
Club, all performed creditably.

TAKING NOTES:

Let's notice some principles to apply in taking proper notes. Some people's notes are utter confusion -- they cannot even comprehend what's been written themselves. God is NOT the author of confusion! Slivers and scraps of paper or pieces of torn envelopes won't do the job right. What you need is a permanent notebook. Those having a spiral-wire binder with cardboard covers are popular. Such a notebook will keep your notes permanently and neatly in order, and in one place. Next, try to avoid taking notes in pencil, especially the soft-leaded pencils. Ballpoint pens are very inexpensive and will produce a permanent, more legible set of notes.

Now that you have the necessary tools -- pen and notebook, the exact method depends on you. These are YOUR notes -- they're for YOUR study and review! Whether you print, write longhand or shorthand is up to you. Strive for balance. Many either write too much or not enough. After you have the speaker's name, date and subject of his sermon, don't just put down a list of scriptures by themselves. This won't help you later. After you've put down the scriptures write the thought or the point the speaker is bringing out about this scripture. How is he applying it? Don't crowd your notes, leave a little space between scriptures so you can come back later and add points that come to your mind.

If you are still unsure or if you have additional questions, don't hesitate to ask for help. Any of those men giving sermonettes and assisting with the song leading will be able and happy to assist you.

Remember, brethren, Godholds each of us accountable for this LIFE-GIVING KNOWLEDGE that is disseminated during His Festivals. You can "get it" if you really want to. Don't allow these truths to slip through your hand by being neglectful. Our forefathers continually FORGOT God's laws and consequently had to suffer punishments and captivity. Let us not be guilty of the same thing by failing to TAKE and then USE thorough, accurate notes!

From there, the tour was taken to the editorial room with its many desks and on down to the TYPESETTING floor where "INTERTYPE" machines were noisily clicking away setting up type in the form of metal slugs. Interesting point here was the <u>automation</u> of the

ENTIRE plant!!

With the tour now well under way, the visitors moved on to the composing room where all the lines of type were set in a frame together with the metal photos (or half-tones).

After further processing, a curved metal plate or stero is produced which is finally placed on the MAMMOTH presses which are TWO stories high, weigh many tons, and have row after row of printing units.

The guide also mentioned that the Saturday edition of the Sydney Morning Herald, a broadsheet paper, now has 88 pages, weighs $1\frac{1}{4}$ lbs., and has a circulation of 420,000 copies.
