

BATANGAS CITY GIVES WARMEST WELCOME

BATANGAS CITY-"It was the most enlightening gospel message I've ever heard. Too bad not many people came," remarked Sister Pia, the auditorium directress as she congratulated Mr. Colin Adair on stage after his 13th Plain Truth lecture last June 26 which was carried by DZBT radio to thousands of people in Batangas Province and to all of Southern Tagalog region. The message was preached powerfully in spite of a bomb scare and typhoon "Huaning" which for two days prior to the lecture had threatened the whole area. Although only 168 attended, "it was by far one of the best audiences ever to attend a non-school (religious) activity in our auditorium," according to Sister Corazon who attended even the Open Forum the next day.

Shortly after Mr. Adair arrived from Manila, Mayor Macario Mendoza gave him the warmest welcome to Batangas City. He invited the guest to a dinner the next day.

At the instruction of Gov. J. Antonio C. Leviste, Deputy Governor Ruperto R. Talatala ushered in Mr. Adair and party to a "merienda session" before the Sangguniang Panlalawigan (for-

merly Provincial Board) composed of top officials led by the Deputy Governor, Board Secretary, Provincial Community Development Coordinator, Provincial Fiscal, Provincial Treasurer, Provincial Auditor, Provincial Assessor, Secretary of Cultural Affairs, DEC Regional Superintendent and their technical assistants. "These Gentlemen, Mr. Adair, tho few in number represent hundreds of people manning our provincial affairs. Through the Governor's Staff you can extend whatever message you have for our people," said the Deputy Governor as he introduced his guest. "In fact," he added, "I'd like to come back and speak to our communityleaders. We will gather them for you. All you need to do is meet them at a certain place, at a certain time and speak to them."

Mr. Adair briefed the Provincial Council about-Ambassador College and its Extension Program. "Since not everybody can go to Ambassador College, Dr. Armstrong decided to bring the College to everybody worldwide. Through this Program we teach people not only how to earn a living but most of all, how to livel And, Gentlemen, the philosophy of the College cuts across

national boundaries, and cultures, because it is based upon human principles, human values good for human beings whether one is an American, British, an African or a

From the Governor's Office, we rushed to the Batangas National High School where Mr. Adair addressed the city teachers on the "Keys to Teaching Moral Values." Leading the welcoming panel were Dr. Atanacia Dorado, Acting Regional Superintendent and Asst. Superintendent Juliana A. Espina and a host of city supervisors and principals. Mr. Adair concluded his lecutre "It's not enough that you tell your students 'Don't cheat, don't lie' you must explain to them why."

Then we went to the only commercial radio station, DZBT, for a 30-minute interview hosted by Teddy Cuevas, Station Manager. As usual Mr. Adair clarified a lot of questions regarding the College, the Educational Extension Program, the Plain Truth Magazine, and why we are conducting these

PT lectures nationwide.

The next day June 25 at 10:00 a.m. the faculty and student body of the Lyceum of Batangas heard Mr. Adair speak on 'The Art of Modern Dating." The College President, Dr. Sotero H. Laurel, son of our war time Pres. Jose P. Laurel, welcomed his guest at the college grounds. In the afternoon Mr. Adair gave the same lecture to the Golden Gate Colleges, The College of Nursing performed two cultural númbers before and after the lecture. The college Registrar Mrs. L. Mendoza introduced the

guest; Dean Norman dela Cruz gave the closing remarks. And as we were about to leave, a faculty member who said he was a church elder asked for the Dating booklet because he wanted to give a sermon on it to his congregation the next day.

OFFICE RESTRUCTURED

MANILA-A change in the organizational structure of God's Work here has been instituted in an effort to bolster the preaching of the gospel and the feeding of God's "flock" in the Philippines and Northeast Asia.

To help Mr. Colin Adair coordinate, through district coordinators, activities undertaken by all the churches of God in the country, a Coordinating Center has been created. Mr. Pike Mirto, who is concurrently Associate Pastor of the Metro Manila church and District Coordinator for Districts 3 and 4, has been designated the Executive Officer of the Center. He is assisted by Mr. Rey

Taniajura, Executive Assistant; Mr. Pete Melendez, Administrative Assistant; and Mr. Dom Guevarra, Accountant.

Under the Coordinating Center are three offices to serve in various capacities.

Administrative Services

New Feast Site

Most of Luzon will be able to receive it as channel 9 has a simulcast with Baguio. We are looking forward to building a good audience over a period of time. We plan to advertise the program on occasions in the newspaper and perhaps in the new TV Times, if that new publication continues to be printed.

1,462 KEEP PENTECOST

MANILA-The Church Coordinating Center here has received complete reports on the Day of Pentecost observance (June 6) from church areas in the Philippines. A total of 1,462 members, prospectives, and family members were in attendance at six sites. This represented a 32 % increase in attendance over last year.

Metro Manila led the churches with an average attendance of 706. This was followed by Bukidnon (338), Pangasinan (185), Davao (129), Cebu (80) and Agusan del Sur (24).









LAMENTATION OF GOD'S SERVANTS

Have you observed the countenance of a man in lamentation? I mean, "lamentation", not in the sense of wailing or unbridled crying in grief? But a lamentation of deep concern, love and sorrow when he foresees the "fierce wrath" that could come upon the careless, lukewarm, and lethargic Christians?

It seems the prophet Jeremiah, in his day, did lament for the same careless and lukewarm attitude of his people and pointed out the overall effects of ingrati-OUTLYING BIBLE STUDIES tude and heedlessness from the ways set for them. But since the prophet has long been dead, we could not behold his countenance and make out how he expressed his sorrow and concern for his people.

In this modern age of ours, where those in the "know" talk about the "end of the world", or the "wonderful world tomorrow", "eternal life" or "eternal death" and so forth, but need to be fed more spiritual food, modern Jeremiahs are sent to point out what is lacking in our lives, exhorting us to press onward without let-up and with steadfast heart.

So when the Feast of Pentecost was held in Cebu City last June 6, 1976, the modern Jeremiahs, in the persons of Mr. Colin Adair and Mr. George Hood, took turns in pointing out to the brethren in this area the significance of the season.

We did see, actually, the countenance full of concern and of sorrow through the creases and wrinkles on their individual foreheads for those of God's people who missed the spiritual food catered them on that day. Mr. Adair and Mr. Hood found out that, except for some few with valid reasons, there were absentee Christians!

And it looked like "absenteeism" was synonymous with ingratitude and unthankfulness to Him that loves us first. One cannot be very grateful if he or she merely sits down at home thanking God, instead of being with the brethren in the place and time appointedeven if only to listen to the opening and closing prayers and to say "amen" in unison with the others.

One brother, during the lull of Sabbath activities, prior to the Feast of Pentecost, when casually

asked if he was coming back the next day, June 6, answered: "What for?" And when told it was the Feast of Pentecost, he simply replied: "Is that so? I didn't know that, because I'm very busy at home!" And of course, he was not seen around during the feast. And yet he was baptized way back in 19641 The first batch of Visayans called out by a Loving God.

Another brother was so concerned with his home! So much so, that he attended only the Bible Study in the morning, departed for home at noon and did not come back during the feast! He was baptized in 1966! Another brother instructed his wife to just attend the services because anyway, he already knew all there is to know in the Church. And yet they were living just a few kilometers north of the city. He was baptized way back in 1966!

After sensing all this, and after expounding the narrative in Luke 17:11-17, Mr. Adair lamented: "Where are the nine?" Meaning: Where are the rest of God's people? Were they not formerly SPIRITUAL lepers? And now cleansed, yet they did not come to worship and glorify God and to thank Him this day of Pentecost? Are there not almost a hundred called out ones in this part of the Visayan Islands?

These were the searching looks of Mr. Adair with creased and wrinkled forehead!

Nevertheless, all in all, the Feast of Pentecost at Cebu City was a real success. Eighty-two brethren and children attended. The response in special offerings and flood relief was more than gratifyingl

Editor's Note: The brethren mentioned above seem "rich and increased with goods and they have need of nothing." Unless their attitude towards God's COM-MANDED convocation changes, they may find themselves shut out of God's Kingdom! He that has an ear to hear, let him hear.







THIS IS MY

By Jimmy Wang

was born in Shanghai in 1946. When I was four years old my parents took me out of China to Hongkong. Then when I was six, they went back to China to take a look at the old business that my grandfather had left when he came to Hongkong about a year before us. Strangely enough, when they asked my sister and me if we would like to go with them, refused - for no reason - and chose to stay with my grandparents. This turned out to be the turning point of my life.

As promised in last month's CONTACT, we publish here Jimmy Wang's story of his life. Mr. Wang is one of our two members in Hongkong.

My grandfather never liked me much; he thought I was dumb (stupid). My grandma didn't know very much about rearing children. As a result, I was very much on my own. Somehow at the age of about seven or eight, I began to believe there was a God, and that there must be a right way of life. It was this belief that moulded my development, not any influence from my family.

Forced to School

At about 13, another turning point in my life came. My grandfather, who as I said never liked me much, was a firm believer in

educating his family properly, and he forced me to go to an English school. Until then I hardly knew a word of English. His will prevailed, of course, and I, through the recommendation of a good friend of the family, got into a very good English school. I struggled along by sheer luck (or shall I say, the right kind of intervention at the right time), passing one examination after another. But I was never too good, always only just scraping through. I got first my school certificate (Form 5), and then surprised myself by passing matriculation, with the bare minimum. I am quite convinced that it was God's help, because I passed a very vital subject that I did very badly to get through.

Then another turning point in my life appeared. For some strange reason, I refused to go to the Hongkong University. Partly it was because I had met my wife a couple of years previously, and I didn't want to be dependent on my family any more because of her. My family, being very conservative, didn't like her then. My family did all the right things to get me into the University (in spite of the fact that he didn't like me, my grandfather was really proud that I passed Matriculation - I was the only one among our relatives that could pass it - and he wanted me to go on), including

recommendation. But i did all the wrong things to get out of it. I succeeded, but that only swept me into another unexpected course. One thing led to another and I was accepted by a University in Australia. I never dreamt of going overseas, but there I was with the only choice in front of me -- Australia.

Enough "Damage"

Things went unexpectedly well in Australia - with the help of a lot of luck (of course, for us, I should say, plenty of right intervention). First of all, I came in contact with the P.T. Well, I disagreed with a lot of what it said, but it already did enough "damage" - I was then a Catholic. Very soon, I began to doubt the Catholic Church. About that time, I went back to Hongkong, having just graduated from the University with a Bachelor of Economics' degree, and got engaged to my wife. It was some two years later, after I had gone back to Melbourne to continue to study accountancy, before I was really convinced that there was something about this P.T. Then I ran into a newly baptized member who happened to stay at the same Y.M.C.A. where I was staying for a short wjile. Before long, I was ready. And believe it or not, I was baptized on my birthday - something I only became aware of

First Job

Late 1973 I was back in Hong-

the right neonle to make the right kong, as a qualified Accountant due again, to a little bit of "luck". I have always wondered since: Did become a qualified Accountant in Australia because that was the only way for me to find a job in Hongkong? You see, it was my wife who helped me to find my job. My first job in Hongkong was with a chartered Accountants firm. Again, believe it or not, this happened to be a new firm from Australia desperately looking for a qualified senior, and I was then the only one available with an Australian background at that time. I was later to find out that that firm was the only one in Hongkong that could have employed me at that time in spite of my sabbath requirement. I had looked around since, and not one Accountant firm would have wanted me because of the Sabbath. There was one - one that didn't think I was qualified enough. So, providence again?

> Last year, another opportunity suddenly appeared - and again, it was my wife who literally threw the new job at me, because I completely overlooked it. Once again, the right intervention came. The Company was an American Company. A.I.A. Co. Ltd. that works only five days a week. I applied, and before I knew what was happening, I was accepted. Not that it was easy, no it was a one in a million chance. The Comptroller that eventually decided to hire me happened to be sick and tired of looking for a suitable man. If I had applied earlier, he wouldn't have given the job to me for various reasons. Among these, they just had a new personnel manager

who for some reason showed me so much favour that she made this Comptroller see me in spite of his refusal on the ground that I had not the right kind of experience. I could not have expected that from the previous personnel manager. If I had applied any later, I wouldn't have got the job either, because there were two other applicants that he was almost going to take before he saw me. I was picked by a hair's breadth, I was told later. In fact, I never thought I had a chance.

Much Favour

Now things are going great. The Comptroller has been showing me so much favour, over and above what my performance deserves. But I am not worried. For you see, I don't rely on my own performance. I rely on that unseen hand that has been guiding my life for so long. I am confident that our Father in Heaven will help me to find the capacity to produce the kind of performance that He expects from me. Our Father in heaven will not permit me to let Him down.

named manager of this office.

The mailing and mail processing operations of this office have already moved from the RM Center Building to the Filipino Star Building in the Port Area. The other operations of the ASO are expected to be transferred in October this year.

Festival Office

Second is the Festival Office, with Mr. Ben Ortiguero as the Festival Manager and Mr. Med Maninang serving as assistant. The basic function of this office is to plan and recommend and, upon approval, administer all activities relative to church festivals.

While before a festival office was just a temporary office set up maily to manage the Feast of Tabernacles, this new office is permanent, serving the needs of the local churches especially during feast days. For instance, it would look into the feasibility of a new feast site or the need to assign a ministerial assistant to a Feast of Tabernacles site.

Three feast site supervisors have been appointed to coordinate with Mr. Ortiguero for the Feast of Tabernacles: Dr. Samuel Librojo in Baguio, Mr. George Hood in Bacolod (a new site), and

Mr. Edmond Macaraeg in Cagayan de Oro.

Welfare Office

The third office under the Coordinating Center is the Welfare Office, which will be managed also by Mr. Ben Ortiguero, with Mr. Maninang assisting him. The basic function of this office is to provide advice and render support services to all districts and churches relative to welfare matters. It will also coordinate and supervise welfare activities involving more than one district.

With this new office, it is hoped that a national welfare program of the church can be set up. As finances allow, it is also hoped that this office could later help support government assisted programs such as social, economic, legal or educational assistance to the deserving poor.

FAD Dissolved

With the new setup, the former Financial Affairs Department is now phased out. Its functions, however, have been partly absorbed by the Coordinating Center and apportioned to the three above-mentioned offices.
