"Since not everybody can come to Ambassador College, Dr. Armstrong thought of bringing the basic philosophy of Ambassador College to everybody. Hence the College Educational Extension Program where we extend our free publica-

tions and free services right into the homes, the civic organizations, government entities, and to the public at large. For example if Angeles City conducts an antidrug addiction campaign, or on crime, we will be more than glad to share our limited resources."

At 10 a.m. Pres. Emmanuel Y. Angeles and Vice Pres. Pedro Lingad welcomed Mr. Adair to the Angeles University where he gave a lecture on Dating before the faculty and student body of the university. MANILA - A one-hour lecture on table tennis was conducted at the TATAP (Table Tennis Association of the Philippines) playing center at the Rizal Memorial Stadium last November 21, from 10:00 a.m. to 11:00 a.m. Thirteen people attended the lecture nine men and four women.

Andrew Teng, project manager of the sports clinic, made the necessary arrangements with the people concerned.


Mr. Mariano Calar of TATAP, who also teaches table tennis at the University of the Philippines, gave a lecture on the rudiments of the game, its rules and regulations. Afterwards he also answered juestions during the open forum which followed. He gave a short demonstration on how the game is played. He also described the proper dimensions for the playing able, its height from the ground, he net, the kinds of rackets to be

used - either for national or international events.

While discussing rules and regulations, Mr. Calar showed pointers on scoring, serving the ball, breaking a tie and playing matches - be it singles or doubles. He cited several violations in the game, improper playing positions, distraction and clothing requirements. He also explained the procedures employed during national and international events.

The following subjects were also discussed in relation to playing the game: Direction, timing, readiness, mobility & arm faults. Also mentioned were instructions on how to grip the racket, how to drive, spin and block the ball.

The participants were able to actually "feel out" the game with a few practice matches with the members of the group who attended the session.

MANILA - The first in a series of the Bible forum. He was assisted weekly Bible forums in the Metro Manila area was held at the seminar room of the Ambascol office located at the 12th floor of the RM Center last November 21. The meeting started at 2:00 p.m. and ended at 5:00 p.m.; in forty-three were people. having attended past Bible seminars, were now familiar with how such sessions were conducted. So there were less inhibitions on their part and they were more enthusiastic and receptive during the entire question and answer" session. Although some queries evoked laughter from the audience, most questions asked were sensible and thoughtprovoking. There was that characteristic interest and zealousness on the part of the participants to understand more Bible knowledge. There was a man who, after realizing that his inquisitive nature might be mistaken for hostility, assured everybody by saying "I am a believer of the Church of God..." then he proceeded to ask more questions, eliciting laughter

from the audience. During the three-hour session, Mr. Mirto deftly maintained just the right balance in giving Bible answers. Oftentimes he would elaborate and at other times he would give simple replies to the audience's queries. It was not uncommon to see the participants nodding in agreement after each careful elucit dation of the matter brought up for discussion. For example, concerning baptism, he said, "We follow the Biblical way, and if it concides with the "Iglesia Ni Kristo" way, that is fortunate. Responding to a comment on having Christ's pictures, countered, "How would you know it is the real one? "

Some of the other questions asked were: "Is this an Englishspeaking Church?," "Did God create the Devil?, Why was the Devil not sent to Mars?," "How many Gods are there in heaven?," "How may Gods will there be after 7,000 years?," "What if all people were like Jesus Christ?"

Those who have not yet seen the film "The Hunger Bomb" were invited to see it next Bible seminar to be held on December 12 at 9:00 a.m. at the Ambascol office. Bible forums will be held on Sunday afternoons starting at 2:00 p.m. at the same place.

Socio-Educational Tour

After successfully accomplishing 3 major projects — PNC in Concert, Family Night and Church Bazaar — what would a group of young, energetic and nature-loving people possibly do next?

Why, they would make an equally major celebration, of course! Thus, taking advantage of the holiday last November 30, the Young Ambassadors Club "B" members decided to have a good time — one that was fun-filled, wholesome and educational.

The U.P. College of Agriculture in Los Baños, Laguna proved to be an ideal site for our socioeducational tour. First, we observed how fresh cow's milk is pasteurized at the College's dairy production plant. Our guidelecturer than showed us the chocolate production compartment where an appetizing aroma filled the air. Next, we entered an air-conditioned room for cheesemaking. Here, we had our sample -tasting activity! Lastly, we were griented as to how ice cream and butter are produced from excess supply of milk.

After taking our refreshment — fresh cow's milk at relatively low price of P1.25 per pack — Dr. Cadiz (a brethren working at the College) took us to another part of the campus where methane gas, produced from swine manure, is being tapped as an energy resource. From there, Dr. Cadiz led us to the green house where experimental plants and seedlings are found. He himself oriented

return mail, you will have your


copy" I said as I distributed the





Good Manners

AND RIGHT CONDUCT

Foreword: The situations cited in this article are true-to-life happenings. Thus, no names are mentioned to protect those who are not concerned.

The author does not however, claim to be an authority on the subject.

One Sabbath Day ladies X and Y, after fellowshipping with the brethren, agreed to go together since they were taking the same transportation route on the way home. Lady Z approached lady X and asked her if she could go along with her. Lady X said okay.

Two or three dancers altho present were perfecting another number with another group. The instructress could have easily dropped the actual presentation of the Chinese Fan Dance. She is a teacher by profession and at the same time a student aspiring for higher education, a very busy person indeed. It's hard to admit but true, she was the one who set the fine

example of commitment and (exept for a few) not the members of the cast of the Chinese Fan Fan Dance who members of the Worldwide Church of God. The dance was well presented in Baguio but it could have been more beautifully and impressively performed had the members of the dance group put their whole hearts in it.
