in because political opponents shouted "extravagance."

In addition you can find in the Jekyll area an old fort used by the British — the first settlement of English-speaking people in Georgia.

WEATHER

Come to Jekyll expecting warm, mostly sunny days with a few cooler evenings. The average August temperature is 81 degrees and September's a perfect 78 degrees. We have had rain the last several years, so be sure you come prepared for showers as well as an occasional cool evening.

RECREATION

A full schedule of recreational opportunities awaits you at Jekyll. Baseball, volleyball, miniature golf and tennis are just a few of the highlights. You will find the beautiful Atlantic Ocean beckoning you for at least one swim, fine indoor and outdoor freshwater pools, golf, hiking and biking as well as all kinds of fresh and saltwater fishing. (Be sure to purchase the necessary license.) We encourage all able-bodied brethren to include a number of these fine, exhilarating opportunities as part of their recreational activity while attending the Feast.

DINING FACILITIES

Most motels on the Island have their own restaurants. They have gone out of their way to provide just the right type of food and service for you. During the days when we have afternoon meetings, they will increase their staff to meet our requirements during the noon meal. In addition to these motel restaurants, there is a large cafeteria and a "short order" restaurant in the Jekyll Shopping Center. Formal supper clubs and other fine restaurants can be found in the nearby communities of Brunswick and St. Simons Island.

MAIL

The Post Office is located in the Shopping Center across from the Aquarama. It is equipped to sell stamps, postcards, and money orders. Have your mail sent directly to your hotel or motel address. If you are camping or staying in a cottage, you may have needed mail sent to you in care of the Worldwide Church of God Convention, General Delivery, Jekyll Island, Georgia 31520.

Getting acquainted is important at the Feast.

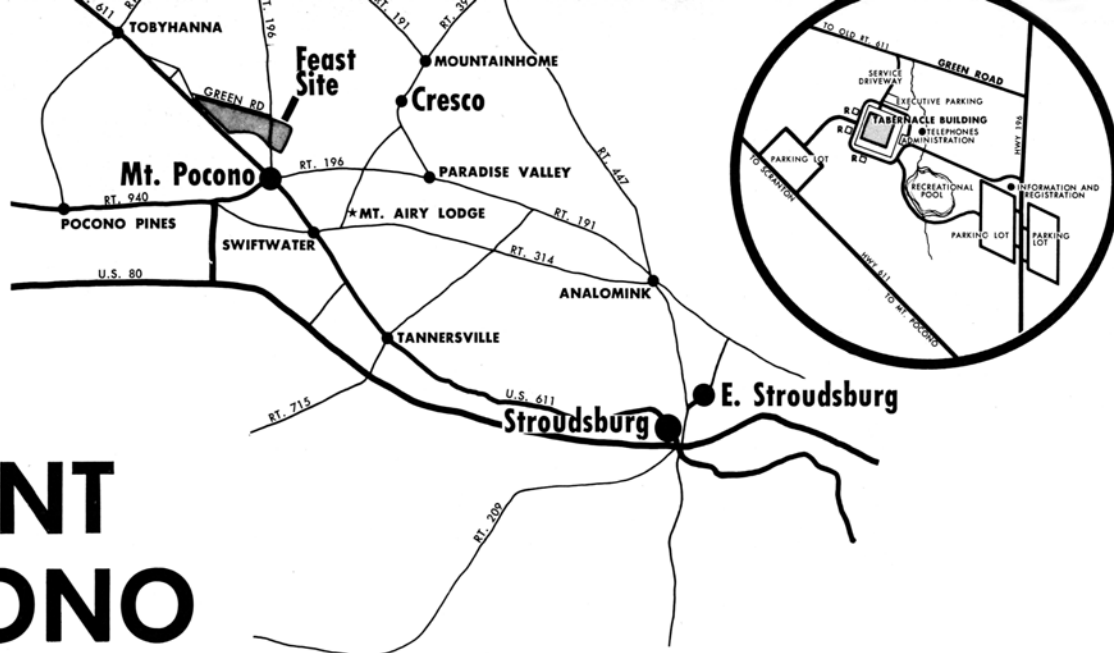




ABOVE: Mr. Herbert W. Armstrong compares notes with Mr. Ted Armstrong as he prepares to leave for another Festival location.

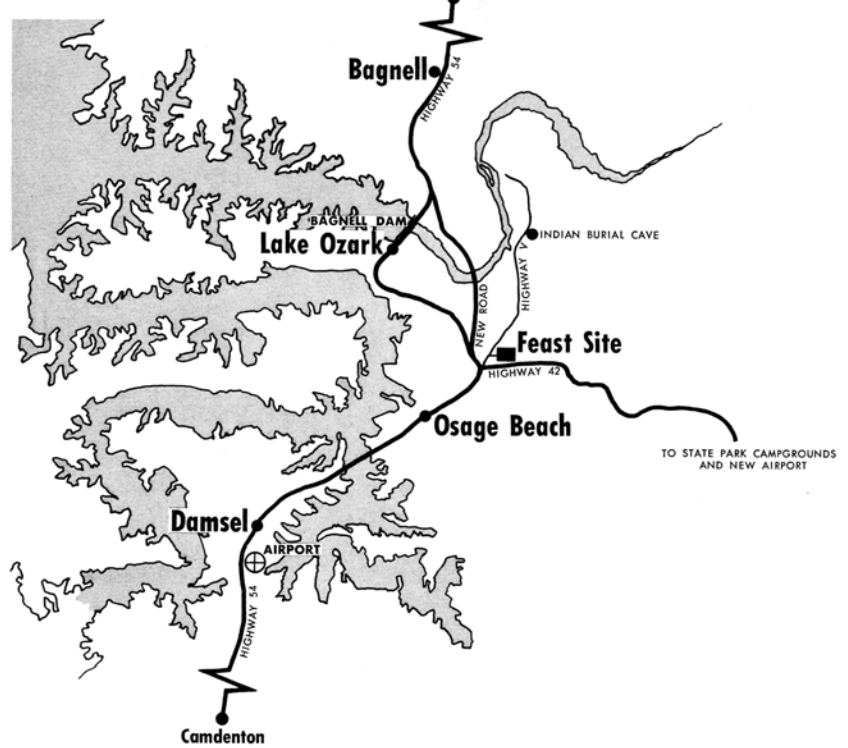

POINTS OF INTEREST

South Central Missouri's most popular vacation paradise, beautiful Lake of the Ozarks, promises you and your family hours of recreation pleasure. Plan ahead to take advantage of warm, 60-degree autumn days and riotous autumn colors to make this your most memorable Feast of Tabernacles ever.

Boasting 1,375 miles of shoreline — 400 miles longer than Lake Michigan — and 60 miles of tributary channels, Lake of the Ozarks extends 130 miles behind majestic Bagnell Dam into some of Mid-America's most scenic virgin timberland. Come prepared to take advantage of this water wonderland.

RECREATION

Fifteen heated fishing docks in the vicinity offer the fisherman the ultimate in fishing comfort. White and large-mouth bass, crappie and wall-eyed pike abound in the lake.

For boating enthusiasts, boats of all sizes — from small skiffs to large cabin cruisers may be rented from one of the many marinas in the area. Or, if you bring your own boats, you may use any of the many docks and loading ramps available.

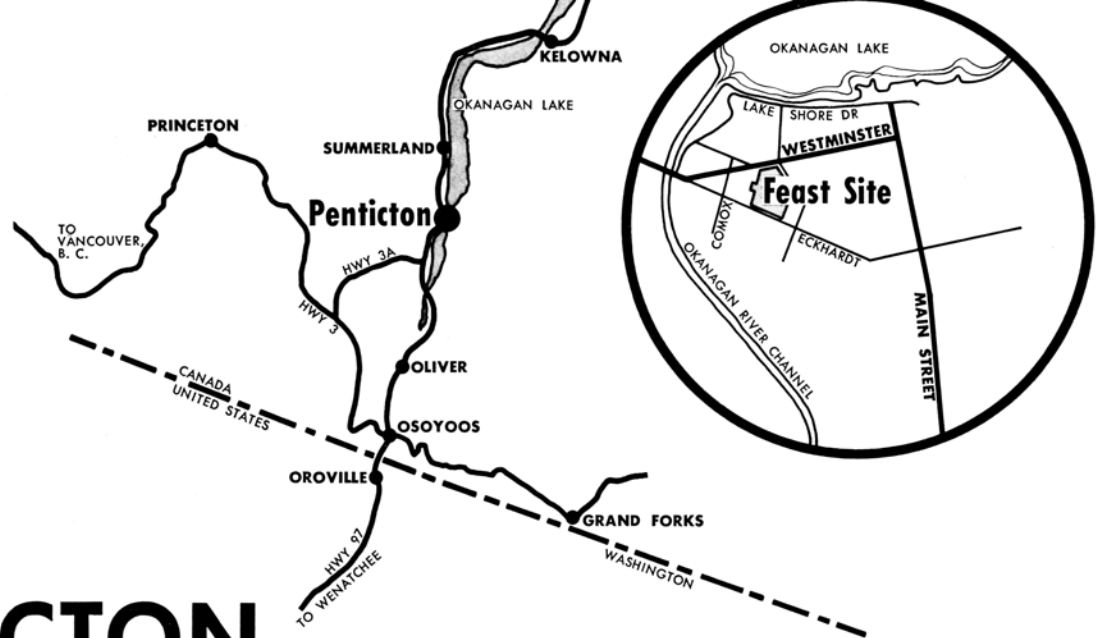

PENTICTON

POINTS OF INTEREST

In scenic Canada, sheltered in the golden Okanagan Valley just forty miles north of the American border, lies the city of Penticton, British Columbia. This Canadian playground is a wonderland of places to see and things to do. There are dozens of striking attractions just a short driving distance from wherever you stay. Vast alpine meadows to explore. Strange mountain and rock formations to see.

You can visit the huge radio telescope at Dominion Radio Astro-physical Observatory, tour a fruit-packing plant, see the extensive vineyards that supply grapes for British Columbia wines, take the youngsters to the Wildlife Museum or roam the lovely benchland and hills above the lakes. The Africa in Canada Game Farm displays the exotic zebra, giraffe, tapir, and many other animals.

WEATHER

Hard to believe a northern city could enjoy more hours of sunshine in July and August than Honolulu or Nassau? It's a matter of recorded fact. The average September temperature is 58-72 degrees — October holds a crisp 47-57 degrees. At the beaches the water is a comforting 75 degrees from June through September just as it is off the beaches of Acapulco.

RECREATION

Penticton is a favorite tourist haven for both summer and winter. Tourism is the biggest business in the area. Beautiful beaches attract thousands in the summer, and snow-clad mountains do the same in the winter. Two beautiful lakes border Penticton — eighty-five-mile-long Lake

Okanagan provides many beautiful beaches to the north, and to the south Lake Skaha offers water sports through the fall season.

Sailing, powerboating, water-skiing, skin diving, swimming and other waterfront activities are available at the lakes. Horseback riding and mountain hiking provide excellent opportunities to explore the Canadian mountains. In the valley, sports of all types are available such as golfing, curling, go-carting and ice-skating.

Those who attend this Feast site will have many chances to enjoy exciting, healthful recreation and fellowship.

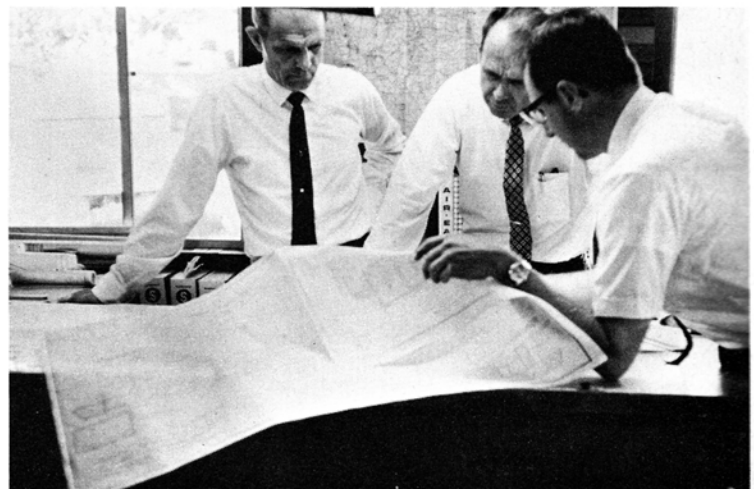
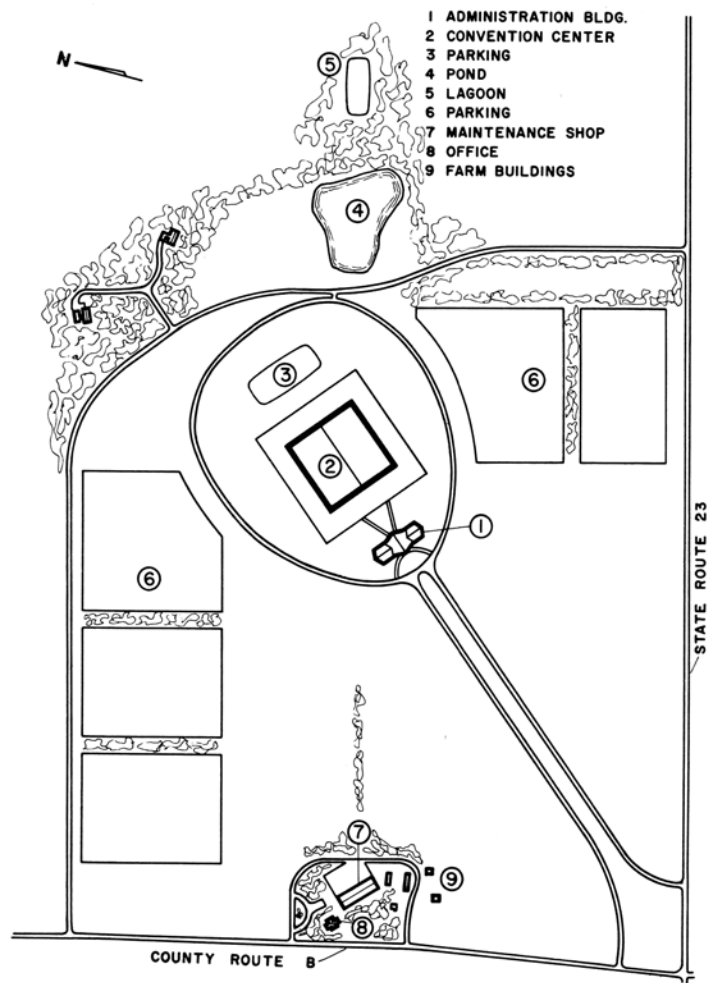
WEATHER

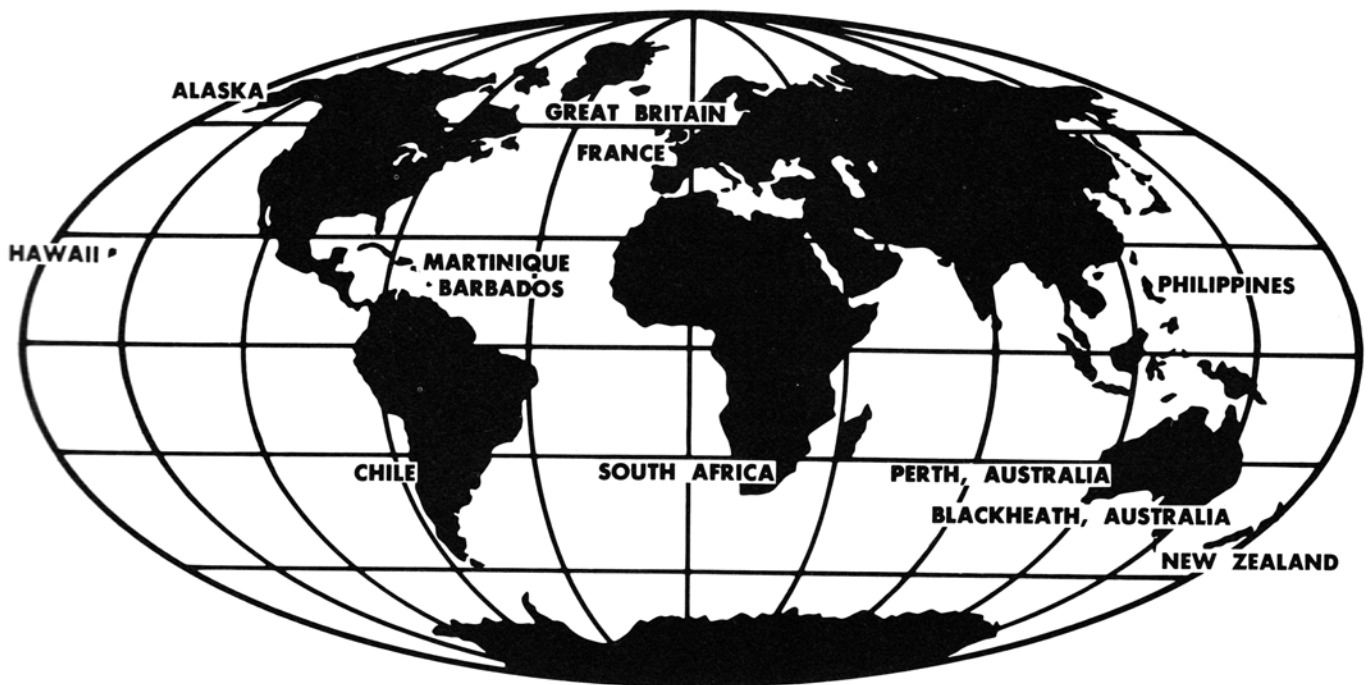

WEATHER

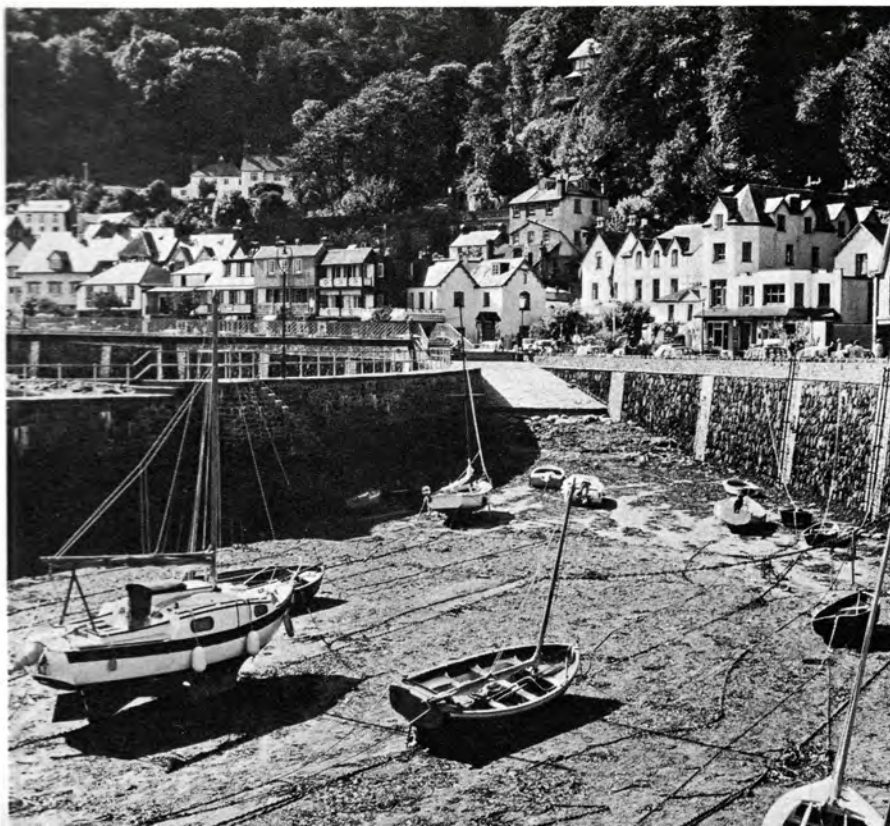

BLACKHEATH, AUSTRALIA



POINTS OF INTEREST

The Blue Mountains is a veritable treasure house of nature's beauty spots. Blackheath is located in the very heart of the Blue Mountains and is surrounded by spectacular views only minutes away from the Festival site. The area has figured prominently in early Australian history. An exciting time may be had exploring the many points of historical interest, some of which, such as Explorers' Tree, date back to the first crossing of the mountains in 1813.

WEATHER

The average daytime temperature at Blackheath during the month of October is a brisk 64.4 degrees. The nights can be quite cold, with an average minimum temperature in October of 46.1 degrees. Sudden changes in the weather are not uncommon in the mountains, and some wind and rain has been experienced during previous Festivals. In October many beautiful days can be expected, but you would be well advised to come prepared for rain.

RECREATION

There are numerous recreational facilities available in the area, including horseback riding, golf, tennis, and squash. Organized bush walks led by competent guides will again be a feature on free afternoons. The well-equipped playground, which includes a merry-go-round and pony rides, always proves popular with the children, and responsible supervisors will be on duty in the playground every day. Films, a Talent Show, and a Dance, with music provided by our own band, are arranged for the Festival.

The whole area is one of geo-thermal activity — including one of the largest geo-thermal power projects in the world set amidst bubbling hot mud pools and geysers. Lake Taupo apart from its scenic beauty is renowned as a "mecca" for trout fishing.

WEATHER

Taupo's weather at Festival time is sunny but bracing. Steaming 100° thermal swimming pools take the edge off any chill! It is advisable to bring a topcoat should the weather be unsettled.

RECREATION

An exciting range of activity is available — trout fishing and pleasure boating; scenic golf courses and hot thermal swimming pools; tours of geo-thermal geysers and bubbling hot mud pools; scenic flights over the lake and snow-capped active volcanoes; and hiking up the 3569 feet of nearby extinct volcano Mt. Tauhara.

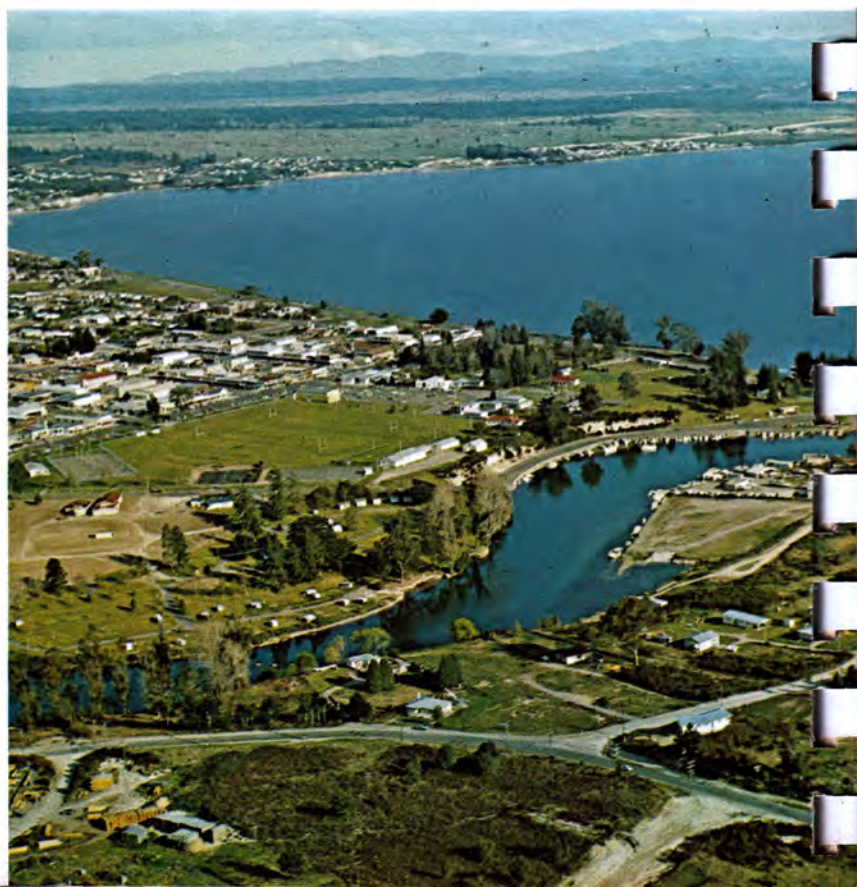

PERTH, AUSTRALIA

POINTS OF INTEREST

Perth offers a full range of scenic attractions. Kings Park, a 1000-acre reserve in the heart of the city, is most impressive, the major part of it being virgin bush. Queens Gardens, Hyde Park, the Swan River foreshore, and numerous small parks provide for recreational needs. Wild-flowers, particularly in springtime (September to October), are breathtakingly beautiful, and Western Australia can justly claim to lead Australia in floral beauty.

WEATHER

The climate of Western Australia is one of the most temperate in the world, especially in Perth where excessive cold and heat are very rarely known. 70 degree temperatures should prevail throughout the Feast. Generally there is very little rain at this time of year.

RECREATION

There is an abundance of recreation available in the metropolitan area. All forms of sport such as fishing, boating, golfing, tennis, squash, bowling, bush walks (through Kings Park) and pony rides, are catered for.

As well as natural scenery there are many interesting spots worthy of a visit. Ostrich farms located at Oudtshoorn — 36 miles from George are a must. This is the centre of ostrich skin and feather production for most of the world. Tours are given daily.

Twenty miles north of Oudtshoorn are the Cango Caves. You should allow about two hours to see these famous stalactite and stalagmite caves.

For the more ambitious on the way to or from the Feast, there is also available a visit to the famous Cape of Good Hope. There is a Game Reserve and an opportunity to see one of Israel's most famous "Gates." This is a valuable experience for all those who understand where the descendants of the House of Israel are today.

WEATHER

George is warm in the daytime during the Festival season with a slight chill in the evenings. Be prepared for the possibility of rain.

RECREATION

Many swimming spots both on the sandy ocean coastline and in the rivers are available. You have the option of most any sport you wish including golf, tennis, bowls, and the specialty of the Wilderness Lagoon — water skiing.

POINTS OF INTEREST

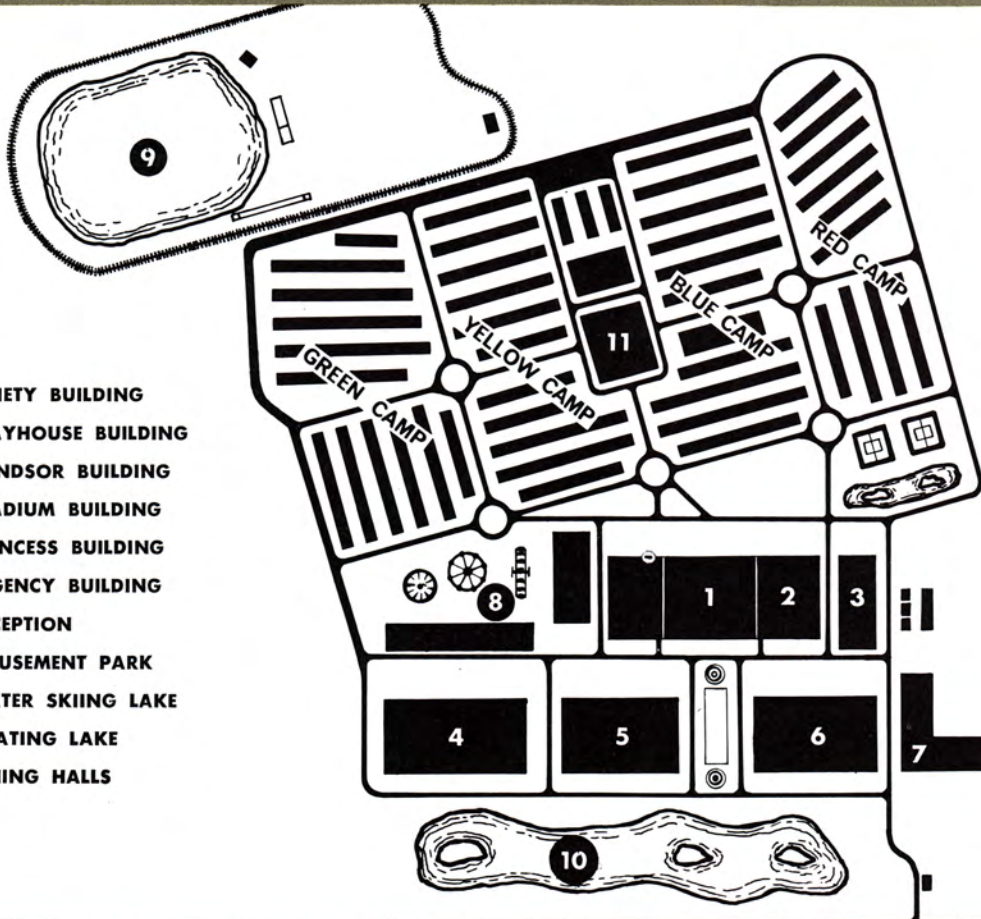
ALASKA
