

Mambucal Resort

A PREVIEW

Many things are in store for those who will keep this year's Feast of Tabernacles at Mambucal Health Resort, Negros Occidental. The 1977 FOT schedule of activities is as excitingly varied and enjoyable as can be. For one thing, this year's program has been designed to cater to the needs and interests of each individual member.

Sure enough, the focal point centers mostly on the unique qualities that only Mambucal can offer. The lush greenery and the captivating handiworks of nature - cascading waterfalls, rushing brook, hot mineral springs, moss-covered rocks, wildflowers and clinging vines, forested hills, and the lures of a scenery vibrantly alive with the chirping of birds and the blossoms of flowers.

To "savor" this multitude of delights, we are encouraging all to make full use of their free time. For example, they can spend time romping around the big boulders at the waterfalls and then dip their feet into the invitingly clear water (see accompanying photo). And afterwards they can readily partake of the refreshing coolness of the water spring once they get thirsty. If they so desire, they can even scale the seven waterfalls, although this would prove quite a task. In fact, last year's group of intrepid "mountain climbers" reached only halfway. But maybe that record will be surpassed this year, who knows.

It's true that we have allotted several free afternoons to enable everybody to make a complete

tour (including the leisurely strolls and the adventurous treks) of the Mambucal locale. But at the same time we have lined up also a complete array of activities to entertain almost everyone.

For instance, we have retained all the athletic events we had last year, namely: basketball, swimming, water polo, bowling, ping pong, and chess. To add more color to the sports calendar, we have included for this year several new events. They are volleyball, tug-of-war, swimming relay, running relay and marathon. Actually, the marathon consists of completing three rounds of the spacious Mambucal compound.

PT LECTURE METRO MANILA

Mr. Colin Adair, Regional Director for the NE Asian Work and Pastor of the WCG in the Philippines conducted an Open Plain Truth Lecture here last Sunday, August 21, at the GSP Auditorium - corner Taft & Padre Faura Streets, Metro Manila. He spoke before 105 people (51 were members) on the topic "What Is The Religion of God?"

Emcee for the morning affair, which started at 10:15 a.m., was Mr. Nap Acebron. (Prior to this meeting, YAC members together with other volunteers joined in handing out sample PT copies, which included the special invitations for the lecture, within the Metro Manila area.)

As a starter, before the main message was given, Nap Acebron introduced the Larks who rendered "Bridge Over Troubled Waters." Mr. Adair followed up with his talk which aimed to systematically enlighten the audience by answering the following questions: "What was in the mind of God when He created man? Was man created for a definite purpose? If so, what is that purpose and what has it got to do with religion, or the worship of God?"

At first the speaker partly touched on the subject of Evolution. Then he discussed God's creation of man as a free moral agent. He stated: "Man was given the choice, of following God's ways or not. Yet man took to himself the decision of determining what is right and wrong...man rejected and corrupted God's way of life. So God destroyed Man by a flood."

He continued to describe how Abram was called by God; how the covenant of God with Israel was also offered to all mankind but was rejected by the latter. The Old and New Covenant was also discussed. "Christ did not do away with the Commandments. His spiritual laws were always in effect," he said. "What was done away was the administration of condemnation - the glory of the Old Testament. This was replaced by the Administration of the Spirit - based on mercy and repentance, as indicated in II Cor. 3:6. The New Administration is more glorious than the Old."

Mr. Adair concluded "Eventually God's government will rule all people. Man doesn't know how to have world peace.

"World peace is coming; to be established and enforced by God, to regulate people's lives to conform to God's ways... this is the religion of God, fulfilling the way of your existence."

After the lecture, the Larks

sang "All My Trials."

Mr. Nap Acebron finally announced: "To those who would like to ask questions, a Bible Forum will be held in the afternoon at 2:00 p.m. at the Ambascol office at Port Area Metro Manila.

HAVE AN ENJOYABLE FEAST

Is Your Salvation Personal?

Some years ago a member of the Manila Church came into a large sum of money. As often happens, the money corrupted his faith and he began to turn away from God's Church. His wife, who had been baptised with him, was asked by a minister what she would do if her husband left the Church. She replied, "I would have to follow him."

In spite of counselling to the contrary, this is exactly what she did! Her husband left the Church, and she followed him.

Apparently, this woman didn't understand what she was doing. It seems she thought her salvation depended on following her husband in doing whatever he did, spiritually speaking.

How many of YOU wives would do the same thing? How many of you HUSBANDS would allow 'your wife to turn you away from God?

Does your salvation depend on another human being, or is it something PERSONAL between you and God?

What God Says

In both Timothy and Peter God says He is not willing that any should perish but that all should be saved. He speaks of individuals, men and women, who, made in the image of God, have the potential of one day entering God's family as born again spirit beings.

In Acts 2:38 Peter answered the crowd who were convicted in their hearts of what they had done to their saviour. He said. "Repent, and be baptised, every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of sins, and you shall receive the gift of the Holy Spirit."

Notice be told each individual to repent. He knew repentance and forgiveness was a very PERSONAL matter between the individual and God.

It is impossible to repent for someone else! You CANNOT apply your repentence to anyone in your family. This is why the doctrine of a certain Church today is so ridiculous in saying that you can be baptised for people already dead and buried! This is plainly CONTRARY to the Word of God.

Each individual must be called by God. God does this in various ways and no doubt each one of us has an interesting story to tell about how we came into the knowledge of the truth. Sometimes He calls us through our husband or wife, but his is not merely a case of following our mates into their religion. It has got to be a case where you are personally convicted of the truth and you view your situation as something between you and God, and NOT involving your wife or husband.

Case History

God's judgment is something very personal to each one of us. He says in Romans 14 we shall all stand before the judgement seat of Christ. Every one of us will give an account of himself (or herself) to God. At that time neither husband or wife can do anything to help. We will all be judged individually.

There is a case recorded in the early history of the Church which shows this principle very clearly

Ananias and Sapphira were husband and wife. They were both members of the Church of God right during the apostolic era.

It was a time when disciples were selling property or land in order to give to the Church. But in their case they conspired together to lie about the price they received. As Peter told them, they didn't have to give all the money if they didn't want to. Their sin was in lying about the price and pretending (hypocrisy) in front of all the Church that they were giving all the money to the Work of God.

Notice what the book of Acts says, chapter 5:2, ".....and kept back part of the price, his wife also being privy to it....."

Here we see that God looked upon the matter as being the sin of two people, not one!

Sapphira, in God's eyes, was personally responsible for her own part in the affair. She was going to be judged separately from her husband. This is made clear in the rest of the account because Peter deals with them SEPARATELY, not as a family!

First we see Peter confronting Ananias and his resulting death as a consequence of his sin.

Then we see Peter asking Sapphira the same question, treating her as a separate personality, responsible for her own actions and not her husband being responsible for bard.

The result is her death, as a consequence of her sin, not the sin of her husband!

In verse 9 we read, "Then Peter said unto her, How is it that you have agreed together to tempt the Spirit of the Lord? behold, the feet of them which have buried your husband are at the door, and shall carry you out."

We see here that the conspiracy to lie to God was brewed together! From verse 2 it appears that Ananias was the first one to come up with the idea. He obviously confided in his wife what he was going to do. She agreed with him, thus giving consent to his sin and sinning herself!

What SHOULD she have done? Sapphira should have realised that what her husband was going to do was wrong and should have tried to get him to see his wrong!

But even if he was determined to carry out his plan, she should NOT have gone along with him! It seems Sapphira ALSO forgot that her salvation depended on her righteousness before God. It is very clear God held her accountable for her OWN sin.

Where do You Stand?

What mode of behaviour do you wives follow today? If your husband sins do you go along with it? Or do you try to help him see his error?

Did you get baptised into God's Church simply because your husband was a member or because he asked you to? If so you are not truly converted and you would probably follow your husband right out of God's Church if he left!

Are you, as a husband or wife or a single person, convicted of YOURSELF that you are a sinner in need of salvation? Your conversion has GOT to be personal! Nothing else will do!

Experience shows, unfortunately, that there are some people who are baptised simply because their husband, wife, father, mother, brother or sister are baptised! They are able to answer all the questions a counselling minister may ask them but what the minister says doesn't really sink in. All they think about is becoming a member of the same Church as their relatives. They don't seem to understand that they are foolingaround with eternal LIFE or DEATH!

So when the pressure is on, or their husband or wife quits the Church for one reason or another, they meekly follow them out instead of standing firm in the faith they have embraced.

A couple of years ago a certain minister in another part of the world defected from the Church and went into doctrinal error. He expected his wife to follow him. He got the shock of his life when his wife told him he was on his own! She would NOT follow him out of the body of Chirst.

This woman KNEW what salvation was all about and wasn't about to let any human being, husband or otherwise, deflect her from the course she was on!

Happily, that man is today back attending Church although not in the ministry. Perhaps it was his wife's steadfastness that made him rethink his own course of action.

How about you? Will YOU remain stedfast no matter what your mate does? Will you perhaps help SAVE your mate by standing firm in the faith even if he or she strays?

Festival Brochure

Mr. Nap Acebron, who has been commissioned to publish this year's festival brochure, is about to finish the layout. The brochure, which is expected to run to about 50 pages, will contain general articles on the meaning of the Feast of Tabernacles, the festival tithe, information on each feast site, etc. It will be distributed free at the feast site.

Radio/TV Program

Starting August, TV 8 in Bacolod City regularly airs the Garner Ted Armstrong television program. Along with the deal that we made with the management of TV 8 is the airing of the 30-minute World Tomorrow broadcast over Radio DYKB, a sister station of TV 8. With these new additions, we now have two TV stations carrying the GTA telecast and eight radio stations airing the 30-minute World Tomorrow program.

While on the subject, we now have received the first sample tape of the 5-minute program of Mr. Ted Armstrong. We will soon be dubbing it and then supply all our local church pastors with dubbed copies for them to use in "promoting" the program to local radio stations. We hope to get these 5-minute programs also on air later.

Bible Forums

Two Bible forums were started in August. One was in Urdaneta, Pangasinan which was opened by Mr. Pike Mirto, and the other one was in San Pablo City, Laguna conducted by Mr. Jose Raduban. Both had a disappointing outcome, with Urdaneta registering an attendance of less than 10 while Laguna with none. Of course, the Laguna forum result could have been due to typhoon Ibiang which was then lashing northern Luzon.) The next Bible forum in Laguna will be held on the first Sabbath of September. That in Urdaneta has been scheduled to continue every week.

Plain Truth Newsstand Distribution

The PT newsstand distribution campaigns in local church areas are now in full swing. The Extension Services Offices sent 10,000 copies of the magazine to all local church pastors for them to distribute through news-

Fifteen participants in the second Advanced Leadership Training Course finished training recently in Manila. The weekly course was conducted by the Coordinating Center over a period of about six months, ending August 1. The graduates are presently being interviewed by Mr. Pike Mirto, head of the Coordinating Center, to determine how they may best be used in the various functions of the church. Some of them have already been appointed as lead men in the Manila Church.

The advanced course consisted of two major areas of study: advanced management and supervision, and advanced biblical principles. Among the lecturers were Messrs. Colin Adair, Pike Mirto, Henson Fen Santos, and Rey Taniajura.

Another batch of men will be selected for a new basic Leadership Training Course after the Feast of Tabernacles. Meanwhile, have a wonderful feast!

The Subscribers Development Program

Here are some more of the many ways YOU as a member of God's Church can help promote the Work in the Philippines and Northeast Asia!

The Worldwide Church of God at this present time has a very special calling: to proclaim the gospel to this world, an aspect of which is to aid in the spiritual development of those whom God will call into an active participation in His Work. Past experience has shown that it is largely through the personal interest that we as an organization show that can determine the quality and swiftness of response from those we

To aid our subscribers to grow in their involvement in our Work of helping humanity, we have designed the second of the six development programs that we have for this fiscal year, the "Subscribers Development Program." Following the Biblical example of from "milk" to "meat", this program is organized to lead our subscribers in a gradual manner toward greater participation in the Work of God.

Our main emphasis is to show our genuine care and concern for them through this program. The aim is to enable them to progress through the various stages of growth from regular Plain Truth subscribers to co-workers, correspondence course graduates and hopefully, members of the Church of God.

Who are Subscribers?

Before we discuss how the whole program works, let us first define the meaning of "subscribers." From the Philippine Work's point of view, a subscriber is one who is either a regular PT magazine reader; a donor or co-worker; or a correspondence course student or graduate. To allow our subscribers to progress at a rate as they are being called, each of these groups of people are provided by us with different

types of services which comprise the whole program of "Subscribers Development."

One word of caution here: It is not our job to call and convert people. We realize that it is God alone who can do the calling and converting. But it is our responsibility, however, to provide the spiritual assistance that God and the Church have to provide to these people.

The following then are the various activities and help that we have set up for our subscribers as we respond to their interest, requests and needs.

Program for PT Subscribers

As Mr. Garner Ted Armstrong puts it, the broadcasts and telecasts (and in our particular case here in the Philippines, the rest of the activities under the Public Information Program) represent the "hors d'oeuvres" of the Word of God, which he says, is likened to a meal, strong meat, or perhaps a steak following the "milk of the Word". This has been our first approach, the first contact and the leading method by which people are "turned on" to Ged's Work. Here in the Philippines we are fulfilling this very approach by implementing the many activities that we have outlined in the Public Information Program (see page 3 of August issue of

The second major focal point of the message is via the Plain Truth magazine. Of the PT Mr. GTA has this to say: "This (the PT) has proved to be a tremendous winning game, and a very effective tool in preaching and (publishing) the gospel".

The very first step then under the Subscribers Development Program is to see to it that the Plain Truth gets promoted to as many people as we can reach in this country. To do this we promote the PT by various means, the major ones of which are by distributing leaflets which offer subscription to the magazine, putting ads in national and local dailies and establishing PT newsstand distribution campaigns.

Following the example of the Apostle Paul of going first to centers of population in preaching his message, we also see to it that the promotion of the PT takes place first and foremost in areas where the bulk of the population are located. Primarily, these areas are the regional centers and secondarily the leading cities or capital towns of provinces.

Plain Truth Lectures

Another major activity in the Subscribers Development Program consists of the Plain Truth Lectures being conducted by Mr. Colin Adair in key cities of the country. The lectures are intended to reach as many people

as possible in the cities where they are conducted, so a witness can be given and so we fulfill the gospel commission. This way many become new subscribers and eventually will benefit from our programs. They also serve to bring our existing subscribers into contact with us.

The Plain Truth lectures actually serve as the beginning point for people to get to know the organization — the people — behind the Plain Truth magazine. Most often, our subscribers are at a loss as to whether or not they can get in contact with a group in the Philippines representing the Plain Truth or Mr. Herbert W. Armstrong.

Through these lectures our subscribers get to know us, particularly Mr. Adair, and find out that there are many other available services apart from the PT.

Your Role as Church Member

As a Church member, where do you fit in the "picture"? What can you do to help in the above activities? Of course, you know that your tithes and offerings to the Work here make it possible for us to print and publish the Plain Truth magazine. But there are still some other ways for you to "go above and beyond" your normal duty as a Christian and Church member apart from giving your tithes and offerings, if you really want to!

For example, this fiscal year we are aiming at a circulation of 35,000 to 40,000 copies of the PT. Right now we have only a circulation of less than 25,000. Much is still to be desired in this particular aspect of the Program.

For us to reach the target, we will concentrate on promoting the magazine through leaflet distribution campaigns. (This activity is timed with the PT lecture of Mr. Adair in an area.) As a church member you can do a lot by helping your local pastor, whenever he is called to do so, distribute several hundreds of these leaflets in your area.

Then, as covered in last month's article on Public Information Program, you can also help support your local pastor organize a PT newsstand distribution campaign in your locality. While this activity is not intended to increase our list of subscribers to the PT, we hope that eventually those who get the PT through the newsstands will ask for their regular subscription.

Finally you can also have a part in making the Plain Truth lectures in your area, a success! For one thing, you can devote a portion of your praying time "beseeching" God to cause many more people to be reached through this activity. And then again you can also help us particularly Mr. Adair, in these lectures by encouraging some of your relatives and friends—including yourself—who may have shown a desire to attend to come to these lectures.

We, of all people, have the hope and salvation, and a mission to proclaim the "good news" to the people in this area — the Philippines and Northeast Asia. We, the people of God, must rally around the Work and support the preaching of the gospel and the people directly doing it in every possible way. With this article and the others that will follow, we hope to have you as a church member, become actively aware of the many ways you can help to get our job done!

VERY IMPORTANT ANNOUNCEMENT

On checking our records, we find that many brethren are not listed as members. Others have old addresses of years back. Yet others have changed their status (from single to married) and have not informed us of the change.

Brethren, it is your responsibility to inform the Manila Office of any change of address as soon as you move. Do we have your correct residential address? Do we have your mailing address if it's different from your residential address? Can we get in touch with you should an emergency arise? Or have we on record your address of 2 to 5 years ago, and you have moved 3 or 4 times since?

Please be sure to give us your correct residential address and correct mailing address, if different.

Please remember your responsibility and inform the office immediately you have changed your address. THIS THING CALLED FRIENDSHIP

What do you seek most in a friend - company? camaraderie? security? Or, is it something deeper and much more meaningful as understanding, respect, loyalty, trust, sincerity and con-

"Friendship," says distinguished author Paul Hinnebusch, "is two people growing. Friends draw forth each other's potentialities. True love always promotes the growth of the loved one. Only in loving and being loved do we grow. The purpose of friendship, therefore, is to help two people grow fully into their true selves."

How does one become a friend? What can friendship offer us? A friend by definition is one whom one knows well and is fond of. He is someone whom we consider an integral part of our social life. Intimacy means being fully at home with someone, and no person can be that intimate to us other than a friend. Ignace Lepp defines that "the friend par excellence is he who opens himself to our genero-

sity and who lets us share in his." It is a truism that man is a lonely, not to say, talkative creature. He loves to communicate his feelings and to verbalize his emotions. He wants himself to be fully known and be accepted by his fellow human being. He needs an audience, at least outside his family, who will listen to him and share with him his life, and experiences, his ideas and opinions.

On what basis is friendship established between two or more people? Friendship can be born when there is a certain degree of communion. A certain likeness must exist between friends which is a more or less essential community of interests. If we have so little to talk about with our friend, if we have nothing so much in common, if we feel uneasy at a friend's idiosyncracies then there is not going to be much point in the friendship.

Friendship, like communication, is a two-way street. It is giving whatever the friend has in abundance and taking, not in a greedy fashion, whatever the other has lack of. Thus resulting in actually supplementing or supplying each other's needs. On the other hand, friendship is not all giving neither is it all taking. It cannot be fecund if one person does all the giving and the other abeen playing. Both partie us

inspiring, full-of-lesson experiences.

In spite of the fact that the way up there is so arduous and difficult (and what of advice not to travel at night because of bandits and other road hazards?) we persisted, persevered, bended our knees and stubbornly maintained our annual presence. Whatever we lacked, our ever loving brethren there would provide, like the Cambare family and others.

By 1970 or so, the feast site was transferred to the town of Don Carlos. Then by 1975, Cagayan de Oro City was chosen as the next festival site.

And lastly - (or is it the last)? came Mambucal Health Resort, Negros Occidental, NOW in our very place (about 330 kilometers north of us).

Mambucal, compared with the previous ones, is a sight to behold! Perched on the crest of the last series of hills that Canla-on Volcano comprise about 1,500 ft. above sea level, lies this beautiful 24-hectare summer spa, built during the pre-war days by the local government. It is surrounded with sugar cane plantations, devoid of many people living around, but with a plenteous water supply cool or steaming — with sauna baths, hydro-electric power of its own, with good housing accommodations for 200 or more people. What more can we ask from God, except to reverence, to praise and to glorify and thank Him?

GTA TV Program

NOW IN BACOLOD CITY by Jun Caligan

BACOLOD CITY - The Garner. Ted Armstrong TV Program can now be seen every week over Channel 8, Bacolod City. The station is managed by RPN. But only that. The World Tomorrow Radio Broadcast is also aired weekly over RPN's radio station, DYKB (1390 khz). To top it all, the 5-minute GTA Commentary is likewise featured almost daily ever the same station. The remarkable thing here is that we are not spending even a single centavo.

By having all these programs aired without any charge, the management of RPN agreed to a "barter deal". They will keep the video cassette in return.

GTA TV is scheduled every Saturday afternoon, from 2:00 to 2:30. The WT Radio Broadcast is heard every Thursday evening, from 9:30 to 10:00. And the GTA Commentary is being aired every 9:45 P.M. daily (except Saturday and Sunday).

Channel 8 covers the entire Western Visayas. It can also reach as far as Palawan to the west, Cebu and part of Bohol and Leyte to the east, and certain portions of Northern Mindanao, including Malaybalay, Bukidnon, Dipolog, and Surigao. That's enough to cover the central portion of the Philippines.

This special arrangement could not have been possible had it not been for one fact. The Manager of RPN in Bacolod City, Mr. Rene Corcino Tan, is a graduate of the Correspondence Course. In fact, displayed prominently in his office is his narra-laminated Certificate for having finished the CC.

Mr. Jerry Ortiguero negotiated the deal with Mr. Tan. Last June 20, in the company of Mr. Bernardo Castillon and this writer, Mr. Ortiguero paid a call on Mr. Tan at RPN's office in Sum-ag, Bacolod City. From the

start of the conversation up to the time we left RPN, Mr. Tan had nothing but good words for the Work.

"It fulfills the need of the times," he remarked. Continuing, he said that the programs we're doing are "very relevant".

Mr. Tan saw to it that the GTA TV will receive a big audience. That's why he inserted the program on the 2:00 P.M. slot because the program before that is an entertainment live show (with guest singers from Manila). "It's a highly-rated show," he told us. Once that is through and your program will follow, you can still get the big audience who watched the previous show," he added.

And before we left, he showed us around the premises of the office - treating us like some VIP's. This was something extraordinary really. Here we were making a deal that seemed outwardly difficult to transact. We cannot pay for the programs (Mr. Ortiguero made this clear to Mr. Tan). And we're negotiating for the airing of not one, nor two - but three programs. Yet - the fantastic thing is that it did not take Mr. Ortiguero half an hour to close the deal. In fact, it was something like 15 minutes only. The response of Mr. Tan was direct to the point. "Why not?" he answered.

The Gospel is now being preached with greater exposure and impact in this area. The World Tomorrow Radio Broadcast is being aired already over DYRI in Iloilo City. With the addition of another radio station in Bacolod City (which also carries the GTA Commentary) and Channel 8 for the GTA TV, truly the preaching of the good news has received a big boost. And for this, we're thankful to God that He heard the collective prayers of His people.

Feast of Tabernacles

A short, hurried look over every end of each day since the last Feast of Tabernacles, tells me and my family, that we are once again, ONE DAY nearer to another Feast of Tabernacles. It is this feast that always reminds and points to us that we are but transient and temporary sojourners in this present world; that we are looking forward to a much, much better world. As a reminder for instance, if we have not attended last year's Feast of Tabernacles, then we would not

1) To hear and understand the full impact and meaning of the terms "total commitment or compliance";

2) To comprehensively explain to anybody who would ask us a question about the Kingdom of God, when it was started to be preached, what part of the Good News was stressed or emphasized in every era of God's Work. And that ample Scriptures were thoroughly expounded to demolish the allegation of this age that "Christ only should be preached," and nothing more;

3) To hear, share and be inspired by the experiences of a brother from distant Iloilo, especially, about his penultimate decision during the Day of Atonement, to totally COMMIT himself in obedience to God's commanded fast, in spite of his very acute stomach ulcer! Willing to die in order to obey God's will, he was completely and miraculously healed!

4) To witness, in bird's eye view, how to manage the complexities of such an affair, without so many flaws, compared with previous experiences;

Above all, to fellowship

with people of the same thoughts, attitudes, outlooks and beliefs.

In retrospect, I believe these things, more than any, were the best payoffs of the faith in the

ways set before us.

And speaking of festival sites, nostalgically the Visayan brethren, especially those that were baptized in the 60s, (I was baptized in 1966 & my wife in 1967), did hear about the Feast of Tabernacles but failed to attend one. And most, if not all, had not the slightest idea about the Second Tithe or Festival Tithe as it became known later; and much more, how to observe it and HOW TO KEEP IT, as God wants it to be

Gradually, we learned that of all places God chose to place His name "nearest" our place was in the barrio of Kiara, Don Carlos, Bukidnon, Mindanao! The word KIARA, we later learned, is a Muslim word.

We began to be inquisitive and curious. "How far away and how would we go there? Are there no bandits there?

By 1967, we were able to go there and met most of the brethren from Cebu and one or two from Leyte. And to our unexpected anticipation, IT WAS A LOVELY PLACE! It was love at first sight. God could not have been mistaken in choosing the place. We liked the place to the extent that we planned to resign from our respective work at home and be IN the place with the Mindanao brethren. Some few brethren from Cebu stayed there for some years, and I have learned of

and, at the same time, to receive. In other words, the demand for reciprocity obviously makes the birth and growth of friendship. Ignace Lepp once again demonstrated that "he who would give all to his friends but refuses to receive anything from them can scarcely benefit from friendship."

Come to think of it, friendship is both difficult and pleasurable. Like any other human endeavor it has its own challenges and problems. Perhaps, we might say, it is because of the inevitable clashing of our personality characteristics or the vicissitudes of life that friendship becomes difficult to survive. One of the most challenging stages of the friendship quest is when the friend may give in to his selfishness. He would tend to be taking the other's friendship too much for granted to the extent of not minding or ignoring that he has done him wrong. Without trying to become more worthy of acceptance and appreciation, the friend may even begin to become too demanding to be accepted instead of realizing that he has paralyzed his common sense or just simply being vain to admit his fault to the other.

If the friendship would only produce jealousy, competition and uneasiness, then it is not really a friendship because the real friendship as Paul Hinnebusch added, "will always be resulting in growth for the parties, making them freer, more responsible." Moreover, success in friendship cannot be attained without making extra effort in occasionally wooing our friends. In order to endure, friendship must constantly be remade, renewed, and refreshed like marriage itself.

One of the best descriptions of friendship has been made by · Andrew Greeley: "Friendship is our successful conquest of fear of the other. It is fear, therefore, that is the principal barrier to friendship." Yes, fear of whatever shape, size, and color that you could think of which hinders us from the friendship game. The fear of being rejected, of being criticized, ridiculed, contradicted, to name only a few. impel us to hide from one another. Psychologically, man does not want to leave himself open to his fellowmen because he is afraid if he does, others will make him feel defeated, and he is not too willing to accept defeat until he is ready for it. But there are stages in friendship just as there are stages in the growth of an individual. Friendship will gradually liberate him from this fear of the unknown. Friendship will help him take one step forward to beyond where he is.

Friendship has limitations too. We make a demand that the friend respect the integrity of our selfhood. That there should be the necessity of maintaining a profound concern for our own value, our privacy, our freedom. It is not for a friend to take it against us if we are not saying much of our secret person because we still have our own individuality, our own self. Friendship is lost when respect is

lost. When there is respect, there is friendship.

Friendship is even more limited between two people of the opposite sex. It is limited in the sense that either one or both are not mature enough to share some aspect of life and to face the challenges that friendship offers. More often than not, the relationship or should we say, the affection inevitably graduates into a stronger liking and it would be disheartening if only one heart is romantically infected. If this happens the friend may begin to feel indifferent and the friendship would suffer from further development. One is forced to conclude that beautiful friendship between a man and a woman has been a relatively rare phenomenon.

Life is the more enjoyable and blessed when there are friends surrounding us. You see, each has differing gifts to be appreciated. That is to say, there are friends in time of need; friends in time of comedy and merriment; friends in singing and dancing; and what's more friends in good times and bad times.

It goes without saying that friendship is choice. It is focusing our resources on one or two persons rather than on others. We are inclined to single out one whom we find the most likeable and natural of them all insofar as, we feel, he is our equal. We become friends insomuch as each other's personality needs are being met in what seems to be a satisfactory way. Hence, it is in choosing our friends that we learn how to judge; and from judging that we learn how to decide.

Friendship is infelt when we win the confidence and trust of a person. That confidence and trust is demonstrated when he comes and confides to us. Such friendship is felt when a friend is bothered when we are pursuing the wrong way. Friendship is infelt not so much in big things but in little things done in an unexpected, spontaneous way. And such is friendship perceived in times of decision, in moments of pressure.

If you want your friendship to endure and to be a real one, let me quote Andrew Greeley: "Friendship should be a relationship that is enriching us and developing us, causing our goodness to expand, and making us more ourselves ... In friendship we discover and reveal what we are and, perhaps still more, what we are capable of becoming."

True, his bank book was full, but his heart, sad to say, remained empty.

It's no wonder, then, that King Edward VIII captured the attention of the whole world when he decided to follow his heart's dictates and gave up his throne as King of England in order to marry the woman he loved. He found out that he could manage to live even without the trappings of pomp, splendor and grandeur. But to live WITHOUT love? That was too much. King Edward VIII evalued more the "beckoning" of love - even when it meant being a "royal outcast", though he should in this case, have put duty before self.

In a radio broadcast to the British people (on that memorable day of December 11, 1936) he explained his sentiment as follows: "I have found it impossible to carry the heavy burden of responsibility and to discharge my duties as king as I would wish to do without the help and support of the woman I love."

When J. Paul Getty and King Edward VIII acted the way they did, they had something in common. Both discovered that a life without love is an empty shell. And that for life to be worthwhile, one must have a "special someone" to love and cherish — and who loves you in return. There's something exhibitating in life that only love can bring.

Take away love (and the "inspiration" it provides) and what becomes of life? For one-thing, it loses its color. Even your efforts and struggles don't count a lot. As one poet noted, "All work is empty save where there is love."

But with love, life takes on greater meaning. Each break of morn heralds the start of another exciting day. There's a melody in the air. And a song in the heart. For truly enough, life becomes a sweet and joyful thing.

As is always the case, he who lives to love will love to live.
